Mrs. W. G. Anderson, who has been visiting her mother, Mrs. Norton, and sister, Miss Norton, for several weeks past, returned yesterday morning on the Columbia to her home in San Francisco.

The boat that was received recently by the first department, in place of that condemned from the purchase of 1900 feet, was tested yesterday by Chief Stockton, with the result that it was accepted.

T. E. Kegan has returned from Alaska, where he has been during the past summer as manager of the Chilcoot Packing Co.'s cannery. He will leave soon for the East, where he goes to spend the winter.

The British ship Langdale was reported outside late yesterday afternoon and will probably arrive in this morning. She comes from Liverpool, 125 days out, and is consigned to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. at Portland.

The coast schooner Tam O'Shanter has finished loading lumber at Knappton and left out for San Francisco yesterday morning. The Francisco Toso will finish loading today and probably leave out in a day or two.

The steamer Columbia left out for San Francisco at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. She had 7500 bushels of wheat and a cargo of general merchandise on board. She added several to her passenger list at this port.

At the meeting of the Port of Portland commission, held Thursday, officers were elected for the ensuing year, and a resolution passed directing the executive committee to procure plans and specifications for a new dredge.

Custom House Inspectors McLean and Crosby went to Warrenton yesterday noon to measure the launch being built by O. P. Graham for James Keating. The launch will probably be completed early in December. The inspectors returned on the afternoon train.

The ratification parade next Tuesday evening promises to be one of the finest affairs of its kind ever held in this city. There will be music, noise and torchlight galore and the merchants of the city are expected to put out a long procession of floats and everybody will turn out.

The Norwegian steamship Scarpso is due to arrive down the river this morning. She has a cargo valued at \$100,000, consisting largely of flour and the balance in fruit and bicycle sundries. She goes to Hong Kong and way ports.

William Vincent, aged about 60 years, died at the hospital Thursday evening. He is survived by a widow, Mr. Vincent was a long-time resident of this city and was one of the first ones interested in smeltering salmon for the market. The funeral will probably be held tomorrow.

The members of the county commission court, Judge Gray and Messrs. Young and Peterson, expect to start this morning out over the line of the proposed road that is being surveyed between this city and the county line at Vesper. They will also examine some bridges that are in need of repairs and examine into several places where the people are asking for bridges.

The Canadian government steamer Quadia, which left Victoria several days ago for the north, ostensibly in the interest of the lighthouse service, is reported to be under sealed orders. One of the objects of her cruise, which will be as far north as Queen Charlotte Sound, is said to be to run down American smugglers and coast pirates, who are operating in small schooners and sloops. Should she succeed in her mission, international complications may be looked for.

The Buckingham is still at her dock in Portland, but will probably get down the river today. She was delayed because of an accident having been met with by First Mate James Mackintosh, who fell from the ship to the dock Wednesday night. He is now at the St. Vincent's hospital and will not go with the steamer to Manila.

The new four-masted schooner Oliver J. Olsen was launched at Aberdeen Thursday. She was built by Winny Bros., of San Francisco, and will be used in the lumber trade. She was named after the skipper who will command her. He is twenty-four years of age, and said to be the youngest captain on the coast. Her dimensions are: length, 135 feet; 25.5 feet beam and 14 feet depth of hold. Her cost complete will be \$44,000.

Unusual interest, which promises a large attendance, centers around the meeting of the State Dairy Association, which will be held in Hillsboro, on January 3rd and 4th. President Paulsen, of Washington county, and Secretary F. L. Kent, of Corvallis, are arranging a program that is intended to eclipse previous ones. In order to meet the present advanced needs of the business the officers of the association propose to secure upon the program the most progressive thinkers and experts in the different branches of dairying. They want to disseminate practical knowledge that will prove of some benefit to those who attend.

The Norwegian steamship Bergenhus, of the California & Oriental Steamship Co.'s line, arrived in port at noon yesterday. As there is some difficulty with the cable between the lookout station, she arrived in before she was announced and had to wait a short time for a pilot to go up the river. She is bound from San Francisco to Hong Kong via Portland, at which port she will complete her cargo. She already has \$5,000 sacks of flour and a partial cargo of general merchandise. She has on board one Chinese woman who was deported from San Francisco. The Bergenhus is under charter to the Portland Flouring Mills to load the balance, 3000 tons of flour.

Fish Commissioner Reed returned to Portland after voting here and is busy with the work of transferring salmon eggs to the various hatcheries. Within the next ten days Mr. Reed expects to add perhaps 1,000,000 eggs to the supply at the Stuslaw hatchery. These eggs will also be taken from the Little White Salmon station. There are at present about 200,000 eggs at the Stuslaw hatchery. It is doubtful whether Mr. Reed will be able to get any eggs to the Coos Bay hatchery, owing to the difficulty of transporting them. There are from 600,000 to 700,000 eggs at the Coos Bay hatchery now, but as it has a capacity for 2,000,000, it will be very desirable to increase the supply there.

Mr. Reed reported that the government hatchery on the Clackamas river, which has a capacity for several million more, being at present only about half stocked.

A CLOSE CALL.

A curious instance is cited by the captain of the big four masted bark Kenilworth, of the vessel coming near being wrecked by a meteor. It was at 9 a. m. and off the Horn. The ship was under upper topsails and all hands were on deck. Suddenly a meteor came out of a thunder cloud and for a moment it was thought the Kenilworth would be struck. "It came exactly in our direction," said Captain Taylor, "and for a few moments I thought we would be struck. I could hear the whizz of the lump of molten matter as it came through the air and I saw the bulk of my men were on their knees when it struck the water. To tell you the truth, I was a little bit shaky about the knees myself. The meteor struck the water about nine feet off the starboard bow and as the water splashed up a big sigh came up from my lungs. It was the narrowest escape I have ever had in twenty-five years of sea life."
