When the owner tendered charges to reclaim the horse Caples refused the offer and wanted \$50. The case will be tried during the coming week.

Several garments made entirely of fish skins and made to be worn, were recently put on exhibition in the Museum of Natural History in New York in a remarkable collection of curios gathered in eastern Siberia by Prof. Berthold Laufer of the Jesuit North Pacific expedition. These fish skin clothes are the work of the women of the remote Glyak and Gold tribes of the River Amur, and very odd garments they are. The tribes live entirely by fishing and the skins, which ascend the river to spawn, are their staple food, and the salmon skins after being treated by the women, who are adepts, provide material for their clothes. First the scales are removed so carefully that the skin is not broken. Then the skin is tanned and dressed to make it durable and finally the women sew it into garments. Salmon skin, when made into clothes by the Amur Indians, is like kid in appearance and softness, but it is tougher than kid, in fact, almost as tough as parchment. It is dyed yellow and red and indigo, and some of the garments into which it is made are highly ornate. Curiously enough, most of the ornamentation is on the backs.

CONDITION WAS HOPELESS.

No Hope Held Out for the Hon. J. C. Trullinger's Recovery.

The condition of the Hon. J. C. Trullinger last night was so serious that the attending physician could hold no hope for recovery, and the case was momentarily expected. For over thirty-six hours the patient has been unconscious and yesterday afternoon the family was summoned to his bedside. If death does not intervene before morning it is not expected that the patient will survive today.

Mr. Trullinger has been identified with Astoria for more than a quarter of a century and has been prominent in a number of enterprises. He came overland from the East to California in the early 50s and later moved to Oregon. About 1876 he came to Astoria and built the mills subsequently acquired and operated by the West Shore Mills Company. For several years he conducted a large logging plant on the Walluski and had other extensive interests in the state.

In 1886 he ran for mayor of the city against the Hon. C. W. Fulton and was elected. In 1892 he was elected a member of the legislature and served during the January term, 1893, his colleague being C. Campbell.

The children of Mr. Trullinger are P. A. Grant, Thomas W. C. Thaddeus, and John Trullinger, and Mrs. T. T. Geer, wife of the governor, and Mrs. W. D. Mack, of Aberdeen.

W. C. T. U. ENTITLED TO CREDIT.

The following communication received at the Astorian office yesterday is self-explanatory:

Editor Astorian:—An item in regard to the family of W. C. T. U. in the Evening News of the 26th is slightly misleading in view of a partial statement of facts. Credit is due to Chief Hallock and his friends for their charitable and generous assistance of this needy and worthy family. This family, however, did not have to wait until yesterday before assistance reached them. Aside from assistance rendered by individuals during the three months they have been here, and especially during the past two weeks when they have all been sick. In the way of food, clothing and furniture, both the W. C. T. U. and the Salvation Army have given material aid. In addition it was seen that a night nurse was provided by the county, while both night and day nurses were furnished by the Salvation Army and private individuals while the family were sick during the past ten days. The

children who were able to be about were cared for away from home during the two days when the mother was most ill. Medical attention and medicines as well as special food for the sick ones was also furnished. It may be that many of the good people of this city do not know that the W. C. T. U. ladies habitually attend to cases of this kind, and that there is no better way of dispensing charity in this city than through that organization. It is worthy of much more assistance than it now gets in this as well as in other lines.

LIBRARY NEEDS FUNDS.

Citizens to Be Asked for Yearly Membership Subscriptions.

For some time past the revenues of the public library and free reading room have fallen behind the expenditures and the ladies who have made themselves responsible for its continued existence have decided to make an effort to provide for the monthly deficit for the future. When the library was first organized, some seven or eight years ago, there were over thirty yearly subscribers at \$5 an allowance of \$40 was granted by the city, and liberal support given to the library by the merchants of the city, and citizens generally.

When the salaries of the city officials were reduced the allowance to the library was cut down to \$25 and of late years the yearly membership has dwindled until at present there is a monthly deficit of between \$30 and \$35 each month, which has been provided for by the ladies who are interested in the library. Sometimes this has been done through the medium of attractive entertainments, and more often through private contributions.

Although the monthly attendance at the library is between 100 and 150 by actual count, and there are between 1500 and 1600 books on the shelves, the monthly income rarely exceeds \$10 and more often is not more than \$8. The allowance from the city is \$25 and the expenses aggregate between \$25 and \$30. This can be plainly seen that each month the library management has had to face a deficit. This plain statement of the case is made because there is a prevalent impression that the institution is self-supporting. The ladies have determined to make a systematic canvass among the business men and citizens generally and ask for yearly membership subscriptions, sufficient to maintain the institution and permit to develop, without the drawback of continual indebtedness.

Some time during the first week in May an entertainment will be given at the opera house, that will differ widely from anything presented for some time in the past. HEALTH OFFICER NEEDED

WORK DONE BY SALVATION ARMY LASSIES.

Care for Sick and Afflicted and Give From Scanty Purse to Unfortunates.

From time to time attention has been called to the necessity for the re-enactment of an ordinance authorizing the appointment of a health officer for the city of Astoria. A striking instance of this need was furnished in the case of the destitute family on Eighteenth street, who were provided with food, clothing and money by charitable people, whom Chief Hallock interested in their behalf. At one time the entire family, and there are eight of them, were sick at the same time. When their deplorable condition became known to the neighbors, they did what was possible for their relief. There was so little official action in such a case should be reported and the chief of police heard of the case in a round about way, and immediately took steps for the family's relief.

Previous to the chief's action the women of the Salvation Army had done what they could in the way of nursing and caring for the patients. They procured medical attention for them and from their own slender purses provided as much as possible. There is another case now in the hands of the Army women that illustrates the constant need of a health officer. Down in that section of the city given over to the half-world there lies, bed-ridden and dying, a miserable old woman, who has been in the hospital for some time. She is a colored woman, probably about 30 years of age, and for several years has been living alone and almost unattended in a tumble-down shanty. For weeks the Salvation Army lassies have cared for the woman. When they found her little room was covered with dirt, unwhashed dishes were scattered here and there, the sunshine could struggle in but feebly because of the crust of dust on the window panes. Occasionally an acquaintance of the sick woman would bring her a bowl of soup or some other food, but for the greater part of the time she was entirely unattended.

The Salvation Army missionaries gave that basic little room a clearing that worked wonders. They made a visit each day, bringing food and preparing it on a rickety stove that continually threatened to fall apart. At the request of the lassies, Dr. H. L. Henderson visited the woman. Then it was discovered that she was a confirmed morphine fiend and was suffering from lack of the drug than from lack of food. No provision is made by the city for the care of such unfortunates so the matter was referred to the county officials. The woman's conditions were brought to the attention of the county court and a request made for her admission to the hospital as a county charge. This plan was balked by the county physician, who refused to admit the woman because she would need morphine continually and he deemed it best to have a patient maintained at the expense of the county.

Thus the matter stands. The woman will probably remain in the miserable shack until death comes. But for the charity of physician and Army women the outcome would be absolutely without care. If a health officer had been called in at the right time the woman might have been made to stand a surgical operation to remove the habit, and receive proper treatment and care. These are but instances; the Salvation Army could give a dozen similar ones, in each case demonstrating the need for a health officer.

Another department of the work pertains to the disposition of garbage and refuse. There is no one now to enforce regulations, valuable from a sanitary standpoint. And even the present rules that ought to be rigorously enforced as precautionary measures to insure a freedom from disease and epidemics.

The only movement of salmon in New York at present seems to be in red Alaska, of which some of the most prominent dealers are cleared out, and prices are firm at quotations. The hesitation of Columbia river packers to make prices for this season's delivery is very trying to dealers in this market, who can do nothing but wait. The season began this week with a fair run, it is said, but it is impossible as yet to predict how it will materialize in the next few weeks.—Fishing Gazette (N. Y.).

There is not much new this week. A decline in spot prices is noted in New York. Future quotations are as last reported. The run on the Columbia river is very light, and some sales of the new pack are reported at \$1.50, \$1.45 and \$1.40, for talls, flats and half-flats respectively, while others, who have the same quotations, say nothing will be done till the Columbia river association makes prices.—San Francisco Grocer.

According to the United States Fish Commission there were twenty-one million salmon taken in Alaska waters last year. Without a corresponding increase in the number of fish from hatcheries the salmon in those waters will be scarcer than they are in the Columbia river.—San Francisco Trade Journal.

The American Can Company has issued another circular advising packers of the new prices on cans, which shows an advance of about five cents per hundred on previous prices or as they have adopted the western method of quoting cans by the thousand, of about fifty cents per thousand. As these quotations are for universal application, and cover all orders for April, May and June, the advance adds just as much more to price of goods in stock and so much more to quotation figures of future contracts.—The Trade, Baltimore.

For new season salmon it is hard to get quotations outside of those for Columbia river not packed at Astoria, or points near there. The price named for an up river canner is \$1.50 for talls, \$1.45 for flats and 95 cents for half flats. No prices are to be put out by Puget sound cannermen, neither are any named by Alaska packers, but we presume that red Alaska can be had at 95 cents for talls and Puget sound sockeyes at \$1.10 or \$1.125. We are informed that four canneries on Fraser river are cutting on the comb figures for flats and halves, by about 10c on flats but nothing is said about talls.

The quotations for 1901 pack Alaska f. o. b. here are: Red talls 95 cents; medium reds, 85c; Puget sound sockeyes \$1.10 to \$1.125; for talls, Fraser river on the basis of \$1.125 for f. o. b. river.

In our market second hands hold 1500 salmon as follows: Red Alaska \$1.10 to \$1.125, according to brand; medium red, \$1.00; pinks, 90 cents.—San Francisco Trade Journal.

The company is capitalized at \$300,000, of which \$150,000 is paid in.

The horse abattoir at Linton has been re-opened and it is estimated that 10,000 horses will be slaughtered. Horse meat has found favor in several European countries, and there is a good demand for the product.

Dr. P. S. Byrne, the Democratic nominee for mayor of Spokane, has declared on plank of his platform to be that plain drunks are not to be arrested but assisted to their homes. When the offender becomes disorderly he is to be jailed.

TO BUILD COUNTY ROAD.

Court Decides to Have First Two Miles Constructed.

At an adjourned meeting of the county court yesterday it was decided to build two miles of the proposed road to Vesper under the direction of the roadmaster, and if the plan is feasible to construct the entire distance, by day's work. The section selected for the experiment is the two miles between Willamsport and the Walluski bridge. Work will be commenced during the coming week and the outcome will be watched with a great deal of interest.

County Treasurer Thompson has \$248,131 to the credit of the Nehalem road fund and this will be drawn upon to defray the expenses to the work. Estimates made show that the road can be macadamized at a cost of not to exceed twenty-five cents per linear foot, which is less than the bid for plankings. The court is considering the advisability of buying a rock crusher for use on the road and the question of purchasing the machine will probably be decided at the next meeting.
