A pleasure party consisting of Mrs. Lottie Bennett, the Misses Elmore, Mrs. Dr. Finch, Howard and Lieutenant Cairns and Brewster made a trip to the quarantine station and Port Stevens yesterday as guests of Dr. Earle, on the steamer Erie.

Boy Twombly, a former Astoria boy who arrived on the Alliance from Marshfield, reports business very good on Coos Bay. One four-masted schooner has lately been launched, three more are now building, and a steamer is to be put on the ways at once.

Yesterday was a red letter day in shipping. The steamers Despatch and Ruth sailed for Alaska, the Fulton, for San Francisco, and the Almond Branch for Shanghai. The German ships Brunshausen and Prof. Koch sailed for Europe. The revenue cutter Perry left for Seattle.

A. J. Johnson, forestry expert in charge of the Oregon exhibit at the Pan-American exposition, is busy engaged in getting together five carloads of plants, flowers, shrubs and trees, which he will forward at once to Buffalo. A large and very fine fir ship-knee is now at the Telephone wharf for the exhibit.

Two Chinamen, Ho Keung and Go Choo, arrested a week ago on telegraphic advices from San Francisco, were released yesterday upon information that Governor Gage of California had refused to sign extradition papers. The men were charged with grand larceny but the details of the offense are not known here.

The Methodist parsonage, on Ninth and Exchange streets, was the scene of a very pleasant gathering last evening in honor of Mrs. Rowland's birthday. The parlors were filled with merry guests who came prepared to make the evening a happy one. Conversation, greetings and a short program were in order, and light refreshments were served.

The schooner Louis is being fitted with an additional steam pump, as a precaution against a repetition of her late experience in trying to make the trip to San Francisco. A tug will probably arrive from Grays Harbor to tow her down as soon as the eight vessels belonging to the same owner and now bound in that harbor are taken to sea.

The water commission is preparing to extend its mains in East Astoria a distance of 2000 feet. Commencing at Twenty-ninth street the extension will run on Franklin avenue to Thirty-third street, and thence by way of Grand and Harrison avenues to Thirty-fifth street. The residents in that district are rejoicing in anticipation of having a supply of good water.

The Alaska Fishermen's Packing Co.'s steamer Natan will be placed in the water today at the Astoria Iron Works, where her machinery has been fitted. Although the Natan is not large, being 30 feet long, 12 feet beam and 5 feet depth, she has unusual power, her nominal horse-power being eighty. She is intended for towing in connection with the company's Alaska cannery.

Eric Manuella has applied for a patent on an improved apparatus for cooling cans. His invention is a machine occupying a small space and directly connected with the soldering machine, doing away with the long inclines now in general use. The cans are cooled while making two revolutions on a refrigerated circular iron table, after which the surplus acid is removed with the same water used in the cooling process. The inventor has sixteen machines now under way for this season's use, mostly for Alaska canneries.

A stranger walking along Commercial street yesterday would very naturally come to the conclusion that Astoria was all right, nearly every merchant on that thoroughfare was opening spring goods, but Herman Wise, the clothing leader them all, the entire front of his building was blocked and clerks were busy unpacking suits by the dozen and over one hundred and fifty dozen hats of all colors and shapes, soft and stiff fancy shirts, new neckwear, etc., and, besides, Mr. Wise was particularly getting "UNION MADE" Hats, Clothing, etc., this season, which means that the goods were made by well paid, skilled labor.

Warrenton is not behind the procession in improvements and industries. Several modern residences have been erected this winter, and the sawmill has been improved in buildings and capacity. With the addition of new machinery, the claim cannery is to resume operations this week, employing about forty persons. Graham's boat yard is finishing two more fourteen-ton launches. While there is no boom, business is steady and increasing.

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BICYCLE PATH PLANS.

T. S. Gregory, editor of the Port Oregon Tribune, was in the city yesterday in the interest of the proposed bicycle path from Warrenton to the beach. The proposition is that the citizens of Astoria shall put up \$400, or one half of the expense, and for Warrenton to pay the balance.

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J. J. Denner, representing the International Correspondence Schools, is at the Parker House. Mr. Denner makes the statement that within the past two years no less than 626 people in Portland, and 150 in Astoria, have enrolled as students in this institution.

MR. McDANIEL'S ADDRESS.

Prominent Epworth League Official Speaks to Astoria Audience.

In his address on Sunday evening at the M. E. church on the subject "Possibilities," T. S. McDaniel, president of the Portland District Epworth League, said: "Christianity long sought a language that would be sufficiently cosmopolitan to alleviate the polyglot condition of humanity. It found Hebrew as the language of religion, Greek the language of learning and Latin the language of power, but demanded all three of these attributes in one tongue. As they did not coalesce, they became fossilized. We may now claim that our English is more cosmopolitan than any language the world has ever heard, in that it made up of the best of those used in the past, and more nearly than any other possesses the trinity of requirements, being the tongue of religion, the language of learning, and the voice of power."

"The bugle call of Rome was heard round the Mediterranean, but the Anglo-American drum tap is heard around the world. The vast possibilities now plainly before the Anglo-Saxon race, in the dissemination of all that is best in our civilization, are only equalled by their attendant responsibilities. We have now more than a general interest in the matter of Christianizing the heathen, since 40,000 of our American boys are camped tonight in the tropical isles of the Orient, where they have liberated eight millions of people from political bondage and are taking up the white man's burden of leading a degraded people out into the liberties of our civilization."

WANTS HER CHILDREN.

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BLANKET TAX DEFERRED

REFERRED TO COMMITTEE FOR CONSIDERATION.

Short Session of City Council at Which Routine Business Was Transacted.

Without any discussion whatever, the blanket license ordinance was recommended at last night's meeting of the council. Mr. Scherneck, of the ways and means committee, stated that the measure had not given general satisfaction in its present form and that he was anxious to have it sent back to his committee. This was done without objection.

It appears that several features of the ordinance are objectionable, and all efforts thus far made by the committee to arrange a bill which would prove satisfactory have failed miserably. Yesterday the members of the committee had a long meeting, and the matter was discussed at length. Notwithstanding that the committee usually agrees on every proposition that comes up, the license ordinance caused an internal disagreement that bade fair for a time to kill the bill.

"We have been looking up the legal status of the measure," said Mr. Scherneck, "and an Astorian reporter last evening, and we find that much care will be required in preparing a bill which will meet legal requirements. We have been given another two weeks in which to discuss the matter, and hope to be able, at the next meeting of the council, to present a measure which will be satisfactory."

The council meeting was very brief, lasting only half an hour, and was uninteresting. A communication from business men whose places of business are near the corner of Commercial and Eleventh, in which they asked the city to establish a light at that corner, was referred to the street committee. The present light has heretofore been maintained by private subscription. The communication from J. Q. A. Bowly, as to the relocation of city monuments, was referred to the street committee. Larsen & Hageblum were granted permission to drive fender piles at the foot of Twelfth street.

The street committee asked further time in which to report on the request of Samuel Elmore for the improvement of Franklin avenue. Mr. Utzinger, of the committee, said that the matter involved the improvement of the entire thoroughfare from Ninth street west, and that the committee wished further time in which to examine the matter. The request for time was granted.

The assessment roll for the improvement of Twelfth street from Commercial to Franklin has been filed, and will be equalized on April 5 at 2 p. m. A resolution by Councilman Wright, instructing the surveyor to report the best grade on Franklin avenue from Thirty-fifth street to Forty-fifth street, was adopted. Claims were allowed as follows:
