Three vessels were reported outside yesterday at 4 o'clock. One is the Peter Rickmers, another the Antelope and the identity of the third is not known.

The work of shipping the new propeller for the steamship Norman Isles has been completed at Portland. She is now loading lumber at the North Pacific mills.

A deed was filed for record yesterday whereby Chas. A. McGuire sells his property at Seaside, including the hotel and store buildings to A. C. Fisher of this city for \$3,113.4.

A successful trip has been made down the Mississippi river by a steel whale-back. It is a very large carrier. It is 265 feet long, 40 feet beam and 14 feet deep. It runs along almost wholly on the surface of the water.

Fritz Sovey sustained a fracture of the right arm late yesterday afternoon while engaged in playing football. The fracture was just above the wrist and on the same arm that he had one time previously fractured at the elbow.

The Norwegian steamship Kvarven cleared yesterday afternoon from Portland for Hong Kong. She carried a cargo valued at \$1,594. It consisted of 25,700 barrels of flour, valued at \$50,592; 6,000 feet of rough lumber, valued at \$600, and six boxes of green apples, valued at \$12.

The German bark Elbick, with a general cargo from Antwerp, arrived in port yesterday afternoon after a passage of 127 days. On September 2 the third mate, Otto Albrecht, died of fever and was buried at sea. The Elbick is consigned to Balfour, Guthrie & Co., and is under charter to that firm to load grain for Europe.

The British ship Melanope was reported sold at San Francisco for \$53,700 Wednesday. The purchasers being the John Hosenfeld Company. This is said to be the highest price ever paid for a vessel at a court sale in the Bay City. The second high price recorded is that of \$45,225, which was given for the steamship Willamette Valley some years ago.

The Fullwood, from Hong Kong for Table Bay, is posted at 25 per cent re-insurance. She is out 108 days. The British ship Yarnara, from Suez, is out for Iquique, is out 162 days, and re-insurance is being asked at the rate of 30 per cent. The Yarnara is well known here, having sailed out several times. She was commanded by Captain Robinson.

Chief Kauffman, of Walla Walla, is suffering from a bad arm, the result of blood poisoning. About a week ago he had a scuffle with a man named W. H. Eakin, who was trying to take to the station. The man in some way scratched his arm. He thought nothing of it at the time, but what it is feared may result in a severe case of blood poisoning has set in.

James Buckley accidentally fell from the O. R. & N. dock yesterday afternoon and striking the fender of the steamer Harrison was precipitated into the water. He was fished out and taken to the hospital where it was found that he had fractured several ribs. One of them had evidently penetrated one of his lungs and caused the man intense suffering.

Oscar Laurain, who was severely injured at the Clatsop mill on Tuesday evening died at the hospital yesterday morning at 4 o'clock. He had never recovered from the shock of the accident and his death had been expected for a week or more. His funeral will be held this afternoon at 1 o'clock from Pohl's undertaking parlors and the interment will be in Greenwood cemetery.

The Statesman says: Mrs. Mary Ellen Lease has begun suit for divorce against her husband, Charles Lease, at Wichita, Kas. This may be a happy re-lease for him, because he says he was getting tired of being referred to as the "husband of Mrs. Lease." He said that she was a very bright woman, so far as learning went, but that she was no kind of a wife for him. They have been married twenty-seven years.

A letter received by L. O. Belland of this city contains the following in regard to the recent changes in the king of Norway's cabinet: Vest, Nysen, Thiesen and Locken have resigned and the king has appointed the following gentlemen to fill the vacancies: Walter Kanaw, Landbrugsmister (secretary of agriculture), born in 1847; Soren Knaw, Landbrugsmister (secretary of treasury), born 1848; Hans Georg Jacob Stang, Kirkesmister (secretary of war), born 1858; Christian Sparre, born 1859, to represent Norway at Stockholm, Sweden.

The county commissioner's court held a short session yesterday afternoon with Judge Gray and Commissioner Peterson present. Very little business was brought before the court with the exception of the report that the Upper Necanicum bridge three miles below Seaside had been carried away early yesterday morning. C. L. Houston was sent down to ascertain the extent of damages. The court decided to advertise for bids to be opened at the regular session of the county court on December 5th. The contract will call for the completion of the structure on or before December 15. The notice to contractors will be found in another column.

A hand car manned by a white section gang collided with the engine that was switching just below the depot preparatory to leaving for Seaside about half past 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The hand car was going up toward the depot and the men were evidently under the impression that the engine was backing in the same direction and so that they did not perceive their mistake till too late to avert the catastrophe. The car was badly shaken up and the men were thrown off. One of the men was hurled clear overboard into the water and mud below. In spite of the rather rough handling no one was hurt beyond a few bruises and a thorough shaking up.

One man was killed and another quite badly injured at Stella yesterday while loading a barge with piles for the government work on the jetty at Fort Stevens. The men were brought down last night on the steamer Bailey Gatzert and the injured man was taken to Pohl's undertaking parlors. Just how the accident occurred could not be definitely ascertained, but it was stated that one of the piles slipped in some way and fell, striking the two men. The man who was killed was named Gray.

The San Francisco report of the salmon market says there is only a nominal business doing. British Columbia chums have been withdrawn by the packers, but are still on offer in a large way here at 35 cents while American chums are bid for 37 1/2. Other quotations as last given still hold good. It is understood that all of the Alaska pack is now in except one vessel with about 30,000 cases for the Alaska Packers' Association, and the estimate given six weeks ago, of 1,250,000 for the total Alaska pack, holds good. The heavy export business of the season will be concluded with two vessels that are about to load, for London and Liverpool.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

Candidates for the Office of City Attorney and Police Commissioner as Well as Three Councilmen Nominated.

The delegates elected at Friday's primaries met in regular convention yesterday morning at the court house at 10:00 o'clock and nominated candidates to be voted for at the coming city election to be held on Wednesday, December 12.

Candidates for the office of city attorney, police commissioner and for three vacancies on the common council were named.

The convention was called to order by James W. Welch, chairman of the city central committee. F. J. Taylor was chosen as temporary chairman and F. P. Leinenweber as temporary secretary. Committees were appointed as follows:

On credentials—G. C. Fulton, James W. Welch and George A. Nelson.

On order of business—F. L. Parker, W. F. McGregor and J. T. Lighter.

On platform—W. F. McGregor, A. Danielson and Thomas Mott.

James W. Welch was appointed to the seat of C. J. Curtis, Mr. Curtis having signified his unwillingness to take part in the proceedings.

The committee on order of business reported recommending:

First, the election of officers by confirmation of the temporary officers; Second, nominations for city offices, as follows:

City attorney, police commissioner, councilman from sixth ward; Third, the selection of a city central committee, to be made up of three members from each ward.

For the office of city attorney there was but one nomination, James W. Welch, and for the office of police commissioner, Mr. Eakin was the unanimous choice.

W. B. Painter named G. O. Moen for police commissioner. Mr. Moen was declared the unanimous choice.

G. C. Fulton offered a resolution authorizing the city central committee to fill any vacancies which might occur on the ticket. The resolution was adopted.

In selecting candidates for the council the delegation from each ward went into caucus and the men chosen were ratified by the convention. Candidates were selected as follows:

First ward—A. McPharlin; Second ward—Fred J. Johnson; Third ward—Charles Goddard.

The following city central committee was named by Chairman Taylor:

S. G. Trullinger, L. E. Hower, G. C. Fulton, James W. Welch, August Danielson, W. L. Robb, John Nordstrom, W. F. McGregor and F. P. Leinenweber.

The report of the committee on platform was as follows:

We, the Republicans of the City of Astoria, in convention assembled, congratulate the people throughout the United States on the unexampled prosperity of the people and the sound financial condition of our government; and the Republican party upon the overwhelming majority received by its candidate for the great office of president of the United States, against the combined forces of populism, socialism, anarchy and the latter day saints of democracy, thereby vindicating those great principles of sound government announced and practiced by the Republican party in the past, and an expression of confidence in that party in the future.

We hold that the various offices of the city, as those of the Nation, should be filled with those Republicans receiving the endorsement of the Republican party, in preference to those selected by a small coterie of politicians, having only in view their own personal aggrandizement and spoils of office.

We pledge to the people of Astoria, an honest economical and business-like administration of the affairs of the city.

That all money received by the city shall be honestly and faithfully accounted for, and no money shall be expended for any purpose whatever, until after careful consideration and the exercise of good business judgment, and for such purposes only, as authorized by law.

That taxation shall always be at the minimum, taking into consideration the needs and necessities of our growing commercial city.

We respectfully call upon all citizens, regardless of political affiliations

to join with us in support of these salutary principles.

G. O. Moen, who was appointed to this office of police commissioner by the mayor and confirmed by the council at a special meeting of that body, refused to accept the nomination tendered him by the convention and a meeting of the city central committee was called yesterday afternoon. W. F. McGregor was chosen chairman and F. P. Leinenweber secretary. In accordance with the power vested in them by resolution of the convention the central committee nominated D. H. Welch as the regular Republican candidate for the office of police commissioner in place of G. O. Moen.

The Brooklyn bridge is being weakened by electrolysis. Its four great cables are live wires through which wildcat currents are constantly flowing. The town of Nanaimo, B.
