WILL OBEY THE LAW

CLOSED SEASON IN CLACKAMAS TO BE OBSERVED.

Fish Warden Regards It as Most Important Stream in State for Early Hatchery.

Master Fish Warden Van Dusen is much pleased at the action of the fishermen on the Clackamas river in agreeing not only to themselves refrain from fishing during the closed season but to assist the water bailiffs in deterring any violators who have not signed the agreement. This action is the outcome of a talk Warden Van Dusen had with several of the fishermen on his recent visit to the Clackamas, at which time it was assured that there would be no more violations of the closed season in that stream if the men could prevent it.

"The agreement entered into by the Clackamas fishermen and the water bailiffs," said Warden Van Dusen yesterday, "is a source of much gratification to me. It is imperative that the provisions for the closed season be strictly obeyed in the Clackamas, because it is the natural spawning ground for the early fish. The sources of the Clackamas are in the Cascades where the snow melts earlier than in the mountains in British Columbia, from which the Columbia comes. When the early fish come up they follow the rapid streams and go up the Williams to the Clackamas and into that river."

"At this time of the year the fishermen should themselves recognize the fact that it is to their own interests to allow the fish to propagate without hindrance. A conservative estimate of the fry that will be turned out from the Clackamas yearly if the closed season is observed would be 25,000, and it would be an excellent thing for the state if the river could be closed altogether. Under the new fishery law the state board of fish commissioners has the power to close any stream in the state upon giving ten days' notice. At the last meeting of the board the question of setting apart some streams for this purpose was discussed and it was agreed that the Clackamas was the most desirable. It would, however, be unfair to the fishermen who are there to do this, but we earnestly hope that they will keep their agreement to help enforce the law."

Several licenses were issued yesterday, the first one for the year being to Emil Finney, the well-known Columbia river fisherman. Warden Van Dusen and his office assistant, H. M. Brantford, are ready to issue licenses at a bounty to any fisherman who has been received from Salem several days ago. Mr. Van Dusen deplored the fact that the attorney-general had rendered a decision to the effect that the law providing a bounty to sea lions and other salmon destroyers was inoperative owing to the fish commissioner being designated as the person to receive the scalps and draw warrants for payment. Instead of the bounty being drawn up by two local men and forwarded to Senator Fulton before the law abolishing the office of fish commissioner and creating that of master fish warden was introduced. Hence the use of the official title that was borne by Mr. Reed.

Legal proceedings on the part of Mr. Reed are expected to be filed at almost any time, now that the secretary of state has refused to pay the demand for salary during the month of March. Who is the legal advisor of Mr. Reed is not known, nor is the course of procedure that will be taken.

Deputy Warden Henry Ballman left yesterday for a trip along the river in search of violators of the closed season.

PUBLIC DUMPING GROUND.

Petition From Woman's Club to the City Council.

At the next regular meeting of the city council the committee from the Woman's Club, of which Mrs. F. P. Kendall is chairman, will appear before the council with a petition for the establishment of a public dumping ground. This is the first step in the plans of the club for inaugurating a crusade with the object of ridding the city of unsightly garbage heaps and refuse and securing a more sanitary and public street and vacant property.

The committee was to have been present at the last session of the council but the inclement weather and illness of members of the committee prevented. The members of the club think that if the city will set apart and designate some vacant lot as a public dumping ground where refuse may be dumped that householders will be encouraged to keep their premises in an attractive condition with decorative plants that do not call for tin cans and refuse of all sorts. The council will be asked to provide for the city streets being kept clean.

PALOMA SCHRAMM CONCERT.

Of Paloma Schramm, who with her younger sister, Karla, will give two concerts at the Methodist church on Thursday of the coming week, the Vancouver (B. C.) News-Advertiser has the following to say:

FORWARDED TO WASHINGTON.
Bids for Water System at Fort Stevens Opened.

Constructing Quartermaster Downs yesterday opened the bids submitted for driving six 6-inch wells, constructing a pumping station with a 60,000-gallon tank, and laying a system of distributing pipes at Fort Stevens. The bid of Ferguson & Houston of \$15,480 for the work was the lowest received, though \$578 could be saved by re-

gulating the different items. The contractors, however, want the award made on the basis of the entire contract and Captain Downs forwarded the bids to Washington without recommendation.

Excitement, indications having been discovered on the North Beach.

The supervising architect of the new postoffice being erected at Salem has decided to use Ashland buff sandstone in the construction.

Ranches of Eastern Oregon are overstocked with horses and preparations are being made for large shipments to the East in the near future.

H. M. Bush, a Salem painter and paper hanger, was instantly killed in that city Friday by falling from a high scaffold on which he was working.

A lot of watches, rings and other jewelry were recently found near Cofax and is supposed to be a plant made by some burglar who could not escape with his plunder.

Mullet are so thick in the Klamath rapids, says a local paper, that hundreds are killed with pitchforks. The run is the heaviest that has been known in years.

A company has been organized in Winsted, Conn., to be devoted to the breeding and marketing of black cats. Those not sold for pets will be killed for the pelts which are much sought after by furriers.

C. W. Thebo, a pioneer Alaska cattleman, is in Seattle preparing to ship 400 head of cattle into the Yukon country. The consignment is scheduled to leave the Sound April 25.

A Coifax, Washington, school girl, Laura Morgan, has been missing for two weeks and it is feared she committed suicide by drowning, her books having been found by the river side.

At the horse parade to be held in Pendleton May 4th, prominent cattlemen of Eastern Oregon and Washington will be represented with entries and the citizens of the city are making elaborate preparations for the affair.

The first pack of sardines to be shipped from Tacoma, amounting to 200 cases, have been well received in the Eastern markets and the promoters of this branch of the fishing industry expect it will develop to large proportions.

Walla Walla is going to work with enthusiasm, planning for entertainment of the presidential party. The president and his guests will not be in Walla Walla for more than a few hours at the outside, but the enterprising citizens of the city are preparing to show him what they can do.

It is reported from San Francisco that the Oceanic Steamship Company has found the establishment of a monthly service between that port and Tahiti a losing venture and is willing to pay the French government a liberal forfeit to be released from its contract.

The Salem Journal alleges that the new poll tax law increasing the amount is invalid owing to the fact that there is no record of its passage on the senate journal. President Fulton signed the bill in regular form but through the omission of the clerk it was not entered and officially there is no record of it.

Fifty discharged soldiers, formerly of

the Thirtieth Infantry, had some fun with a bill collector recently at the Presidio near San Francisco. They had bought civilian suits from merchants on credit and when the man came with the bills they treated him to a comical performance in the way of blanket tossing. When released he was glad to get away without even promises to pay.

There is weeping and gnashing of teeth among the Seattle gamblers owing to the fact that by a recent arrangement one firm was given a monopoly of the business in the city by the police department. There is a purity league in Seattle that has been making considerable trouble for the gamblers lately and they will probably attack the deal with a view to having the evil entirely abated.

You may believe this or not as you choose, but an Omaha paper is responsible for the story of a Miss Jennie Robinson, of that city who recently started a paragon by asking for a loan of \$25 on a pair of cork legs which she was wearing. She wanted to remove them in the shop but the money-lender declined that method of transfer and called later at her home for the pledges. Miss Robinson lost her limbs in a railroad accident.

The cleverest divers in the world are the Japanese, as was instanced recently in San Francisco when the little brown man went down in a depth of water that Americans could not work in. The report has come from Japan that the famous diver Fukumatsu Sakamoto of Nagasaki is dead, having been overcome while working on a wreck in the harbor of his native city. He was working at a depth of 77½ fathoms when he was stricken with heart failure.

Discoveries of crookedness in departments of the municipal government are periodic in San Francisco. The latest exposure concerns the clerks of the police courts, one of whom has fraudulently obtained thousands of dollars by forging the judges' names to orders for the return of money deposited for bail. A number of officials are implicated and the newspapers are hinting that the fault lies farther up and there is small probability of the offenders being punished.
