Official Estimates for Expenditures of Coming Year.

FOR THE MOUTH \$600,000

Chief Engineer Wilson Reports to the Government the Amount Necessary to Carry Out Projected Improvements.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The success of coast defense is the one subject considered in the annual report of J. M. Wilson, chief of engineers. Generally speaking, he reported most gratifying progress in the execution of the various projects during the last fiscal year. Some of the points of interest treated by General Wilson are as follows:

The torpedo system has been under careful study by expert officers in the light of experience gained during the Spanish-American war, but so far only minor changes have been proposed. Up to the present thirty localities have been selected for defense on the coast. No formal projects were added to the list during the past year, but preliminary projects have been framed for the defense of the entrance to Chesapeake bay and the defense of several other localities is under consideration. Attention has been given to the subject of coast defenses for Porto Rico and the Hawaiian islands and in view of the importance of these island possessions General Wilson says improvements for their defense should be deferred no longer. San Juan de Porto Rico harbor improvements involve an estimated expenditure of \$1,300,000 for defense. Preliminary projects for Pearl harbor and Honolulu are also already available and ready for execution as soon as congress shall appropriate the funds.

The great changes in the character of guns and armor and ships since the Endicott board framed the coast defense plans now under execution have involved corresponding conditions in those plans. The tendency towards reduction in the calibre of guns, together with the adoption of a successful type of disappearing gun carriage for 12-inch guns, has rendered unnecessary the armor for forts originally planned and now in use in Europe.

There has been a reduction also in the number of mortars and actual strengthening of batteries of secondary guns, owing to the developments of the rapid-fire type, almost unknown at the time the Endicott board made its plans. These changes have resulted in marked economies without sacrifice of the strength of the defenses and they will be continued.

The war with Spain had the effect of hastening the work on the coast defenses and now, ten years after the work began in earnest, the chief engineer is able to report that 50 per cent of the defense work is complete. Twenty-five of the principal harbors of the United States now have a sufficient number of heavy guns and mortars in place to offer an effective defense against naval attacks.

Existing projects contemplate the mounting of about 450 guns for sea-coast defense, of 580 rapid-fire guns and about 900 mortars, at an approximate total cost of \$24,000,000. Up to the present time provision has been made for the emplacement of 369 heavy guns, 368 rapid-fire guns and 372 mortars. The armament placed during the war in temporary emplacements will be transferred in time to permanent works, but the temporary work will be held in reserve for an emergency.

Attention is invited to the urgent need for an increase of the artillery arm of the service, which is now too small to take care of the costly and complex defense works. During the past year negotiations have been in progress for the acquisition of fortification sites in Boston harbor (two sites); Narragansett bay (two); New York harbor (extension of Fort Mifflin); Port Royal, South Carolina; San Francisco and Rich Passage, Puget sound, but the proceedings are slow owing to legal difficulties. The most important sites are those at Boston and New York harbor, rendered necessary by the construction of the proposed deep water entrance.

The report gives a concise statement of the work accomplished during the past year. The total of the estimates submitted on account of fortifications for the next year is \$5,715,000 and of this amount \$4,710,000 is on account of the construction of gun and mortar batteries and position finders. General Wilson makes an earnest plea for the reinforcement of the engineer corps which has been overtaxed by the additional work required on account of the addition of new territory.

The second section of the report treats of the river and harbor improvements of the country, for which estimates for the fiscal year ending 1902 aggregating \$29,000,000 are submitted, to which are added \$200,000 for surveys and contingencies, \$3,800,000 for the Mississippi river commission, \$1,040,000 under the Missouri river commission, \$15,000 under the California debris commission and \$72,500 to prevent deposits in New York harbor.

The expenditures for the year ending 1900 were \$15,455,295, which does not include \$125,000 paid to the Eads estate for maintaining the jetties at the mouth of the Mississippi, and \$61,000 for surveys and examinations for a canal from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic.

The report is a review of all the work done during the fiscal year and refers especially to a number of important subjects including the Chicago drainage canal and Pearl harbor, Hawaii. Of the Chicago drainage project the report says that all the interests affected cannot be satisfying and the subject must be referred to congress for ultimate settlement. As to the lowering of the water level of the lakes, General Wilson says that investigations made under the direction of the deep water commission and by others may furnish data upon which further consideration of the question may be based.

Among the estimates above \$25,000 for the river and harbor works next year are the following:

Missouri river between Stubb's Ferry, Mont., and Sioux City, La., \$200,000; San Diego harbor, Cal., \$28,000; San Pedro harbor, Cal., \$150,000; San Luis Obispo harbor, Cal., \$75,000; Coquille river, Ore., \$65,000; Siuslaw river, Ore., \$35,000; Canal at Cascades, Columbia river, Ore., \$20,000; Willamette river above Portland, Ore., \$30,000; Columbia river and lower Willamette below Portland, Ore., \$325,000; mouth of the Columbia river, Oregon and Washington, \$800,000; Grays harbor, Wash., \$25,000; Puget sound and tributary waters, \$25,000; Olympia harbor, \$25,000; waterway connecting Puget sound with lakes Union and Washington, \$135,000; Snohomish slough,

Washington, \$20,000; Everett harbor, \$38,000.

Under the head of miscellaneous one of the items is for the sum of \$2,681,000 for the American system of filtration of the water supply of the national capital. Another item is \$280,000 for improvements in the Yellowstone national park.

IMPORTANT RAILROAD DEAL.

Syndicate of Roads Purchases Kansas City Southern.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—It is learned on excellent authority that John W. Gates, who recently purchased a controlling interest in the securities of the Kansas City Southern Railroad, has just sold such control to a syndicate representing various connecting roads.

The new purchasers include Mr. J. A. Stillman, representing the Rockefeller interest in the Missouri, Kansas & Texas; Cohen, Leach & Co., representing the Union Pacific; E. H. Harriman, representing the Chicago & Alton, and Geo. Gould, representing the Missouri Pacific. The sale is regarded as a decidedly important one in southwestern railroad circles as well as regards Pacific coast business. In the first place it does away with an active disturbing element in the railroad situation and in the next it relieves the Kansas City Southern of the old imputation of being a road "starting nowhere and going nowhere." By means of the new control it now becomes a direct road from Chicago to the gulf and by means of the Union Pacific a direct road to the Pacific.

Security purchased by Mr. Gates and by him remold comprise about \$6,500,000 bonds and about \$2,800,000 stock. The deal it is considered is only another step towards concerted financial control of the railroad world.

CLEVELAND ON RECORD.

Continues Firm in His Advocacy of the True Democracy.

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—A special to the Record from Princeton, N. J., says: Ex-President Grover Cleveland has been following letter to Don M. Dickinson, his former postmaster-general.

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 29, 1900. The Hon. Don M. Dickinson. "My dear Sir:—The speech I made at the Reform Club dinner in April, 1897, is a part of my record in advocacy of the true Democracy. I cannot suppress it or abate from it and I would not if I could. I shall not object to any use you may see fit to make of it.

In his speech at the Reform Club dinner on April 24, 1897, Mr. Cleveland condemned the course of those who were sowing the seeds of discontent and cultivating a growth of sectional and class suspicion and distrust. He also regretted to see the remedy for the supposed financial ills proposed in the free coinage of silver with a depreciated currency and cheap money.

TROOPS FOR MANILA.

Recruits at the Presidio Have Been Organized Into a Battalion.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30.—The recruits at the Presidio have been organized into a battalion of three companies and will be sent to Manila on the Sherman under command of Captain Daniel F. Anglum, Twelfth infantry, First Lieutenant Isaac A. Saxton, Twenty-first infantry, and Second Lieutenant George A. Herbst, Twenty-third infantry.

A shipment of 289 mules and two horses has arrived at the Presidio from St. Asaph, Va. They were cared for on the trip by a party of young business men from Middletown, N. Y., who offered their services to the quartermaster and were hired for the trip. These amateur hostlers will return home in a Pullman.

SPAIN'S NAVAL BUDGET.

Minister of Finance Refuses to Permit an Increase.

MADRID, Oct. 30.—The minister of finance, Senor Sagasta, refuses to increase the naval budget.

General Azcarra, the premier, had a conference with the minister of finance and Marquis Daresellano in the hope of arranging a compromise.

No agreement, however, was reached, the marquis refusing to accept the portfolio.

Th. Epoca says that the nomination of Rear-Admiral Ramos is under consideration.

POLO GAME POSTPONED.

California Players Failed to Appear at Glenwood Springs, Colorado.

GLENWOOD SPRINGS, Colo., Oct. 30.—Owing to the inability of some of the polo players of Burlingame, Cal., to participate in the game announced to be played here yesterday, it was indefinitely postponed, much to the disappointment of many persons who had come here to witness the game.

NEW SPANISH NAVY.

Large Number of Vessels Ordered From French Builders.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—According to the Madrid, the rebuilding of the Spanish fleet will be entrusted to French builders. The Spanish government, says the paper, has given an order for eight ironclads of 12,000 tons burden, four armored cruisers of 8,000 tons, four torpedo boats, and 100 torpedo boats. The order is to be executed within ten years.

JOCKEY MILLER SIGNED.

Will Ride for Stable of John F. Schorr Next Season.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 30.—John F. Schorr has signed Jockey J. Miller to ride for his stable next season. Miller succeeds Tommy Burns, who has been engaged to ride for W. C. Whitney.

Miller will start immediately for California with several horses belonging to the Schorr stable.

MINERS KILLED.

Terrific Explosion of Gas in Pennsylvania Coal Mine.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 30.—A terrific explosion of gas occurred in the Kingston mine of the Kingston Coal Company this afternoon. One man has been taken out dead. Twelve others are in the mine.

The official announcement of the population of the United States for 1900 is 76,295,220, of which 74,627,807 are contained in the forty-five states, representing approximately the population to be used for apportionment purposes. There is a total of 134,158 Indians, not taxed. The total population in 1890, with which the census population of the present census should be compared, was 62,069,756. Taking the 1890 population as a basis there has been a gain in population of 13,225,464 during the last ten years, representing an increase of nearly 21 per cent.

DISORDER DEPRECIATED.

London Papers Express Regret at Recent Rowdism.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The morning papers all express the utmost regret for the reprehensible scenes which, as one journal puts it, "have been so long the reputation of England in the eyes of foreigners and to earn for the British people unenviable characters of taking their measures brutally rather than gladly."

Most of the papers throw the chief blame upon the authorities for their failure to anticipate what occurred with a sufficient force of police and also all for their failure to bring the police upon the scene early enough.

The Standard says:

"It is monstrous that a young girl cannot see hunting or racing without less she agrees to submit to the rudeness of any chance comer. Possibly most people come out for fun and go home sober, but the majority of brutality is complete enough to compromise our reputation as a nation of self control and self respect."

Others, like the Daily Mail, frankly deprecate the rowdism and drunkenness and ask whether the same destructions are "holism or patriotism."

WOULD DISBAND NEGRO TROOPS.

Georgian Adjutant-General Believes They Cannot Be of Service to the State.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 30.—In his annual report to the governor, Adjutant-General Byrd recommends that the negro troops of the state be disbanded because he believes they cannot be of any service to the state from a military standpoint.

WILSON CALLED HOME.

Detached From Duty as Chief of Staff Under General Chaffee.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Orders have been sent to Pekin detaching General J. H. Wilson from duty as chief of staff under General Chaffee and directing him to return to the United States.

TWELVE LIVES LOST.

German Ship Wrecked at the Mouth of the Elbe.

HAMBURG, Oct. 30.—The German ship H. Bischoff has been wrecked at the entrance of the Elbe. Twelve lives are supposed to have been lost in the wreck.

AMERICAN DEFEATED.

English Runner Won in 440-Yard Running Match.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—At Northampton yesterday, E. C. Bredin, the English runner, beat T. F. Keane, the American, in a 440-yard running match for £100, by a half yard. Time 46 4-5 seconds.

ARCHDUCHESS MARRIED.
