## LATER RETURNS INCREASE FIGURES

Democrats Concede 289 Electoral  
Votes to McKinley.

### BIG MAJORITY IN CONGRESS

Republicans Will Have a Majority of About  
Fifty in the House of Representatives  
and About Twenty in  
the Senate.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Dispatches to the Associated Press from 334 of the 357 congressional districts show that the Republicans have elected 191, the Democrats 140, the Silverites 2 and the Populists 1. Of the remaining 23 districts 11 are represented in the present house by Democrats, nine by Republicans, one by a Silverite and two by Populists.

The Democrats now concede 289 electoral votes to McKinley, but the Republicans figure on from eight to twelve more.

### NEXT NATIONAL SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The next senate, assuming that the state legislatures will fulfill their duty and choose senators to represent their states, will stand, on the basis of yesterday's election, 49 Republicans, 27 Democrats and 9 independents, with legislatures in doubt in three states with the privilege of electing four senators at this time. The legislatures in doubt are Delaware and Nebraska. In each of these states two senators are to be chosen and Idaho has one senatorial chair to be filled.

### NEBRASKA.

OMAHA, Nov. 7.—The election returns in Nebraska are so close as to be watched keenly. Chairman Lindsey, of the Republicans, claims tonight that McKinley carries the state by 7000 or more, that the Republican state ticket wins by 5000 to 7000 and that the Republicans have a majority of seven-tenths in the legislature. The Democrats claim Bryan has carried the state, though by a narrow margin of not over 1000, that the fusionists have a safe working majority in the legislature and that the Republican state officers have been elected by from three to five thousand. The legislature will be in doubt until complete returns are in. Indications are that it will be fusion by a small majority.

### MISSOURI.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 7.—The Democrats carried Missouri by 40,000 and elected thirteen out of fifteen congressmen.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 7.—Congressman Dockery, Democrat, is elected governor by about 35,000 plurality.

### KENTUCKY.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 7.—The Courier-Journal, with returns from 1700 out of 1884 precincts in Kentucky, puts Bryan's majority at 8000, and Beckham's, Democrat, for governor, at 4000. Louisville, Ky., Nov. 7.—At 10:30 p. m. with returns from all but 62 out of 1884 precincts in Kentucky, the Courier-Journal puts Bryan's majority at 7784 and Beckham's at 4608. The missing precincts are about evenly divided between the Democrats and Republicans. Leslie Combs, the Republican chairman, said: "We still believe that Yerkes

has been elected by a majority of 2000 votes."

### CALIFORNIA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—The majority for McKinley and Roosevelt in California continues to grow and indicates that it will reach 40,000. The Republicans have elected all seven congressmen. The legislature is Republican by a majority of thirty-six.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—McKinley's majority in this city is 9961.

### MINNESOTA.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 7.—Only one point not settled in the Minnesota election is the contest over the governorship. Everything has gone Republican by majorities so large that there is no possibility of a change. Both sides claim the governorship.

### IDAHO.

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 7.—Latest returns indicate the legislature will be fusion.

### TEXAS.

HOUSTON, Nov. 7.—The only Republican congressman from Texas has been replaced by a Democrat.

### MISSISSIPPI.

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 7.—The state is conceded to Bryan by 40,000.

### GEORGIA.

ATLANTA, Nov. 7.—Georgia gives Bryan a plurality of 40,000.

### FLORIDA.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 7.—Florida gives Bryan electors 22,000 majority.

### SOUTH CAROLINA.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 7.—Bryan's majority will not fall short of 30,000 in this state.

### LOUISIANA.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 7.—Bryan's majority in this state is 30,000.

### ARKANSAS.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 7.—Bryan carried Arkansas by about 55,000.

### NORTH CAROLINA.

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 7.—The Republicans carried two of nine congressional districts in this state and a third is very close. Bryan's majority in the state is about 30,000.

### MAINE.

PORTLAND, Me., Nov. 7.—McKinley's majority in Maine is about 23,500, a loss of 16 per cent since 1896 and a Bryan gain of 21 per cent.

### NEW HAMPSHIRE.

MANCHESTER, N. H., Nov. 7.—The Republican majority in this state will be 108,000.

### RHODE ISLAND.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 7.—The Republican majority in the state, with twenty-three towns to be heard from, is 15,000.

### MINNESOTA.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 7.—Governor Lind, Democrat, concedes his defeat for re-election.

### INDIANA.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—The Republicans have elected nine of thirteen congressmen with a fighting chance for two more.

### UTAH.

Returns are in from about three-quarters of the state. McKinley's majority is 4500. Wells, Republican candidate for governor, has a majority of 2000. The legislature will have a Republican majority of eleven on joint ballot.

## BRYAN IS GIVEN UP BY PETTIGREW

Dakota Senator Says a New  
Party Will Be Formed.

### CROKER STANDS BY BRYAN

Hanna Surprised by Heavy Republican Vote  
—Roosevelt Says McKinley Has  
Conquered Most Difficult  
Problem.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 7.—A Sioux Falls (S. Da.) special to the Dispatch says: "I predict the formation of a new party based on the protests of the outraged against Republicanism as taught by Hanna," declared United States Senator R. E. Pettigrew this morning. "Defeat is the more welcome to me, as it has come, than victory would have been if it came by endorsing the sort of policy which the Republican party represents."

"Yes, of course, I will be in the new party. What it will be called is of little moment. It may be called 'Social Labor' or it may be 'New Democratic.' It will be made up of persons discontented with the elements now in politics as a protest against existing conditions and the present tendency of things."

### BRYAN WILL NOT TALK.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 7.—William J. Bryan said this evening that he had no statement of any kind to make at present.

### CROKER HEARD FROM.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Mr. Croker is quoted as saying: "No power on earth—nothing but his death—can prevent Mr. Bryan from remaining the national leader of the people."

### ROOSEVELT REJOICES.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Governor Roosevelt was up in good season today. The governor said: "I rejoice beyond measure over the way the vote has gone. President McKinley had to face the most serious and complicated problem that has been faced by any president since Lincoln or by any president of the generation before Lincoln. "It seems to be a perfectly fair test of the way our people are willing to back up a man who has done such difficult and all-important work for the Nation."

### HANNA SURPRISED.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 7.—Senator Hanna found a perfect deluge of congratulatory telegrams piled on his desk today. The senator said: "It's a veritable Republican landslide. It's even better than I expected, especially in Indiana and Nebraska. The general result is indeed most gratifying."

### GERMANY DELIGHTED.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—The German government circles are all delighted at President McKinley's re-election.

### CANADIAN ELECTIONS.

Laurier Government Sustained by a Majority of 50 to 60 Members.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 7.—The result of today's election shows that the government has been sustained by a majority of from 50 to 60 members on the basis of returns received up to midnight and with five constituencies to be heard from. Today's elections were in 308 out of 313 constituencies of the dominion and the remaining five will hold their elections at a later date.

### BRITISH COLUMBIA DISAGREES.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 7.—British Columbia has not joined in the general approval of the Laurier government, expressed by the eastern provinces of Canada in today's election. Six seats in the house of commons are allotted to British Columbia and in two of these constituencies the election has been deferred for one month. Of four British Columbia seats contested today two returned conservatives, one labor, with a conservative

leaning, and one liberal. The two remaining constituencies are expected to return supporters of the government at the deferred election.

ELECTION IN PORTO RICO.  
Republican Landslide Reached San Juan de Porto Rico.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Nov. 7.—It is estimated that 75,000 Republicans voted at the election yesterday for commissioner to congress and members of the house of delegates. Not more than 2000 federals voted. The election was exceedingly orderly.

### MINE CAVED IN.

Three Washington Miners Killed by the Giving Away of a Supporting Beam.

TACOMA, Nov. 7.—A cave-in at mine No. 7, Carbonado, yesterday, resulted in the death of three mine employees. The dead are: Karl Huhtela, Matti Leedem, Gust Sandberg.

The accident was caused by the giving away of one of the large supporting beams. About fifty men were working in the mine at the time.

### YOUNG LADY MURDERED.

Leavenworth Girl Strangled by Some Person Unknown.

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., Nov. 7.—The dead body of Pearl Forbes, aged 20, was found near her home in this city this morning. Marks on her throat indicate that she has been murdered by strangulation. There is no clue to the murderer.

### BRITISH SHOOT BOXER CHIEFS.

They Had Destroyed a Chapel and Killed Native Christians.

TAKU, Nov. 7.—A British column under General Richardson left Pao Ting Fu, October 28, marching in the direction of Pekin. At Tung Ming the troops tried three Boxer chiefs, destroyers of a chapel and killers of native Christians. The British shot the chiefs.

### BLIZZARD IN MINNESOTA.

Weather Has Turned Cold and Heavy Snow Storms Are Reported.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—A blizzard is bearing down upon this section. The weather has turned cold and heavy snow storms are reported from various places.

## ROGERS CHOSEN FOR GOVERNOR

Only Democrat Elected on Wash-  
ington State Ticket.

### PLURALITY HERE INCREASED

Oregon Gives McKinley Over 40,000 Votes,  
14,000 More Than Bryan—Woolley  
Gets Over 1200 and Debs  
Nearly a Thousand.

SEATTLE, Nov. 7.—Nearly complete returns from three-fourths of the counties of the state and estimates from the remainder indicate that McKinley will carry the state by about 10,000.

Rogers, Democrat, for governor, is about 600 ahead of Frink, and indications are that he has been elected. Jones and Cushman, Republicans, are elected to congress by good majorities, though somewhat less than McKinley. The entire Republican state ticket, with the exception of Frink for governor, is probably elected by majorities of two to six thousand. The Democrats concede that McKinley has carried the state.

Democrats are positive that Governor Rogers, fusionist, has been re-elected by from 500 to 1000 votes. The Republicans still profess to believe that their candidate, Frink, will pull through with several hundred votes to spare.

PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—Practically one-half of the state of Washington has been reported and shows the following: McKinley, 27,441; Bryan, 20,061. For governor—Frink, Republican, 23,906; Rogers, Democrat, 22,763. Frink's plurality, 273.

The vote for governor is very close and it will require a more complete count to determine the result. West of the Cascade mountains late returns have raised Frink's vote.

TACOMA, Nov. 7.—The entire Republican county ticket in Pierce county is elected.

SPOKANE, Nov. 7.—The count is proceeding slowly. Enough returns are in to show that Rogers has probably carried Spokane county by 1300 plurality. McKinley carried the county by 384.

SEATTLE, Nov. 7.—Rogers will have a plurality of about 400 in King county.

TACOMA, Nov. 7.—In 82 out of 86 precincts of Pierce county, McKinley has 5763, Bryan 3723; Rogers, Democrat, 5030, Frink, Republican, 4587. Cushman and Jones, Republicans, for congress, will carry the county by about 2700 majority.

PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—The nearly complete vote of Oregon gives McKinley 40,527; Bryan 28,180; Woolley, 1247; Barker 125; Debs 854. The McKinley plurality is 12,347. Estimating unreported precincts gives McKinley a plurality of 14,225.
