PEACE IN ARGENTINA.

President's Message Congratulates the
Country on Cordial International
Relations.

BUENOS AYRES, May 4.—President
Roca, in his message opening the
Argentine congress, says that the inter-
national relations of Argentina are cer-
dial and that peace is assured at home
and abroad. He alludes with satisfaction
to the reference of the boundary
dispute between Argentina and Chile to
Great Britain for arbitration; he re-
fers similarly to the visit of the president
of Brazil, Mr. Campos Sales, in
November of last year.

After announcing a renewal of the
service of the external debt in July after
a decade of suspension, he proceeds
to review the financial situation, noting
with satisfaction the great improve-
ment of Argentina's credit abroad and
asserting that the government will
shortly present a bill for the unification
of the external debt with the object of
reducing the present heavy service and
paying the floating debt in Europe.

Finally the message declares that the
government will encourage immigration
and colonization and adds that 19,500
immigrants arrived last year.

It also appears from the message that
for the year 1900 exports from Argen-
tina amounted to 770,000,000 francs and
imports to 5,670,000,000 francs.

MANY ARRESTS IN RUSSIA.

Government Seeks to Prevent Demon-
strations on Labor Day.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 4.—Many
male students, a number of female
students, workmen, liberal leaders,
lawyers and literateurs were arrested
and 200 houses were searched here on
Thursday night; and it is probable
throughout European Russia. Similar
measures were pursued. The object of
the movement is to prevent demonstrations
on Sunday next, which is regarded as
labor day. The advisability of the step
is considered by some to be questionable,
as it may easily provoke trouble.

Among the houses searched were
those of Prof. Leshaf, director of the
woman's college, and Barrister Bern-
stam. The military have been noted
near the factories to prevent workmen
from coming into the city.

MURDER ENDED QUARREL.

Switchman Shot by Braken in Cal-
ifornia.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4.—J. D.
Sherry, a switchman, was fatally shot
by W. L. Norton, a brakeman at Red-
des, after a brief quarrel. Sherry, who
was shot after receiving a bullet in
his breast, was a member of the Tim-
berland lodge, Brotherhood of Railway
Switchmen of Los Angeles, Cal.

ASSIGNMENT OF BISHOPS.

STOGIE COMBINE.

Proposed by Syndicate of New York
Capitalists.

WHEELING, W. Va., May 4.—The
Intelligencer says:

It is learned on indisputable author-
ity that at least three and probably
others of the Wheeling stogie manufac-
turing establishments have been ag-
grieved by a syndicate made up of
mostly New Yorkers to enter into a
consolidation that, it is said, will in-
clude the larger factories in Pittsburgh,
as well as those in Wheeling. It is said
that the syndicate is composed of men
who are interested in the American
Cigar Company.

Several Pittsburgh concerns have been
approached but it is not known here
what success the representatives of the
consolidation have met with there.

SOCIETY OF ETHICAL CULTURE.

Holds Its Twenty-Fifth Anniversary in
New York.

'NEW YORK, May 4.—The twenty-
fifth anniversary of the New York So-
ciety of Ethical Culture was celebrated
last night at Carnegie hall. The cere-
monies were addressed by Prof. Felix
Adler and Dr. John Milner, the pre-
sident of a silver anniversary celebra-
tion of the society. The anniversary of
the society is celebrated on May 4, 1876,
the date of its organization. The society
is a religious and moral movement
for the American Synagogue movement.

ADVANCE IN WINDOW GLASS.

Still Another Probable Before Factory
Resume in the Fall.

PITTSBURGH, May 4.—President W.
T. Gray, of the National Window Glass
Manufacturers' Association, has sent out
circulars to the members of the organiza-
tion that an advance in the price of
window glass will be made May 11.
The new discounts are 8 and 10 per cent
on standard lots or a fraction over
seven per cent of an advance on present
prices. It is estimated in glass in-
dustries that further advances in prices are
probable before the factories are ready
to produce glass after the summer shut
down.

HURRICANE ON ATLANTIC.

Sailing Steamer Released From Ice
Pack by Furious Wind.

ST. JOHN'S N. F., May 4.—The sail-
ing steamer Virginia Lake with 250
men on board, that has been frozen in
the ice at White Bay for the past six
weeks, has been freed by a furious hur-
ricane driving the ice pack into the
north Atlantic, where the waves broke
the ice into pieces. The Virginia Lake
has hauled at Bonaville for the night,
being short of coal.

A hurricane is now sweeping New-
foundland's coast line and many of the
fishing craft are seeking safety.

CANAL TO BE IMPROVED.

Canadian Government to Widen and
Deepen Entrance to Saint-Sauveur.

NEW YORK, May 4.—The house of
commerce in committee of supply, says
an Ottawa dispatch to the Times, has
voted \$100,000 for widening and improv-
ing the entrance to the Saint-Sauveur
canal.

During the discussion, on the subject
Mr. Blair, the minister of railways and
canals, said that at present the upper
entrance of the canal had only 15 feet
of water and the lower entrance 10 feet.
The entrance to the United States
canal was, he said, 22 feet deep and it
is proposed to make these on the Cana-
dian side the same depth.

The estimated cost of the work is
about \$450,000.

DISCRIMINATING SUGAR DUTIES.

British Ministry Asserts That Abolition
of Foreign Sugar Duty Will
Benefit Them.

NEW YORK, May 4.—The British
ministry of commerce has announced
that it has decided to abolish the
duty on foreign sugar, which has been
in force since 1846.

The abolition of the duty will, it is
said, benefit the British sugar trade.

CHAIN OF HOTELS.

Standard Oil Institute Will Acquire
Territory in Mexico.

MEXICO CITY, May 4.—The Standard
Oil Company of Indiana has announced
that it has decided to acquire a chain
of hotels in Mexico.

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CITY TREASURER SHORT.

Over Twenty Thousand Dollars Missing
at Colorado Springs.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., May 4.—
The finance committee of the city
council, which has been making an ex-
amination of the books of City Treasurer
M. T. Hale, have reported that a
shortage of approximately \$20,000 exists.
It is said that Mr. Hale admits a short-
age of over \$20,000.

Mr. Hale has been treasurer for eight
years and the alleged shortage covers a
period of about two years time.

Friends have given assurance that the
whole amount will be paid within a
day or two and there has been no at-
tention.

ENGLISH CENSUS RETURNS.

Great Increase in Population of Lon-
don Suburbs.

LONDON, May 4.—The returns for
the census of 1901 show a population of 2,136,
116 in London and suburbs since 1881.
The increase since 1881 is 1,085,188 since 1881.
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It is estimated that the increase in the
London suburbs will show a marked in-
crease in the population of London and
suburbs since 1881.

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INDIAN CHIEF MURDERED.

Oldest Medicine Man of Yakima Shot
in the Back.

YAKIMA, May 4.—The Yakima In-
dian tribe is excited over the murder
of Chief Tenawash, the oldest medi-
cine man of that tribe. He was killed
at his home on the Yakima reservation,
being shot in the back with a rifle as
he walked by two bullet holes. The Indian
agent and police believe that he was
murdered because he failed to cure sev-
eral cases of smallpox.

IMMENSE MILL BURNED.

Cost Two Hundred Thousand Dollars
Five Years Ago.

BANGOR, Me., May 4.—The mill of
the Ashland Manufacturing Company,
one of the largest mills in Maine, burned
last night together with a large
quantity of lumber. The mill was
built in 1896 at a cost of \$200,000.
