THE PRESIDENT'S CIRCUIT.

St. Louis Globe-Democrat. When the first president of the United States, back in the first year of the government under the constitution, made the first presidential tour which the country saw, there were only eleven states in the union, for North Carolina and Rhode Island had not yet accepted the constitution, and consequently were not represented in congress or subjected to the laws of that body, and there were only about 3,000,000 people in the United States.

But these represent only a part of the transformation which has taken place in the United States between 1789 and 1901. At the earlier date the western boundary of the United States was the Mississippi river. The vast region west of that river, now comprising nineteen states and four territories, and containing almost a third of the inhabitants of the United States, was held chiefly by Spain, though earlier and later most of it was owned by France.

The moral changes which have occurred in the little over a century spanning the days between Washington and McKinley are as great as the physical transformation which has taken place, though they cannot be represented quite as concretely. In Washington's days there was no nation in the strict sense of the term. Each state in those days, when the union was new and untried and travel slow and difficult, felt that it was a little world in itself, and such allegiance as it rendered to the central authority was given grudgingly and with a great deal of reservation.

The narrowness and the pettiness which engendered the local jealousy and distrust that incited the Hartford convention of 1814, the nullification of 1832 and the secession of 1861 were particularly marked in the earlier days of the government. All this has given way to a national spirit and an intelligent and expansive Americanism which has blotted out all distinctions between Massachusetts and South Carolina, between Maine and Texas, and between Florida and Oregon. Socially as well as materially it is an immeasurably broader and grander country which America's present president sees than was that which his earliest predecessor saw.
