With the freshet in the river the water is sufficiently muddy so that good day fishing can be done.

INTERCOLLEGIATE FIELD MEET.

The annual field meet of the College Athletic League of Oregon, will be held at McMinnville today. The colleges represented will be Albany, Monmouth, McMinnville, Pacific and Dallas. The track events are 100 yard dash, 120 yard hurdle, 440 yard run, 220 yard hurdle, 880 yard run, 220 yard dash, mile run. The field events are, running high jump, running broad jump, shot, hammer, discus, javelin, standing high jump, pole vault. Two hundred and fifty-four entries have been made in the 14 events. It promises to be the biggest event of the year. Railroad rates are one and one-third fare from all parts of the state. W. L. Thompson, of McMinnville, is president of the league and Geo. T. GALLANT DEAD HONORED

SERVICES APPROPRIATE TO MEMORIAL DAY.

Fitting Tributes Paid to the Country's Defenders by Messrs. Fulton and Smith.

The holiday set apart by the federal government as a tribute to the soldier dead was appropriately observed in Astoria yesterday. The weather was ideal and the streets along the route of the parade were lined with spectators. At the afternoon services the men being from artillery companies and the patriotic exercises and addresses were in keeping with the spirit of the day. The graves of veterans in the old Pioneer cemetery were bedecked with flowers and flags and local lodges and other organizations paid tribute of respect to deceased members in the various cemeteries adjacent to the city.

The parade was one of the largest and most successful ever held in the city. The Astoria Military band headed the procession which started shortly after 10 o'clock. A squad of seventeen men under command of Sergeant Hamilton, the men being from artillery companies stationed at Fort Stevens, were in line, followed by the members of the Relief Corps, Macabees, Redmen and other fraternal organizations, school children and citizens. At the cemetery no formal services were held, the graves of veterans being decorated, flowers being strewn in profusion.

At the opera house in the afternoon Samuel Elmore presided over a program of patriotic exercises and addresses. Recitations and songs by school children and others made up the program and speeches were made by G. C. Fulton and Hon. John H. Smith. The Fulton paid an eloquent tribute to the gallant defenders of the country at a time when the union of the states was threatened with dissolution. He also eulogized the gallant slain in the recent Spanish-American war. His remarks were greeted with prolonged applause.

The Hon. John H. Smith was introduced by Chairman Elmore and said in part:

"The dawn of civilization has been customary to observe holidays in commemoration of national events, or in honor of heroes who have proven themselves worthy of a nation's gratitude. One of the most appropriate, beautiful and beneficial of these holidays that will ever be the happy lot of a people to perpetuate is that upon which, in the American republic, the graves of soldiers who have responded to the last call are decorated by their countrymen for a time. This day is commemorative of any particular event or of any particular hero but of all the brave men who have responded to the call to duty when the country has needed their service on the field of battle."

"This day belongs in a peculiar way to the Grand Army of the Republic. To them the men of the regiments that slumber under the sod and the dead who were comrades. They marched in the same ranks; they slept by the same camp fires. Together they dashed through the battle smoke and braved the withering flame of war. In only a few more years they shall lie together in death's transcendent dream beneath the soil that they guarded in the strength of their manhood. Nature and appropriately, then, as a token of respect for the living and in mark of reverence for the departed, when this day recurs in the season, in processions to the bivouacs of the dead we are led by the veterans of the civil war. They are old and grizzled—their forms are bent, their steps unsteady, but they bear with them the flag that followed Sherman to the sea and attended Grant from Richmond to Appomattox."

A beautiful feature of the observance of this day for which the nation owes a debt of gratitude, particularly to its veterans, is found in the attention paid to our public schools by the unfaded veterans and the spirit in which the school children join in honoring their silent heroes that slumber away from the light of the sun. Where the banners of forests are waving and the musical rivers run."

"It is customary on the recurrence of this day for the members of the remnant of the Grand Army of the Republic to visit the different public schools, and also for the school children to join with them in the reciting of the Pledge. Nations live not from year to year, but from generation to generation.
