The United States gunboat Wheeling, now at Sitka, Alaska, has been ordered to the Port Orchard drydock for general repairs. She is expected to arrive in Puget sound about November 12.

The German bark Nomia cleared from Portland yesterday afternoon with 115,756 bushels of wheat, valued at \$65,000. She was dispatched by the Portland Flouring Mills Company, and will go to Queenstown or Falmouth for orders.

A surprise party was tendered Miss Sallie B. Gray by about thirty-five of her friends last evening at the residence of her father, Judge J. H. D. Gray. The occasion was in honor of Miss Gray's birthday, and a very pleasant evening was enjoyed.

A Baker City paper, dated October 31st, says: Hon. J. Welch, grand master of Oregon, I. O. F., at Astoria, and Mrs. Welch, president of the Native Daughters of Oregon, are in the city and will hold meetings tonight of these respective orders. From here they will go to Huntington and on into Malheur county.

Headquarter offices of the Oregon & Oriental Steamship Company will be opened at Portland yesterday afternoon. They will be in charge of Joe Campbell, the veteran railroad man. In order to accept this position, Mr. Campbell severed his connection with the Idaho Northern railroad, where he has been working for the last year.

Captain Pease, the river pilot, got in some rapid work yesterday. Thursday night he took the steamer Buckingham to Portland and arrived there in time to catch the down train in the morning and got back here in time to take the Skarpeno up yesterday afternoon. He had to catch his forty winks coming down on the train, but made some pretty good time all around.

The case of R. M. Gaston, who pleaded guilty to a charge of obstructing a street of the city, before the police judge Monday afternoon, Oct. 30, was suspended till yesterday afternoon, when it was called at 3 o'clock yesterday. Street Superintendent Kearney reported that the obstruction had been removed and asked the court to dismiss the case and the defendant was discharged.

The German ship Philadelphia cleared at Portland yesterday for New London, South Africa, and carries a mixed cargo. It consists of 17,927 barrels of flour, valued at \$48,402; 37,333 bushels of wheat, valued at \$20,906; 500 cases of salmon, valued at \$10,000; 250 cases of canned fruit, valued at \$100; 8254 pounds of dried fruit, valued at \$600. The Philadelphia was dispatched by Balfour, Guthrie & Co.

As the launch Elf started to back out from her berth at R. M. Higgins & Co.'s dock yesterday afternoon she was caught by the tide and carried against the Star, a tiny launch moored against the Flavel wharf. The overhanging stern crashed through the frail house on the Star as though it had been paper and a shower of broken glass from the windows fell on the deck. The hull of the Star was not injured and the damage will not be very great.

Judge Gray received word yesterday afternoon that the O'Hanna bridge near Seaside was disabled and would have to have immediate attention. He immediately ordered notices posted at each end of the bridge and sent Contractor J. A. Pastaband down on the afternoon train to ascertain the amount of the damage. It seems that the difficulty is with the strikers of the structure rather than the foundation, so that the repairs will doubtless be speedily completed.

The Nomia and the Philadelphia are the first of the November clearances from Portland. They will be followed by the Admiral Courbet and the Europa. The Conway and the Olga are working, and they will finish some time next week. Tonnage is scarce at the present time. There is a congestion of ships in the harbor here. The weather outside has been so bad that they do not like to venture out. A number of craft are due at this port, and they will be along in time to bring the shipments of the month up to a good figure.

The Norwegian steamer Skarpeno arrived in yesterday noon from Yokohama. She brought a cargo of 2362 cases of Japan tea and 31 cases of straw braid from Hong Kong to Portland merchants. The cargo is valued at \$31,668.50. She is under charter to the Oregon & Oriental Steamship Company. She sailed from Yokohama on the 14th of October, thus making the trip in a fair passage of nineteen days. Captain Tollefson stated that the trip was an uneventful one but for the severe weather encountered during the last of the trip.

Governor T. T. Geer delivered an address Thursday evening, Oct. 25, to what was said to be the largest audience that ever congregated in the town of Clatskanie for any purpose whatsoever. On Thursday evening of this week Hon. J. J. Whitney was billed to address the Democrats at the same place but failed to show up. There was some speculation as to whether the enthusiasm manifested at the meeting last week didn't convince the Honorable Whitney that it would be useless to attempt to make any votes for Bryan in that district.

A remonstrance was filed with Auditor Nelson yesterday against the proposed improvement of Duane street between Fifteenth and Seventeenth. The remonstrance sets forth that there is no immediate need of the street, and that, when improved, the street would become the dumping ground for old wagons, rubbish, etc. The remonstrants further state that the city now has more improved streets than it is able to care for, and suggests that the council would do better to keep those already constructed in good repair. It also suggested that the following improvements are of far more importance than that of Duane street: Duane street east of Twelfth, Thirteenth and Exchange west of Fourteenth.

Manager Campbell, of the Oregon & Oriental Steamship Company, has called for details in the case of the reported loss of the Eva. He says the ship and its cargo are fully covered by insurance, and in case it is lost, as reported, another will be built to take its place.

Rev. L. J. Trumbull, of the Baptist church, begins a new year of service with his people this week. He will preach Sunday morning on the subject of "The Light of the World," and speak in the evening about "The Heavenly Use of Earthly Things." All are cordially invited to attend.

Hon. Thomas H. Tongue spoke before the voters of Salem in the armory at that place on Thursday evening and a dispatch from that place says: Mr. Tongue made a powerful speech, covering the various questions now before the public. He devoted a large part of his speech to the economic and commercial conditions of the country, contrasted them under the administration of the Republican party and that of the Democratic, but he also treated at length in a masterly manner our position in the Philippine question, elucidating very clearly the doctrine of sovereignty and the "consent of the governed." This portion of the address was the best exposition of international law and theory of government ever listened to in this city. Mr. Tongue will appear before the voters of Clatsop county on Monday evening at the Republican headquarters in this city.

Astoria lost another of its oldest pioneer residents yesterday in the death at noon of Mrs. Fannie Clark Montgomery, who died at her home at Eighth and Duane streets, of heart failure and old age. She was born in Chelsea, Vermont, February 4, 1825, and was thus 75 years of age. She came to Astoria in 1859 via the Isthmus of Panama and was accompanied by her sister and brother-in-law, C. L. Parker. She was married in May of the same year to Almerin Montgomery who survives her. She has been a permanent resident of Astoria since her marriage. Besides her husband there survive one son, John A., and six grandchildren. She was one of the organizers of the Congregational church in this city as well as of the Women's Relief Corps and took active part in each. The funeral will be held from the house on Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock in time to take the 11:35 train for Ocean View, where the interment will take place. The services will be conducted by Rev. F. E. Dell, pastor of the Congregational church of this city, and the services at the grave will be private.

IRON COMES BACK. Consequent upon the recent high price of iron and steel a peculiar industrial condition has been brought to light by a shipment of iron from Japan to Seattle destined for the East. The same identical metal went to the Orient from that port last June and after crossing the ocean twice and paying all freight charges is now to be put on the American market and sold at a profit.

The shipment, which consists of several hundred tons, was made when iron was selling at a low price. The order was one that had been taken from an Oriental firm some months previous to its shipment, and the price at which it was booked is said to have been even less than the list at the time of the shipment. There is a greater profit to the Oriental merchant in shipping the iron back to this country than there is in holding it longer for sale in the home market. Owing to the unsettled condition of affairs in the Orient there has been a falling off in railroad construction, thus checking the demand for iron.

Cotton that was previously shipped from the United States to the Orient, is being shipped to Europe in large quantities and every shipment kills a sale in this country.

HON. JOHAN E. YOUNG.

Well-Known Young Lawyer of This City Passed Away Last Evening.

Hon. Johan Ellsworth Young, of this city, died of consumption at Klamath Falls at 5:35 o'clock last evening. He was attacked on Saturday last with hemorrhage, which continued at intermittent periods till his death. His sister, Clara, left this city on Wednesday evening to go to him and expected to reach Klamath Falls at 9 o'clock last evening and until she is heard from no definite arrangements as to the funeral can be made. The remains will be brought here for interment, however, and the announcement of the funeral will be made later.

The deceased was born in this city and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Benj. Young. He was 25 years of age and was a graduate of Washington & Lee College in Lexington, Virginia, where he studied law. He was one of the youngest students to graduate from that institution and was admitted to the bar of Oregon at the age of 21. He represented this district at the last session of the state legislature in 1898 and was deputy district attorney here for a period of one year. He was engaged in the exercise of his profession in this city up to five weeks ago when on account of his weakness of his lungs he was compelled to seek a higher altitude and went to Klamath Falls with the intention of locating there permanently as his health seemed much benefited by the change. According to letters received from him the business outlook there was very favorable for him and he seemed to be getting better in health and the news of his illness came as a very great shock to his people and was followed last evening by the telegram announcing his death. He was a young man of splendid ability, both as a lawyer and an orator, and was very popular in the community which will join his parents in sincerely mourning his untimely death.

Doings of the 12th Day of the September Term.

Circuit court convened yesterday morning for the twelfth day's session of the September term. The greater portion of the day was taken up considering the several divorce cases that came before the court. Following is the order of the day's business: Joseph Gribler vs. Grace Gribler—default and decree of divorce. Aleksandre Bergman vs. Victor E. Bergman—default and decree of divorce. Mabel Ellenburg vs. Robert Ellenburg—decree of divorce. Lizzie Peterson vs. John Peterson—default and decree of divorce. The plaintiff asked for the custody of the daughter, there being two children, a girl aged 13 years, and a boy of 10. She stated that she was able to and had supported the children for over a year and would be willing to take the boy till arrangements could be made whereby he could be taken by his father, who is thought to be living in Washington, having deserted his wife about a year and a half ago. She was given the custody of both children.

Hermosa Park Investment Co. vs. C. C. Grimes et al. This case arose from a dispute between the above named parties as to the exact location of a boundary line known as the north line of Elizabeth Lattie Donation Claim and the plaintiffs pray that the court appoint a commission to establish the boundary and fix it beyond dispute as provided by law. The plaintiff was allowed to file an amended complaint and the defendant allowed ten days to answer.

Peter Gruman, a native of Greece, was admitted to citizenship. Court was adjourned at 5 o'clock in the afternoon till December 21, when the court will meet for one day to consider further cases.
