Mrs. G. A. Cashol, of the Cashol ranch near Astoria, has announced that she will have a Plymouth Rock hen which is a record breaker. Every other day the few eggs are of unusual size, the one brought to the Astorian office weighing considerably over three ounces. An even dozen of the big eggs have already been laid.

When the announcement was made yesterday that the new rates would go into effect Saturday L. E. Selig wired Judge Frank Hennessey, of Portland, if the Elks' baseball team would come to Astoria for the game scheduled for Sunday and received the following reply: "If we have to walk we will be in Astoria Sunday, Hennessey."

With the restoration of passenger rates between Astoria and Portland there will be an increase in freight rates that will amount to \$1. A future schedule will be adjusted on the weight basis instead of the cubic measurement basis which has heretofore prevailed. Official announcement has been made by the railroad companies.

The steamer Vanguard will leave at 8:30 this morning on a trip to North Shore points and the party will be made up of Astoria business merchants and subscribers to the guarantee fund recently raised to maintain a steamer service between Clatsop and Astoria. The committee in charge of the affair extends an invitation to all interested to make the trip.

The three Finns who were arrested by Sheriff Lovell and identified by M. Saarela as being among the mob who tried to forcibly compel him to leave town Saturday, were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Brower yesterday. The defendants were John Erickson, John Jelen and Victor Lindberg, and they were charged with threatening to kill Saarela. The men waived a preliminary examination and were released on bonds of \$100 each to appear at the circuit court.

The ladies of the Library Association will give a public tea at the library rooms on next Friday evening, May 31, in commemoration of the ninth anniversary of the founding of the library. The friends of the library are invited to be present.

The water has so weakened the piling supporting the building of the Columbia Oil & Guano Company's plant at Grays Island that a collapse is feared. Portlanders will be due for a force of men to be engaged in removing the machinery and steps will be taken to strengthen the supports.

The official measurements of the new launch Wilcox have been completed by Deputy Collector McLean and are as follows: Length, 50.4 feet; beam, 10.5 feet; depth, 3.9 feet; gross tonnage, 16; net tonnage, 11. The steamer is equipped with triple expansion engines with a capacity of 80-horse power.

The O. R. & N. Co. has made a rate of \$46 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first and third Tuesdays, June 10 to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

Captain Downs of the constructing quartermaster's department, stated yesterday that the government had made exhaustive geological surveys of the rock ledges available for jetty work and had found the quality in the vicinity of Astoria to be all right but the quantity was doubtful. The government experts reported in favor of the Neacum quarries, where desirable stone is found in large quantities. If the deposits are sufficiently large in the vicinity of Astoria preference will doubtless be given to the local product.

MILL IS TO BE BUILT

HAMMOND ACQUIRES TONGUE POINT SITE.

Property Valued at \$10,000 to Be Pledged to Reimburse the Grantors.

At a special meeting of the Push Club held last night a committee composed of Mayor Isaac Bergman, C. R. Thompson, C. A. Coolidge, F. L. Parker, W. J. Cook, A. Scherneckau, H. T. Thompson, P. A. Trullinger and J. N. Griffin was appointed to secure the property valued at \$10,000 which is to be turned over to the stockholders of the Columbia Land & Investment Company in return for which the company will sell its holdings at Tongue Point to Mr. A. B. Hammond at a nominal figure.

The committee will meet at the Chamber of Commerce at 8 o'clock this morning and will proceed immediately to the work of raising the subsidy. The committee will be sub-divided and the work so laid out that results can be obtained in the shortest possible time. The meeting of the Push Club was largely attended and the members were enthusiastic in favor of doing everything possible to further Mr. Hammond's plans for erecting a mammoth cannery at Tongue Point.

The directors of the Columbia Land & Investment Company were in session both Monday and yesterday. Walter C. Smith, who represented Mr. Hammond, made in offer Monday for the property but there were objections to its acceptance. However, at yesterday's meeting the offer was accepted conditionally upon the stockholders being reimbursed with land to the value of \$10,000. It was announced at the Push Club meeting last night that over \$2000 worth of property had already been pledged and the balance will doubtless be forthcoming.

MEMORIAL DAY PARADE.

Formation of Different Divisions Is Announced.

The following formation will be observed for Memorial day, viz:—Cushing Post will form on Eleventh street, right resting on Commercial; Beaver Lodge on Eleventh street, left resting on Commercial; the other societies will form on Commercial street as they come into line, the K. of P., I. O. R. M., etc., etc.

The school children will form on Eleventh street, right resting on Commercial; first, High school; second, Shiloh's; third, Adams' fourth, Alderbrook; fifth, Olney's. The band will form on Commercial, right resting on Eleventh street. The Women's Relief Corps will form on Commercial, left resting on Eleventh street.

The procession will move promptly at 10 a. m. sharp, and the line of march will be north on Eleventh street to Bond, west on Bond to Seventh, south on Seventh to Commercial, east on Commercial to Fourteenth and south on Fourteenth to the cemetery. After services at the cemetery the parade will be dismissed. The exercises in the afternoon will be at the opera house, commencing promptly at 3 p. m.

SURVEYING CREW OUT.

Northern Pacific Will Build to New Astoria.

On reliable authority it has been learned that a Northern Pacific surveying crew of thirty men has been out for some time past quietly surveying a route between Skippoose and New Astoria, and the men probably reach the latter point before the expiration of June. The work between Pittsburg and New Astoria is in charge of C. H. Peck, chief engineer of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy systems.

The vast lumber resources of Clatsop and Tillamook counties is responsible for the activity of the Northern Pacific, which will endeavor to get its share of the business in the territory and incidentally will probably become involved in a rate war with the Southern Pacific, which is thought to control the Northern Pacific to build two lines, one running to New Astoria and the second to the mouth of the Nehalem. The former point to be the terminus. The old Corey grade which parallels the Lewis and Clarke river will be acquired and used for the new line.

A wealthy Wisconsin lumberman thought to be W. M. Bray, of Oshkosh, Wis., has announced his intention of erecting a large mill at New Astoria, which will be completed and in running order by the time that the new road is completed.

AMERICANS NOT WANTED.

Out of 4500 fishermen on the Fraser river last year at least 1200 were Americans, says the San Francisco Journal of Commerce. New licenses are now being issued for the July and August season, and all Americans who apply for licenses are told that none will be issued this year except to British subjects. The cannery men allege that the salmon fishermen's strike of last year was caused by the interference of Americans who had to stake in that country and who by the laws were really not entitled to fish. The law, however, has not been enforced for so many years that it has long become a dead letter. All the Japanese who arrived in Vancouver became naturalized, and now they have an advantage over the Americans, who are unwilling to turn their backs on the Stars and Stripes even for the sake of making a living on the British side of the line. Many Canadian fishermen themselves believe that the new arrangement will result in trouble for the Americans will come anyway, and if they are not allowed to fish they will have a deep feeling of interest in knowing the reason why.
