J. R. Thomas, of Port Angeles, has been appointed by the U. S. board as third keeper at the Tatoosh Island light to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Keeper Nelson, who was drowned a few days ago.

A full pardon was granted Thursday by Governor Geer to Otis Savare, a young man who in November, 1894, was sentenced to four years' imprisonment in the penitentiary for robbing the Pacific Express Company's office at The Dalles.

Testimony was taken yesterday in probate court in the case of H. F. L. Logan vs. the Heerman estate. A claim was disallowed by the administrator and an appeal from his decision was taken to the court. The matter was taken under advisement.

After considerable difficulty a jury has been secured in the trial of Gates and Olsen at South Bend, who are charged with murdering William Beeson last August. Drs. Grawell and Nickly, who made a post-mortem examination, testified to finding a cut on the dead man's neck, which severed the facial artery, a puncture in one hand made by a gaff hook or other pointed instrument, and two contusions on the head, made by an oar or club. One hundred witnesses are in attendance, most of them being for the prosecution.

Mayor Bergman yesterday signed the ordinance confirming the assessment made for the improvement of Franklin avenue from Thirty-first street to the claim line. Several of the property owners who objected to the assessment have filed applications to take advantage of the ten-year installment plan, so no further trouble is anticipated.

J. W. Bales, who was injured on the A. & C. R. R. trestle on Thursday is considerably improved and his injuries are not now thought to be serious. It seems that the timbers on which the men were working gave way and several of the men were precipitated into the water and there were some narrow escapes from drowning. Mr. Bales was struck by the falling timber.

The local football team is doing some very good work and should be properly encouraged by the support of the people of this city. The receipts of the last game were insufficient to meet the expenses of bringing the team here from Portland and the home team is left to bear the expense. If the people are interested in athletics they should offer some encouragement in the way of better attendance at the games.

The Astoria football eleven will meet the North Pacific Dental College eleven on the A. F. C. grounds in this city this afternoon. The dental college has a good team this year and the game promises to be fast and furious. The line up of the local team is essentially the same as in the last game with the exception of Halderman being put on as left tackle in place of Hunt. The game will be called at 2:30 p. m.

Clarke Lyons was crushed by an elevator in the Masonic building at Portland Thursday night, and sustained internal injuries from which he died shortly afterward at the Good Samaritan hospital. He was the janitor for the Union Pacific ticket office. He got on the elevator in the basement and attempted to leave it upon the first floor, while it was moving, without having notified the operator. He was 35 years of age and leaves a wife and two children.

I. Edmond Westbostad, who was injured on Thursday while working on the jetty at Fort Stevens, died at the hospital at the fort yesterday morning. Several ribs were broken and he was badly injured internally, besides having his skull crushed. The blow on his head rendered him delirious and it is not thought that he was conscious of much pain. His parents reside in Norway. The remains were brought to Pohl's undertaking parlors and the funeral will probably be held tomorrow.

The government transport Almond Branch, Captain Anderson, finished loading at Tacoma and sailed for Manila early yesterday morning. Her total cargo comprises about 6000 tons, taken entirely from the Tacoma quartermaster's storehouse. Captain Anderson has been literally swamped with Christmas presents consigned to soldiers in the Philippines, a large number of people having availed themselves of this opportunity to remember relatives and friends in the far off islands.

The hop crop of the state of Washington for the year 1900, according to a recent estimate, was 35,000 bales. Of this amount Western Washington produced 20,000 and the Yakima country 15,000 bales. On November 10 there was unsold in the state, of this crop, about 10,000 bales. The prices received by the hop men varied from 10 to 15¢ cents per pound. At present the market stands at 13 to 15¢ cents, according to quality. At the ruling prices the crop of Western Washington realized the hop men about half a million dollars. Over half of the shipments have been consigned to London.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore arrived in yesterday morning from Tillamook. Just before she left that port there was a heavy run of chums and as the cannery at that place had closed the Elmore brought a quantity of the fish here to help the fishermen out. The fish were taken from the water after 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon and by that time yesterday were nearly all in cans. They were brought to Kinney's cannery for the Columbia River Packers' Association. The pack at Tillamook this year has been very small on account of the light run of fish. The Elmore also brought a small quantity of canned salmon.

The owners of the iron foundry at Oswego are wrestling with the problem of breaking up 450 tons of old cannon metal taken from Fort Stevens, at the mouth of the Columbia river. These cannon have outlived their usefulness, and are now only fit for the furnace to be melted up and converted into iron pipes, or some other article of usefulness. While these cannon have never been in action while guarding the mouth of the Columbia, their presence there, no doubt, subserved a useful purpose. They filled the bill of

watch dogs of the commerce of the Columbia river, even though silent, and could not doubt have done more than this had commerce been threatened by invasion. A portion of the broken guns were taken through here on Monday.

The transport Thyra has arrived at Manila. She left this port in October with 500 horses destined for the troops in the Philippines. She lost one horse through colic. This was the maiden trip of the Thyra and the result is gratifying to those interested. The Thyra and the Lennox now stand on an equality regarding the records of their maiden trips to the islands. On the first trip of the Lennox but one horse was lost. The animal had sustained a broken ankle while being loaded aboard at Portland, and when two days off the mouth of the river his condition was such that it was deemed advisable to end his sufferings. No animals have yet been lost on the Lennox through sickness, the one horse being the sum total of her loss.

What may prove to be an important industry has been discovered in the presence of the sardine herring on the Sound. The matter is under expert investigation and if the result shows the fish to be in sufficient quantities a sardine plant will be established and the industry developed. The fish are said to be superior in quality to those found along the North Atlantic coast. If the outcome is successful it will no doubt lead to more thorough investigation of the presence of the same fish in the Columbia. Immense shoals of them were noticed here in the river this fall, especially along the north channel, and a large number of whales found their way into the river attracter no doubt by the presence of these small fish on which they feed.

TO PROTECT SALMON INDUSTRY.

What the Authorities Are Doing to Keep Up This Important Branch of the State's Resources.

Oregon is beginning to wake up to the necessity of aiding in the propagation of salmon if she wishes to preserve the industry in this state. This season something over 14,000,000 small salmon will be turned loose in the rivers of the state.

The upper Clackamas hatchery, with a capacity of 10,000,000 eggs, will probably turn out 2,500,000 small fry. The Salmon river hatchery will turn out 2,000,000. It has a capacity for about 5,000,000 eggs at present, but is so arranged that its capacity can be easily doubled, trebled or quadrupled. The Siuslaw hatchery has a capacity of 2,000,000 eggs, and although not thoroughly stocked yet State Fish Commissioner Reed expects to get enough more eggs from the Little White Salmon hatchery in Washington to bring its probable output this year up to 2,000,000 small fry. The Umpqua and Coos bay hatcheries, with a capacity of 1,000,000 eggs each, will probably turn out 800,000 small fish each. These five hatcheries are state institutions, and under the direct supervision of the state fish commissioner.

In addition to these there are two government hatcheries in the state and one private. The government hatchery, on the Clackamas river, with a capacity of 2,000,000 eggs, is expected to turn out as many fish. The government station located on the upper Rogue river, has a capacity of about 5,000,000 eggs, while the Hume hatchery, a private concern on the lower Rogue river, has a capacity of about 2,500,000 eggs. The continued output of the two last-named hatcheries will be in the neighborhood of 3,000,000 fish. Should these estimates be realized, Oregon's artificial propagation machinery will add 14,100,000 young fish to the salmon industry of the Columbia and other Oregon waters.

The total present capacity of Oregon's hatcheries is about 35,500,000 eggs.
