THE STAATS-ZEITUNG'S VIEWS.

New York Tribune. The Democratic hopes that the citizens of German extraction could be scared by the spectre of militarism into supporting Mr. Bryan are evidently doomed to disappointment. One by one prominent Germans in different parts of the country have refused to support free silver on any pretence, and now the "Staats-Zeitung," of this city, the most influential German newspaper in the United States, declares for Mr. McKinley.

The "Staats-Zeitung" is naturally a Democratic paper. It generally supports Democratic candidates. Only the most extreme pressure of conviction of public duty can bring it into alliance with the Republican party even when it has no special reason for dissenting from that party's policies.

The "Staats-Zeitung" does not delude itself and does not mean to let its readers delude themselves with false hopes such as Mr. Schurz has held out of congress exercising a check on Mr. Bryan and robbing free silver of all its dangers. In the first place there are too many chances that a popular vote carrying Mr. Bryan into the White House would also result in a free silver majority in both branches of congress.

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ed, entirely moderate though they be when put beside the demagogic appeals of Mr. Bryan to class prejudice with his talk about "militarism" and his teaching of the wage earners that the army is being recruited to enslave them.

We think that in five years its doubts will have been solved as completely as the Whig opposition to the acquisition of California had been dissipated by 1855, and that it will find the United States still the same free country of its devotion. Indeed, it seems itself to feel that though it disapproves the country will not be ruined by what it disapproves; for, all things considered, it prefers "imperialism" to Bryan. Men who do not in the least share its views about the Philippines will respect those who hold them so sanely and open-mindedly, and welcome them heartily as co-workers in the task of keeping the United States up to the high plane which it has come in the last four years. Now is the time to deal the death blow to free silver. A country of sound finance and stable business can consider other questions in good time. Plunged into panic, it can settle nothing.
