ocratic leaders are protesting that, as a matter of fact, Mr. Bryan either will not or cannot do any of the more important things which the Kansas City platform pledges him to do, and the most powerful arguments which they address to those whom they think constitute the wavering vote are assurances that Bryan will not be permitted to carry out the pledges of himself and his platform. And when we try to get something explicit from Mr. Bryan himself we get nothing but evasions or promises of things ridiculous or ruinous.

So it seems that the Democratic platform counts for little or nothing in this campaign, but it will be useful to compare its declarations with those of the Republican platform, which no one denies expresses the intentions of the Republican party and its candidate. On the Philippines the Democrats are certainly explicit. They propose to give them, first, a stable government; second, independence; third, "protection from outside interference such as has been given for nearly a century to the republics of Central and South America."

On the subject of trusts the Republican platform reads as follows: "We condemn all conspiracies and combinations intended to restrict business, to create monopolies, to limit production or to control prices, and favor such legislation as will effectively restrain and prevent all such abuses, protect and promote competition and secure the rights of producers, laborers and all who are engaged in industry and commerce."

Y., a day or two since, Mr. Bryan used the following words: "Read the platform of our party, compare it with the platform of the Republican party, and you find the difference is that the Democratic position is stated with a clearness that admits of no ambiguity, while the Republican party states its position in glimmering generalities."

The first of these "remedies" is impossible of execution, and if it were enforced would have no effect whatever on the price of commodities. The second and third are silly because nothing is easier than for corporations to evade them; the fourth would simply transfer business to foreign trusts and be more ruinous to the competitors of trusts than to the trusts themselves.

On the subject of money the Republican platform reads as follows: "We renew our allegiance to the principle of the gold standard, and declare our confidence in the wisdom of the legislation of the Fifty-sixth congress by which the parity of all of our money and the stability of our currency on a gold basis have been secured."

And the Democratic platform demands: "The immediate restoration of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the present ratio of 16 to 1 without waiting for the aid or consent of any other nation." It would seem that there was no ambiguity about either of these paragraphs and there certainly is no pretense on the part of anybody that the Republican declaration is not perfectly plain, but as to the Democratic deliverance nine-tenths of the Bryanite orators declare that it means nothing whatever,

and when we ask Bryan himself what it means he is as dumb as an oyster. These contrasts might be continued indefinitely. The Republicans, for example, declare their renewed "faith in the policy of protection to American labor." The Democrats "condemn the Dingley tariff law," and upon this, alone of its important declarations, the Democratic party is united, and likely, if it gets the power, to act in accordance with the declarations of its platform, as it did when it last had the power.

The Republicans would be very glad if permitted to go to the country upon the explicit declarations of the two platforms, giving a fair interpretation to each. Unfortunately we cannot for the reason that the great majority of the Bryanites repudiate large portions of their platform, and the whole object of the Republican campaign is to purchase the different factions into their respective holes, extort from them explicit declarations of what they really would be at, and then compel Bryan himself to decide between them. But they are a very elusive lot.
