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TEDDY CALLS VAN WYCK TO ORDER

Tells Mayor He Will Be Held Responsible for Lawlessness.

DEVERY'S ORDER RESCINDED

Chief of Police of New York City Had Threatened to Interfere With Deputies of State Superintendent of Elections.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., Nov. 5.—Governor Roosevelt sent the following communication tonight to Mayor Van Wyck, of New York:

"Sir, my attention has been called to an official order issued by Chief of Police Devery in which he directs his subordinates to disregard Chief of the State Election Bureau John McCullagh and his deputies.

"Unless you have already taken steps to secure the recall of this order it is necessary for me to point out that I shall be obliged to hold you responsible as head of the city government for the action of the chief of police if it should result in any breach of the peace and intimidation or any crime whatever against the election laws of the state and city.

"I will not fail to call to summary account either state or city authorities in the event of either being guilty of intimidation or connivance at fraud or failure to protect every legal voter in his rights.

"I, therefore, hereby notify you that in the event of any wrong doing following upon a failure immediately to recall Chief Devery's orders or upon any action or inaction on the part of Chief Devery, I must necessarily call you to account.

"THEODORE ROOSEVELT."

ORDER RESCINDED.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Governor Roosevelt's message to the Mayor was delivered to Mayor Van Wyck tonight. The mayor and chief of police were closeted together for an hour. At the conclusion of the conference Chief Devery announced that, in accordance with the mayor's orders, his orders issued Saturday to the captains regarding the McCullagh deputies and voters would be rescinded.

Later Mayor Van Wyck made the following statement:

"There will be no intimidation or violence at the election. It will pass off as quietly as that of a country village."

CHIEF DEVERY INDICTED.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The most interesting development in New York on the eve of election is the indictment found by the local grand jury against Chief of Police W. S. Devery on a charge of interfering with the work of Superintendent of State Election McCullagh. Chief Devery's hall was fixed and arrangements were made for a hearing of the case the day after election.

The indictment has created a great deal of excitement in police circles. The points involved appeared to hinge on the representations of men who swear in their votes when challenged by any deputies of the state superintendent of election. It is feared that a clash may occur at the polls tomorrow between the special force of 800 policemen and as many deputies.

WASHINGTON EXCITED.

Extensive Preparations for Receiving the Returns at the Nation's Capital.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Intense interest in the result of tomorrow's election is manifested in Washington. Never have preparations for receiving and displaying election returns been more complete than for tomorrow night.

SUICIDE OF A PAINTER.

Young Lady Became Insane Because Her Lover Killed His Brother.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—Word was received here today that Miss Ella Wright, of this city, a patient at an Elgin, Ill.,

asylum, had committed suicide Saturday by hanging herself with her bedclothes. She was a portrait painter and had been employed by Lutz Brothers, of Chicago. It is said she was in love with one of the partners who shot the other during a quarrel. The tragedy is alleged to have been the cause of her insanity.

Charles E. Lutz, who is probably referred to, during a dispute over money matters shot and seriously wounded his brother, Alfred D. Lutz, and shot the latter's wife dead on March 2. He was convicted in June and is now in the Joliet penitentiary serving a life sentence.

VISITORS FOR PATRICK.

Friends From Texas Call to See the Alleged Poisoner of Millionaire Rice.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Two men who said they were from Texas have been to the Tomb to see Albert T. Patrick, the lawyer charged with having forged the name of Millionaire Rice to a check.

These men profess to be old friends of the prisoner but said they were not relatives. The elder of them asked if he could see "Jack" Patrick. That was the name Patrick was familiarly known by at his home in Austin, Texas, and it was surmised that the visitors were the prisoner's father and brother.

Visitors are not admitted to the city prison on Sunday. The doorman said the men did not give their names but wanted Patrick to be told that two men interested in his welfare had come from Texas to see him. They left saying they would return today.

ELECTION WEATHER.

Fair Weather Predicted Throughout the Country Excepting in the Southwest.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Weather conditions and general forecast:

The storm center has moved to Nova Scotia and the pressure is generally high tonight in the Atlantic states and Canada. The weather has been entirely clear throughout the country except in northern and western New York, where there were light showers. In the Pacific coast and plateau regions the weather has been clear with little change in temperature.

Showers are probably due Tuesday in Montana, North Dakota, eastern Louisiana, continuing Wednesday over the two latter districts and extending over the southern portion of the west Gulf states. With these exceptions fair weather is indicated for Tuesday and Wednesday over the entire country.

WELCOME FOR KRUGER.

Municipal Council of Paris Will Give Him an Official Reception.

PARIS, Nov. 5.—The municipal council has adopted a motion expressing warm sympathy and admiration for the Boers, "in their heroic defense of their independence," and resolving that the president and other officers of the council will welcome Mr. Kruger at the station upon his arrival in Paris and shall invite him to an official reception.

PETITION DISMISSED.

New York Man Unable to Get Decree of Distribution of Montana Millionaire's Estate.

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—The Suffolk county court today dismissed a petition brought by H. A. Root, of New York, asking for a partial distribution in mass of the estate of the late Andrew J. Davis, a Montana millionaire, in accordance with a decree of the court in Montana which affirms the compromise.

PORTUGAL'S BRAVE QUEEN.

Rescued Her Boatman From Drowning at a Summer Resort.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—A dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from Lisbon says:

The queen of Portugal today at Cascais, a fashionable resort, made a thrilling rescue. Catalo Croom, her boatman, was capsized and was about to drown when the queen, who is an expert swimmer, sprang into the sea, swam to the boatman's side and held him up until some persons put out in boats and rescued both.

REPUBLICANS ARE CONFIDENT

McKinley Will Have a Vote Like That of 1896.

VIEWED STATE BY STATE

States Hitherto Doubtful Are Now Known to Be for Prosperity and the National Honor—Indiana Will Be Republican.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The following statement was given out tonight at the Republican national committee headquarters:

"There are few surface indications at this time dissimilar to those of four years ago, when McKinley swept this country by the greatest majority probably ever given to any presidential candidate. McKinley will carry every state which was for McKinley and Hobart four years ago and certainly seven or eight others that voted for Bryan in 1896."

"The alleged hopes of Croker and Bryan as to carrying Indiana and New York are simply following out the program of claiming everything in sight for the purpose of encouraging their followers in close states to make the most desperate efforts for success. The claims of Republicans are based upon the result of actual work reported by men in the field brought up through precinct, ward, township, city, county and state organizations and upon actual facts as shown by the closest vote poll ever made by any organization."

DEMOCRATIC VIEW.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—Chairman Jones of the Democratic national committee, gave out the following outlook on the eve of election:

"I have no doubt that the result of the ballot tomorrow will be the triumphant election of Bryan and Stevenson. Four years ago the Democratic party was deficient in organization whereas now it is perfectly organized and more effective than it has been in any campaign."

"The national committee has been in touch with every part of the country and is familiar with all details of the work. While the campaign fund has not been enriched by contributions of the great trusts, it has received the patriotic mills of the great working classes in sufficient quantity to defray the expenses of the campaign, which is more satisfactory than if it had been otherwise."

The country is now aroused as it has never been before since the great civil war and the result can be nothing less than the triumphant election of the national Democratic ticket."

SITUATION IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The Democrats are inclined to concede the state outside of Greater New York to McKinley by 50,000. This is 100,000 less than the Republicans allow McKinley in the same territory. Chairman Odell of the Republican committee said that McKinley would carry New York state by 100,000, Greater New York included.

There was very little betting done tonight on the election. The odds dropped to 3 to 1 on McKinley towards the latter part of the evening and remained there.

Richard Croker claims that Bryan will carry Greater New York by between 30,000 and 50,000. As a general thing the Republican leaders will not admit that the borough of Manhattan will be carried for Bryan by more than 30,000 plurality. Both sides claim the borough of Brooklyn, the Republicans by 12,000, the Democrats by 8000.

The population in the borough of Bronx, Queens and Richmond is relatively small. The Democrats and Republicans claim all three boroughs, but the Democrats usually carry Queens and Richmond; as to Bronx, the increase in population owing to the up-town movement has been so great that all estimates are worthless.

INDIANA FOR PROSPERITY.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 5.—Chairman Martin, of the Democratic state committee, tonight said:

"I believe Indiana will go Democratic by a very safe majority."

Chairman Charns, of the Republican state committee, said:

"It is a landslide. We will elect eleven congressmen sure. We will carry the state by not less than 40,000. We will elect the entire state and national tickets and will carry both branches of the legislature."

KENTUCKY GOVERNORSHIP.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 5.—It is generally believed that Bryan will run ahead of Beckman, Democrat, for governor, and that Yerkes, Republican, for governor, will run ahead of McKinley, whether the Democrats or Republicans carry the state.

OHIO FOR MCKINLEY.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 5.—All specu-

tion tonight is on the question of Democratic gains in the cities and Republican gains in the rural districts of Ohio. Republican State Chairman Dick says his poll shows over 50,000 for McKinley and seventeen of the twenty-one congressmen.

Democratic State Chairman Long claims Bryan will carry Ohio, "Unless prevented by coercion and purchase."

CHANCES EVEN IN IDAHO.

BOISE, Nov. 5.—Even bets are freely made tonight on the result of the election in this state. The most uncertain element in the situation appears to be Shoshone county, the scene of the riots of 1896.

MARYLAND UNCERTAIN.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 5.—The leaders of both political parties profess to be confident of victory and both sides are claiming the state by pronounced majorities.

The fusionists say Bryan will carry the state by at least 2000.

SOUTH DAKOTA REPUBLICAN.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Nov. 5.—The eve of election finds both parties still stoutly claiming that they will carry the state. Conservative Republicans estimate that the majority for their state ticket will be between 5000 and 6000 and that this majority will carry with it the congressional and state tickets and a comfortable majority on the joint ballot in the next legislature.

CALIFORNIA QUIET.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—The campaign in this state has been ended with little excitement. In this city there has been no general parade nor any attempt to combine the nightly political meetings into a big demonstration. The leaders of both parties seem equally confident and it is impossible from surface indications to predict the result of tomorrow's election. Chairman Stone, of the Republican state committee, in a signed statement declares that California will give McKinley at least 12,000 plurality and send a full Republican delegation to congress.

Chairman Sims, of the Democratic committee, states over his signature that Bryan will have 15,000 plurality in the state and that not less than four of the seven congressmen elected will be Democrats.

OFFICIALS GO HOME TO VOTE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Members of the cabinet like the president will be at their homes tomorrow to vote says a Washington special to the World. Secretary Hay is a resident of the District of Columbia and will have no vote in the selection of president. He will therefore remain as the sole representative of the administration in Washington on election day. Secretary Gage is now in the West but will so close his schedule as to be in Chicago in time to vote. Secretary Root will vote in New York City. Secretary Long when he left Washington for Colorado expected to return East in time to be at Hingham, Mass., his home, tomorrow.

Attorney-General Griggs is now at his home in Paterson, N. J., where he will remain till after he has cast his ballot. Secretary Hitchcock left on Friday for St. Louis, giving himself ample time to reach his home before election. Secretary Wilson, now in the West, will be at Traer, Ia., tomorrow when one more vote will be given for McKinley and Roosevelt.

There has been a general exodus of department clerks from Washington. Republicans and Democrats have been urged by their respective party leaders to go home to vote and the compliance with the requests has been quite general. The greatest efforts have been made to have residents of closely contested states like Kentucky, Maryland, West Virginia and Indiana return home to vote. Figures given by local railroad managers indicate that 12,000 voters had left Washington by last night.

LAST SPEECHES OF THE CAMPAIGN

McKinley Addressed His Fellow Townsmen.

BRYAN TALKED TILL TODAY

Roosevelt Wound Up Republican Campaign at Oyster Bay, Long Island, Before a Large Audience—Bryan Issues a Statement.

CANTON, O., Nov. 5.—The McKinley lawn, as in the campaign of 1896, was tonight the scene of an enthusiastic demonstration similar to that which closed the campaign of four years ago. The president was prevailed upon to depart from his rule which in the face of much pressure has been inflexible all through the campaign and he made a short address to his neighbors and fellow townsmen, free from partisanship but a propos of the election tomorrow.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Gov. Roosevelt wound up the Republican national campaign tonight by delivering an address at Oyster Bay, L. I., before one of the largest gatherings that ever assembled at that place.

BRYAN AT OMAHA.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 6.—Bryan closed the campaign here, making eight speeches tonight. He concluded at 12:45 o'clock this morning, and when he left the platform after 19 hours of consecutive work and an exceptional long and arduous campaign, his voice was still strong and clear and his physical condition first-class.

Bryan spent the remainder of the night after concluding his speeches in this city, intending to return to Lincoln early tomorrow morning to cast his vote.

He gave out the following statement: "The evidence is in, the arguments have been made and the case is now submitted to the jury. If the jury will accept the Declaration of Independence and the constitution of the United States as the instructions of the court there will be no doubt about the verdict."

"I hope that our people will vote early and then see that the vote is counted as cast."

TRANSVAAL PAVILION CLOSED.

Exposition Authorities Were Displeased at Inscriptions Insulting to England.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—A dispatch from Paris to the Herald says that the exposition authorities have closed the Transvaal pavilion because Mr. Pierson, the Transvaal commissary general, refused to remove the inscriptions insulting to England with which the walls are covered.

MANILA CUSTOMS.

Receipts for Month of October Break All Previous Records.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The war department today made public the following cablegram from Judge Taft, president of the Philippine commission:
