O. F. Morton received a letter yesterday from Killisnoo, Alaska, announcing the death of his brother-in-law, B. F. Brightman. Typhoid fever is given as the cause of death. Mr. Brightman had been in Astoria often and had many acquaintances here.

The Pocahontas Coal Company, of Washington, is reported planning to operate a line of large colliers between its mines and San Francisco. The company has made application to the harbor commission of that city for the use of one side of wharves to be built there soon, and it is said the facilities asked for will be granted.

Clatsop county timber land seems to be in considerable demand and quite a number of transfers of large holdings is looked for in the near future. Representatives of eastern syndicates have been in the city recently examining titles to some large tracts and making investigations in other ways, and it is believed some large deals will be closed soon.

A miniature steam launch of which its possessor is very proud is the property of young Neil Kendall, son of F. P. Kendall. The little craft is three feet in length and eight inches in width, and is perfect in every way. The hull was built by Fred Holt and the machinery by Chas. Stellwright. On its trial trip near the can factory the midge steam showed considerable speed.

A cablegram from London says the British ship Beechbank, which left San Francisco August 16 last for Queenstown, has reached her destination after a rather stormy voyage. Soon after rounding Cape Horn the vessel was struck by a tidal wave and considerably damaged. For four days the crew worked jettisoning part of her cargo of grain, and the ship was finally righted.

Anyone desiring to become a member of the Oregon fish and game association can do so by signing an application for membership with J. E. Krause, one of the directors of the association. It costs but \$1 per year. Last year the association planted 55,000 trout and this year anticipate planting over 150,000 and besides getting a shipment of English partridges as soon as necessary arrangements can be made satisfactorily.

The new franchise ordinance, upon which the members of the street committee of the council and the agents of the street railway have been at work for several days, was completed yesterday and will be presented at the council meeting tonight. The ordinance names the streets which the company wishes to use, those named constituting a continuous route from a point about opposite co-operative cannery in West Astoria to Forty-fifth street in East Astoria. The new ordinance contains the lighting clause, the council requiring the company to furnish lights at a monthly rental of \$6. It is claimed that this feature was included at the solicitation of the committeemen and not because of any desire on the part of the street car people. The company is already in possession of a lighting franchise, and could undertake the lighting proposition whether the new ordinance contain the clause relating thereto or not. It is believed the measure will pass without serious opposition, and that it will be satisfactory to all parties concerned.

ENGLISH PARTRIDGES.

Efforts to Propagate Them at Albany, Oregon.

Two coops containing twelve pairs of English partridges have recently been received at Albany, Oregon. The little immigrants stood the long journey well, and appeared in good condition when liberated on a farm near the city. They are about twice the size of our native quail, rise and fly beautifully, and as they do so show a pretty marking on the breast resembling a half moon. It is to be hoped that they will be satisfied with their surroundings and multiply fruitfully.

The farmers in the vicinity of Albany should forbid all hunting, both in and out of season, for a couple of years until they are well started.

STILL NO ELECTION.

Senatorial Fight Still on in Oregon Legislature.

There is little change to report in the senatorial situation at Salem. At the joint vote taken at noon yesterday Corbett received one less and Fulton one more than the day before. Rumors of all kinds are circulating as to the outcome of the present contest, but they are hardly worthy of serious consideration. Corbett's friends are still firm in their support, but the chances for his election seem to have lessened rather than grown in the past twenty-four hours.

The house was busy with routine matters yesterday and little work of importance was accomplished. Nearly four hundred bills have already been introduced, and it is said quite a number are yet to appear. A measure providing for a portrait of Governor Geer to be hung in the hall of representatives was passed, carrying an appropriation of \$600.

The senate in session in the morning ratified the appointments of Governor Geer for the state normal schools.

County Judges Gray, of Clatsop; Bartholomew, of Morrow; Calk, of Multnomah, and Ryan, of Clackamas; County Commissioner Evans, of Wasco, and Deputy Assessor Maxwell, of Multnomah, are reported at the capital as working in the interest of improved laws regarding assessment and taxation.

LOGGING LAW NEEDED.

PORTLAND, Jan. 25, 1901.—[Editor Morning Astorian.]—As Clatsop county has large timber interests, I address you in regard to the necessity for a law regarding logging. In 1899 the state of Washington passed a law entitled "An act providing for condemnation of right of way for logging purposes and for conveying timber products, etc." It is to be found on page 255, session laws of that state for 1899.

I believe an examination of this law will convince anyone who desires the general prosperity of this state, and particularly of its lumber interests, and provides for any damages caused by logging across another man's land, without any opportunity for that man to hold up the party who wants to operate on lands back of him, just because he holds the "key" to the situation, and demands a price for his land or right of way, far in excess of its real value.

The sawmills and lumber interests bring large capital here and employ many men. They should not be prevented from carrying on business by reason of inadequate laws in this state, and while the legislature is in session, it appears to me that capitalists and labor interested in that business, should insist upon a similar law to that of Washington, so we shall not be behind the times. Of course the legislature has much to do, but they are sent there to look after such important matters as this, and to take the necessary time therefor.

SHINGLE MEN TOGETHER.

Combine Reorganized for Another Year in Washington.

The Washington Red Cedar Shingle Manufacturing Association has been reorganized with headquarters at Seattle. It was decided to make a fresh start and an effort to open the shingle season of 1901 with a strong organization along the lines formerly followed.

Officers have been elected for the ensuing year, including an executive committee, empowered to appoint inspectors to travel among the mills of the state to see that the manufacturers adhere to the standard of grades established by the association. This has been a rather troublesome matter in times gone by, the tendency being in some mills to neglect the standard, giving brokers a chance to manipulate prices.

Another important feature is the establishment of a schedule of prices which the members of the organization are pledged to maintain. The price for stars is \$1.40 per thousand, and of clears \$1.60 per thousand.

SMUGGLING IN JAPANESE.

Revenue Cutter Grant Captures Twenty-two Offenders.

Twenty-two Japanese—one a woman—have been put ashore at Victoria by

the United States revenue cutter Grant, Captain Toller, they being captured by the cutter at a so-called logging camp on Waldron Island, and having been taken there from a British Columbia port, were taken back to the country whence they went. United States Immigration Officer Allen, who has been making a cruise on the Grant for the purpose of investigating the alleged smuggling of Japanese from British Columbia, took the Japs ashore and they were placed in a Victoria Japanese establishment, where they are held in bond. Two other Japanese who were also taken with those landed at Victoria were taken on board the cutter, and will be taken to New Whatcom as witnesses against two of their countrymen, the two padrones who are imprisoned there, where they were landed by the Grant, on the charge of violating the United States contract

labor laws by taking the Japs into United States territory.
