nickle-in-the-slot machines or other de-vices of like character wherein there nters any element of chance. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGIS-ATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE

OF OREGON: Sec. 1 .-- Any person, or persons wh hall conduct, maintain, either as owner or owners, proprietor or proprietors, lesee or lesees, employe employes, agent or agents, or who shall play or use any nickle-in-the-slot machine or other device of like charoter wherein there enters any element of chance whether the same be played for money, checks, credits, or other things or representatives of value, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars, nor more han one hundred dollars, and in default of payment of the fine imposed shall be mprisoned in the county jail one day for each two dollars thereof, Sec. 2.—In all prosecutions under this
