OUR RECORD IN CHINA.

When Americans speak of "our" record in China they have in mind the admirable work and attitude of the American soldiers. Of this they have a right to be proud. When there was fighting the Americans were to the fore. When there was a tentative peace, by their moderation, fairness and honesty, they sought to make it permanent. When there was lawlessness, so far as they could they suppressed it, and when the matter was outside their jurisdiction they made protest and held aloof. They were never charged with the crimes of which soldiers of other nationalities were accused and found guilty. They perpetrated none of the acts which made the allies to be more hated than feared. Under the direction of General Chaffee, who, covered with honor, leaves that post, they performed their work as troopers of the republic, and as American citizens.

They went to China as invaders. There was no other light in which they could be viewed by the Chinese. They arrived on a footing with the representatives of other countries. They bore their share of the native distrust. Behold the wonderful change wrought by themselves. When announcement was made that the Americans were to leave China thousands of residents of Peking mentioned that they were permitted to stay. The invaders had become friends; the vandals had proved a cordon of protection. The compliment involved in this petition was unique, not only without parallel, but to be appreciated as something that will stand in history as extraordinary.

That the Common Council of the City of Astoria has declared its determination and intention to improve all that portion of Seventeenth street, in the City of Astoria, Clatsop county, Oregon, as laid out and recorded by J. M. Shively, from the south line of Commercial street to the north line of Franklin street to the full width thereof, and on the established grade thereof. From the south line of Commercial street to a point fifty feet north of the north line of Exchange street, said portion of said street shall be improved throughout the width thereof by removing the old roadway and underpinning and planking the same throughout the width thereof, and constructing sidewalks on each side thereof ten feet wide, and the covering plank of the said portion of said street from curb to curb to be 4 inches in thickness by 12 inches in width. From said point fifty feet north of the north line of Exchange street, said portion of said street shall be improved by grading and planking the west half thereof and underpinning and planking the east half thereof and constructing sidewalks ten feet wide on each side thereof, and the covering plank of said street from curb to curb with planking 4 inches in thickness by 12 inches in width. The entire intersection of Seventeenth street with Exchange street shall be improved by grading and planking the same throughout the intersection, except the east ten feet in width of the intersection, which shall be improved by underpinning and planking the same throughout the width thereof to be 4 inches in thickness by 12 inches in width. From the south line of Exchange street to the north line of Franklin street said portion of said street shall be improved by grading the same throughout the width thereof, and planking the same throughout the width thereof with covering plank 3 inches in thickness by 12 inches wide laid on sidewalks on each side of said portion of said street. All material used shall be good, sound red or yellow fir lumber. J. M. Shively, City Surveyor.

That the city surveyor has been directed to prepare and file with the auditor and police judge estimates of the costs and expenses of constructing said improvement and plans and specifications for the proposed work.
