FINNS WERE FOILED

WANTED TO RUN M. SAARELA OUT OF TOWN.

Sheriff Linville Spoiled the Plan and Instigators Will Be Arrested and Prosecuted.

The threats of the Finnish population of Unton to run out of town Mr. Saarela, who swore to the complaint against Dr. Rosenberg, editor of a local Finnish paper, would have been made good last night but for the timely interference of Sheriff Linville, who rescued the man from a mob who had placed him aboard the Nahcotta and had notified him that he must leave Astoria or be killed.

Saarela is a recent arrival here, having come to Astoria from Montana. An article was published by Dr. Rosenberg which was susceptible to two constructions. One was merely a technical reference to fishing matters, while the other interpretation was unfit to be published. Certain enemies of Dr. Rosenberg chose to place the latter construction on the article in question. They urged Saarela to swear out a complaint against Rosenberg, which he did, charging him with conducting an indecent and obscene newspaper. At the preliminary trial before the justice of the peace Rosenberg was held to answer to the circuit court, and bonds were fixed at \$100.

Threats were made by partisans of Dr. Rosenberg that Saarela would be tarred and feathered if he appeared in Unton. Yesterday afternoon a crowd of some thirty or forty Finnish citizens appeared at Saarela's boarding place at No. 2 Astor street and informed him that he must leave the city. To this he demurred and was told that there was no other course open, and unless he obeyed the behests of the importunate committee, he would be turned over to the police. Saarela offered to leave if the police so advised him, and after some parleying, agreed to proceed up town with five members of the visiting delegation.

A crowd of fifty men, the entire crowd accompanied him and he was taken to the Flavel dock and placed aboard the steamer Nahcotta, bound for Portland. In the meantime Saarela's friends were searching for Sheriff Linville. They found that officer a few moments before the boat was scheduled to sail and he proceeded immediately to the dock. A large crowd was assembled. The sheriff went aboard the steamer and found Saarela in the cabin on the upper deck. "Do you want to leave the city?" asked the sheriff.

"No, sir," replied Saarela. "All right, come with me." Turning to the crowd the sheriff said: "If you want this man come and get him, of you think you can," and between the sheriff and Justice of the Peace Brower, Saarela walked up town.

The crowd numbering between two and three hundred, followed and at the court house the sheriff, Deputy Sheriff Young and Saarela left the crowd and started on a search for the men who had forced him to board the steamer. One man, whose name was not learned, was arrested last night and the officials are looking for three others, who are involved to the extent of laying hands on Saarela.

Saarela stated to an Astorian reporter last night that the crowd threatened to lynch him and that numerous cries of "kill him," "give him tar and feathers," and other threats were made by the men who visited his boarding place. There will be a serious charge made against the men who laid hold of Saarela and forced him to board the boat. The penalty is a penitentiary sentence and the cases will be pushed to the bitter end.

CROPS LOOKING EXCELLENT.
Fall, wheat, rye and barley continue in excellent condition and that farthest advanced has begun to head. Spring wheat and oats have made a good growth and there is no complaint of insect pests damaging either fall or spring sown grain in any portions of the county. Alfalfa, clover, tame grass and pastures are doing splendidly and the prospects now are excellent for a good crop of hay. Stock is getting fat. Sheep shearing is well advanced and the wool clip, while not quite as heavy as last year, is reported very good.
