of which cities have made offers for the plant.

OREGON'S TIMBER SUPPLY.

Value of Forests Estimated at \$2,182,000,000.

Few people realize the extent of Oregon's timber belt. A paper published by Prof. Garman in the Sixth biennial report of the state board of horticulture says: "The fact is not generally known even in this state, that Oregon possesses a much greater amount of standing timber than any other state in the Union at the present time, viz: 24,000,000,000 feet, board measure."

During the year 1899, the over 300 sawmills in Oregon cut 669,650,000 feet of lumber, valued at \$6,258,250. At this ratio the value of our present standing timber, when cut into lumber, would equal the enormous sum of \$2,182,000,000.

When we are told that the sawmills are cutting 669,650,000 feet of lumber annually, the first dread is that our forests will soon be annihilated, but a little arithmetic will dispel this sudden fright. Allowing that saw mills and saw-wood work up the equivalent of 700,000,000 feet, board measure, per year, the present forest will give them constant employment for 325 years or until the year A. D. 2226.

During the years that it will take to use up the present crop of standing timber, the natural growth will go on and what are tiny plants now will be great trees then.

TO TAP TIMBER LAND.

Work to Commence on Goble, Nehalem and Pacific Road.

By June 1st work will be resumed on the track laying of the Goble, Nehalem & Pacific Railroad. This road will, when completed, connect Reuben, a small place near Goble, on the Columbia with Nehalem. Last summer the first work on the road was done and about four miles of rail were laid from Reuben. This part of the road has been kept in operation all winter and much timber has been hauled from the interior to the river. It is expected that fifteen more miles will be completed before the rainy season sets in the coming fall, and in another year the entire system may be completed.

The country tapped by the Goble, Nehalem & Pacific is one of the finest timber land districts of the state and as soon as an outlet has been found for its resources, will rapidly develop and "go in" value accordingly. It is rumored on good authority that the railroad promoters are having agents in the field buying up all available land near the route of the new rail and land deals are looked for in the near future.

The assured construction of the Northern Pacific branch from St. Helens to Pittsburg will open up an equally bountiful timber district, and great activity is expected in that part of the state with the starting up of these roads.

BOAT PULLERS TO PAY

WARDEN VAN DUSEN BELIEVES THEY ARE LIABLE.

Will Collect Individual Licenses From Them Despite Attorney-General's Opinion.

Master Fish Warden Van Dusen intends to collect licenses from boat-pullers on the Oregon side and his deputy and water bailiffs will be so instructed. Despite the fact that Attorney-General Blackburn has handed down an opinion that boat-pullers are not liable to license, the fish warden believes that the law intended that they should be taxed and will proceed to enforce his interpretation of the sections relating to licenses.

Section 28, of the new law, states that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take or fish for salmon fish or sturgeon in any of the waters of this state, or in any of the waters upon which this state has concurrent jurisdiction, by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, without first having obtained a license therefor.

The fish warden construes this and other sections of the law to imply that both boat-puller and fisherman is amenable to the law and should be made to pay a license. An opinion has been requested from District Attorney Harrison Allen, and if that official upholds the opinion of the master fish warden the boat-pullers will be required to pay license, the same as is required in the state of Washington.

Fred Fogel, the boat-puller who was arrested for operating a net, was tried before Justice of the Peace Brower yesterday. He was represented by Judge F. J. Taylor and upon agreement between counsel jury trial was waived. The justice found the defendant guilty but stated that as he was acting apparently in ignorance he was discharged. It will be recalled that Fogel was boat-puller for James Lewis, who is employed by the Warren Packing Company. Lewis claimed to have been sick and Fogel was operating the gear when Deputy Warden Bultman appeared and arrested him.

FROM THE EXCHANGES.

Work has started on the soldier's memorial monument at Eugene.

Work of building a road to Blue river on the Calapooa side has begun.

Fred J. Rummel was killed at the Mammoth mine, in Eastern Oregon, recently.

Plans for a telephone line from Baker to the Panhandle are under consideration.

The telephone line from Grant's Pass to Williams is completed and in operation.

County roads between Baker City and John Day are said to be in very bad condition.

J. H. Eggert has taken a contract to get out 2,000,000 feet of logs, a mile below Vient.

The Hood River Fruit Growers' Union is beginning to receive orders for strawberries.

Last week 15,150 bushels of wheat changed hands at Weston. The price was 46 cents.

About 12,000 bushels of wheat changed hands at DeMoss springs last week at 45 cents per bushel.

W. C. Peterson agrees to put an electric light plant in Brownsville if the city will pay \$45 per month for six lights.

Horse rustlers with two car loads of stolen horses are lodging the officers somewhere in the eastern portion of Malheur county.

Governor Geer will be asked to grant a pardon to J. G. Labram, who was sent to the penitentiary from Baker county in June, 1900, convicted of manslaughter.

The Bonanza mine, in Eastern Oregon, has received a large new boiler. It weighs 21,000 pounds, and it took 20 horses nine days and one-half day to haul it from Sumpter to the Bonanza mine, about 16 miles.

FISHERMEN ARRESTED.

Found Drifting Near Clifton Without Licenses.

John Woods, Stemetvo Falangas and Siegmatt Beglaris were arrested near Clifton yesterday afternoon by Deputy Warden Bultman and Water Bailiff Wickham. They were brought to Astoria and arraigned before Justice of the Peace Brower last night. The men pleaded not guilty and the trial will be held at 1 p. m. today, the defendants being released on their own recognizance.

The boat operated by Falangas was provided with a gear license issued to his brother who was not with him on the trip. The other two had neither gear nor individual licenses. The boats and nets were seized and are in the custody of Constable Kelly, pending the result of the trial. But a small percentage of the fishermen have paid the license demanded by the law and a rigorous patrol will be maintained on the river to catch delinquents.

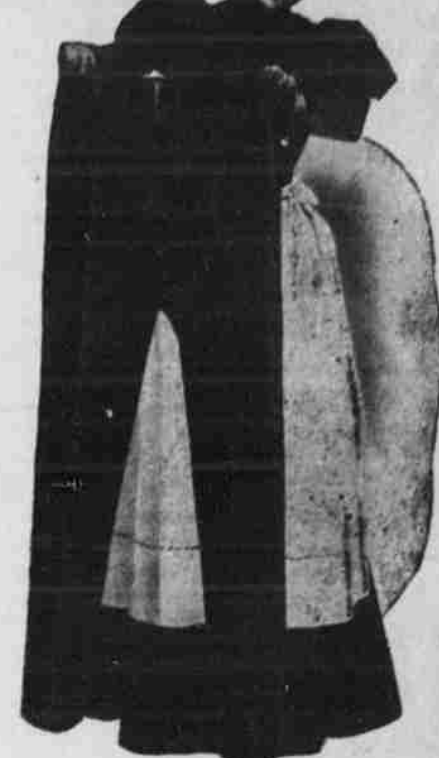
