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pected daily: the Russians and Japanese are in transit, and notwithstanding that Germany's contingent remaining in Pe-chili is to number over 4000 men, the foreign occupation of the Chinese capital, in what military folk call "in force," at any rate, will soon be ended, and the Imperial court is expected to resume control before many days.

Whether the Chinese government will be able to maintain order and prevent outrages against foreigners without the aid of alien troops is still doubtful, but it may be trusted to do its best this time; for, if Boxer uprisings and massacres break out afresh, and the powers should be compelled to intervene a second time, the dismemberment of the empire would be a certain result. So far the integrity of Chinese territory has been prevented: even Manchuria has been saved—temporarily; and, with the exception of the execution, "by telegraph" or otherwise, of a few high officials, the capital punishment of many minor miscreants, and the big money indemnity which has still to be paid, the Orientals have been left off more easily than at one time seemed possible.

Christianity and civilization have not quite risen to their own high ideals in this unhappy business, it must be confessed; but, thanks to the enlightened lead of the United States government, backed in greater or less degree by England, Japan and Germany, the result is more creditable than it threatened to be. Normal conditions, it is to be hoped, will soon be restored, and China is to get another chance. If the Emperor and Empress Dowager will only take advantage of the opportunity to dispense with their reactionary advisers and put the reins of government in the hands of the Reform party, great good for China may yet come out of the evil of the Boxer rebellion.
