Three square-rigged vessels, two barkas and a ship were reported from the heads at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It was not possible to ascertain what they were.

Mr. and Mrs. S. Danziger leave tomorrow for San Francisco, where Mr. Danziger goes in connection with his business. They will be absent from the city for several months.

Judge Gray and Commissioner Peterson and Young are in Seaside, where they went yesterday, to inspect the bridge across the Upper Necanicum, recently completed by Contractor Houston. They will return this morning.

Mr. Fred Leinenweber, who has during the last four years filled the position of shipping clerk at the A. & C. wharf in this city has accepted a position in Portland and will leave tomorrow for the scene of his new duties.

Dr. W. C. McKelvie, of Vancouver, B. C., who has been the guest of his brother, F. W. McKelvie, of Astoria, will leave for his home in Vancouver tomorrow evening for several days.

The torpedo-boat destroyer Goldsborough made a preliminary trial trip on Saturday afternoon. No attempt at speed was made. The vessel behaved well and returned to the dock without accident. The final trip will be made soon.

The barge Washougal was towed around to Youngs bay yesterday morning and will be placed on the beach there to have her bottom examined to see what kind of damage it received during her recent trip to San Francisco with a cargo of lumber.

The revenue cutter Perry, which sailed from this port last week in search of missing vessels made a cruise of several days up the coast and on Saturday arrived in at Seattle to replenish her supply of coal. As soon as a new supply of coal is taken on the cutter will leave out to continue the search and is probably out at present.

The steamship Robert Adamson arrived in from Nanaimo, B. C., at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon and left up the river at 7:30 yesterday morning. She was delayed a number of days by the heavy weather and had to leave out from that port until long after having been reported out by her owners, creating the impression that she was nearly a week overdue.

Bids were opened yesterday afternoon by Constructing Quartermaster Downs for grading around the new hospital recently erected at the Fort Stevens barracks. Five bids were received as follows: Lars Berens, \$94; Ferguson & Houston, \$485; W. A. Goodin, \$465; J. W. Suprenant, \$485; E. E. Lacy, \$347.50. Captain Downs submitted the bids to the department at Washington without recommendation.

The will of the late Mrs. Narcissa White Kinney provides among other bequests \$500 for the Astoria Public Library, \$500 for the National W. C. T. U., and also \$500 for the state organization W. C. T. U. Mrs. Kinney, during her life-time, was very liberal with her charities, where she deemed the cause deserving and this closing act of her life conforms admirably with the generous sympathy that has marked her whole career.

Saturday Governor T. T. Geer, Secretary of State F. L. Dunbar and State Treasurer Chas. S. Moore, acting as the state board of levy, after examining the data supplied them by S. A. Koser, bookkeeper of the state department, formally determined and announced a tax levy of 5.7 mills upon the assessed valuations of the property in the state. Last year's levy was 4.3 mills. Clatsop county will furnish \$15,310.29 of the \$71,487.76 revenue to be raised this year.

That the salmon industry of Puget sound will become virtually extinct in a few years, and that the same industry in Alaska waters will be destroyed with a decade or two, is the firmly expressed opinion of H. M. Kutchnin, the special agent of the treasury department, sent to Alaska last summer to investigate the subject. Mr. Kutchnin several weeks ago sent a preliminary report to the department, and this has been followed by a very bulky report which treats of the whole matter in a very exhaustive manner.

Prolonged speculation as to the fate of the United States mail steamer Tillamook has come to a sudden termination with an authentic announcement that the vessel was wrecked. November 27, on Wood Island reef, near Kodiak, Alaska. No lives were lost. The crew and passengers of the ill-fated craft came south on the steamship Senator, Captain J. B. Patterson, which arrived at Seattle about noon Saturday last, and with details of the disaster. The Tillamook is a total loss. She is owned by Swagins & Hoyt at San Francisco.

Notice is given by the light-house board that, on January 16, 1901, Unadilla Reef light vessel No. 67, broken adrift from her station about 3 1/2 miles from Cape Alaya, Washington, and about 4 1/2 miles west-southwestward from the cape. She is now at Port Angeles, Washington, and will be replaced on her station as soon as practicable.

Louis Anderson, a young man who resides in Uppertown, was taken in charge by the sheriff on Sunday on account of being rather unsound mentally. He had been acting peculiarly for some time and it is reported became unbalanced over religion. The sheriff was notified of his condition and Deputy Sheriff went up and found him at the Norwegian church. He was brought down and placed in the county jail. Yesterday he was brought before the county court and it was finally decided to take him to the hospital which was done. It was thought that perhaps he might recover but the hospital in the afternoon gave up the contract of keeping him there and he was returned to the county jail. He was probably ordered sent to the state asylum on the return of Judge Gray from Seaside this morning.

While returning from Uppertown between 11 and 12 o'clock last evening Ed. Parker had reached a point near the Clatsop mill when a man stepped from behind a post and struck him in the back throwing him to his hands and knees. Parker, in rather a dazed condition and not being stunned sprang quickly to his feet and tackled his assailant and a wrestling match lasting for a minute or two was had. Parker finally, watching his opportunity, forced the other man back to the railing by the side of the roadway and by a clever move threw him bodily overboard into between three and six feet of water. Some ten or twelve feet below. The would-be robber evidently didn't like his bath for, after some splashing around, he managed to make the shore a few rods away and climbed out. Parker then came on down town and sent an officer up after the footpad.

There were two cases before the police court yesterday afternoon. Both men denied being drunk. One was the man who came near being crushed by the falling of the Eagle canary on Saturday and the shock of the matter caused an attack of heart failure. He took something for it at the advice of a friend and when he came to he found himself in the city jail. He was released on a \$1000 bond and the peace of a Sabbath morn. He, however, did not care to call in the city physician for an examination so as his fine was remitted on account of having spent two days in jail he went home. The other man wasn't drunk, either. He just got tired. His tiredness reached such a stage, however, that the officer had to ring up the station on a freight truck. As was said, he wasn't full. He admitted the fact that he wasn't, himself. His name was John Doe.

Mrs. Julia A. Anderson, widow of the late J. A. Anderson, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. F. J. Taylor, in this city, on Sunday evening, after a long illness, of consumption. Mrs. Anderson was 65 years of age and with the exception of a short time in California, has been a resident of Oregon for over 30 years. She was born in Canada just across the river from Detroit but removed soon with her parents to Illinois, where she lived until she came to this state. She has been in quite feeble health for several months and had numerous sinking spells, but had recovered. So when she came on Sunday she was ready and willing to go. She was taken a few weeks ago to the Sanitarium at Portland but found no relief and was brought back to this city. Besides Mrs. Taylor, who leaves another daughter, Mrs. Alena Fox, of this city, both of whom were with her to the end. Private services were held at the house yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock and today she will be taken to Portland, where the interment will take place.

The German steamship Milos, 26 days from Kobe, that arrived a full cargo of general Oriental merchandise and is under charter to T. M. Stevens & Co. After discharging her cargo she will load outward, mostly flour. She had a decidedly rough time of it on her way and the weather was such that a squeak toward running out of coal as a vessel that has made this port in a long time. By sheer good fortune the Milos was sighted by the pilot boat while the latter was 50 miles off the mouth of the river on Friday night. She was signalled and Pilot Wood went aboard. The pilot brought the vessel pretty well in and the next morning the cargo was landed and the ship was about enough coal to last till noon. She was held to nearly all day Saturday with but one of her twin screws running to save coal, during the fearful gale and thick weather that prevented any attempt toward crossing in impossible. Late in the afternoon the pilot brought her in by soundings and she was sighted in the clouds caught sight of the Cape and then ran her in over a frightfully rough bar. When the steamship dropped anchor in the lower harbor she had but two tons of coal left in her bunkers. Her cargo is composed largely of matted and other light material that would have availed her very little in case she had been compelled to use it for fuel. She was inspected at her anchorage by Quarantine Officer Harle and yesterday morning was moved over to the Gas Company's dock, where she took on sufficient coal to take her up the river. She left yesterday afternoon at 4:30.
