At a meeting of the clerks' union to be held next Tuesday an effort will be made to secure all clerks in the city as members, but a little more than one-third now being affiliated with the organization. The twenty-ninth annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association will be held in Portland a week from today. The program for the entertainment of visitors includes a banquet at the exposition building. On the night of June 13 Martin Denny and Toby Irwin will meet in a 20-round go at Portland. Denny expected to train in Astoria but has evidently changed his plans and is getting into shape in Portland. The expected improvement in the run of fish is not materializing and fishermen and cannermen are becoming discouraged at the prospect. They are hoping for a heavy run later but the signs do not portend a realization. The annual practice cruise of the First and Third companies of the naval reserves will take place on the Columbia Philadelphia about June 8. The cruise will extend over eight days and there will be target practice, fire drills, manning of boats and other routine work. The J. R. & N. Co. has made a rate of \$56 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first and third Tuesdays, June to October inclusive. These tickets must be used for confinement to the Columbia. Seattle is to be made the terminus of the Kosmos line of freighters which heretofore has made San Diego their port of entry on the Pacific coast. At the latter place they had traffic arrangements with the Santa Fe system for handling freight shipments to interior points. The steamer of the Kosmos line operate between Hamburg, Germany, South America and the Pacific coast. The expense incurred in building the first mile of the court road is favorable to the entire road being built under the supervision of Roadmaster Eves within the funds that will be available from the special tax levy. The first mile has been completed, with the exception of surfacing at a cost of \$560.35. Surveyor Astbury has pointed out that part of the road will need but slight repair and the larger part of the money can be expended in constructing a new grade wherever it is found necessary. It is essentially desirable that the road be available if possible in time to permit the marketing of the fall crops from the Nehalem country in this city. Fifty thousand trout and grayling from the Clackamas hatchery near Oregon City will arrive in Umatilla county on Thursday morning, says the East Oregonian. Watson will superintend the planting of the fish in the north fork of Meacham Creek. The work was made by the Oregon Fish and Game Association acting in conjunction with the O. R. & N. Co. WILL BE HERE THREE DAYS. River and Harbor Committee Will See Oregon's Rivers. Chairman Burton, of the river and harbor committee of the house, has testified to Congressmen Tongue that the committee will reach Portland on the morning of June 28, and will be able to stay until the afternoon of the 30th. Mr. Tongue thinks that the committee can be induced to remain until the evening of the 30th, reaching Tacoma on the morning of July 1. He left yesterday morning for California to join the committee at San Diego or Colton, on June 11th. Mayor Rowe, of Portland, will in a few days take up the matter of the entertainment of the visitors with the officers of the chamber of commerce, board of trade and a committee of eleven. Congressman Tongue suggests as features of the entertainment a trip to the mouth of the Columbia on June 28, a trip up the Willamette Valley, June 29, and a trip to the Dalles and Colby June 30. This is offered as a general outline and the Portland committee of reception will so arrange the details that the visitors will be given an opportunity to see the importance of the highway tributary to Portland. Homer Fletcher will leave this morning for San Francisco on the steamer Columbia to have an operation performed. If the operation is successful Mr. Fletcher may proceed directly to San Diego, where he has been offered a position on the beach team representing that city in the California league. Master Fish Warden Van Dusen has returned from Salem, where he attended the meeting of the state board of fish commissioners. The state board approved the warden's plans for spending all money available in the establishment of hatcheries in Oregon and increasing the capacity of plants already in operation. Judge McBride will convene the circuit court on June 17. A large amount of business will be transacted. The only cases of importance on the criminal calendar are against the moon-charger with attempting to compel M. Saarela to leave town, and these will probably be dropped at the request of the district attorney. A baseball game has been arranged for Sunday, June 16, between a team from the Foresters and the Elks team, which recently met defeat at the hands of the Portland Elks. Radebaugh, is to make its appearance as a seven-column, eight-page daily within a few weeks. R. F. Radebaugh and Wall are pioneer Tacoma newspaper men, and they promise to give the Record a strong push for popularity. President F. P.
