A salmon with the adipose fin missing was caught at the seining grounds of T. K. Johnson on Tennesse lake recently which weighed fifteen pounds.

Captain E. P. Parker has stated that in the event that the steamer Astorian is not sold to Seattle parties he will place the craft on the Portland-Astoria run at a reduced rate.

The Willamette registered 15.4 feet yesterday morning at Portland. It is thought that the warm spell may check the fall somewhat as there is still considerable snow to melt.

Ray West, a son of David West, of Westport, will killed while working in a logging camp at Napaevine, Wash. The remains were taken to Westport, where the funeral was held yesterday.

Hen. Deb. Young is attending the commencement exercises of the state normal school at Monmouth, and will remain for the meeting of the board of regents, of which body he is a member.

The formal opening of the new Commercial club has been postponed a week and will not take place until June 27. The decorations and paintings will be engaged longer than was at first expected, hence the delay.

Local Organizer Wm. Althous is about to form a blastsmiths union in Astoria. Several names have already been received and it is expected that the organization will be perfected before the end of the week.

The apprehension frequently expressed that it would be winter all summer was pleasantly dissipated yesterday, when was an ideal day, though the sudden change made it appear warmer than it really was.

In Justice Brewer's court this morning R. J. Jaspis will be tried on a charge of assault. Jaspis is the belligerent Greek fish dealer who has a penchant for getting into trouble. The case was called yesterday at which time the defendant demanded a jury trial.

The method of selecting the regatta queen has not yet been definitely decided. Chairman F. L. Parker, of the regatta committee, was in conference yesterday with a number of Astoria ladies. The matter will be taken up by the committee at its next meeting.

The O. R. & N. Co. has made a rate of 1/2¢ from Astoria and Portland for the Astoria-Portland run and will continue all summer. The repairs to the light house tender Columbine have been completed and she went into commission again yesterday.

Good catches were reported yesterday in the river, particularly near Ilwaco. The T. K. Johnson Company received twenty-four boxes on the round trip. It was currently reported that one boat brought in 1400 pounds but the rumor could not be verified.

Deputy Commissioner McElroy, of Washington, Deputy Warden Bullman and Water Bailiff Wickman have made several arrests on the upper river of fishermen without license. The tendency of earlier cases is not being extended to present offenders, the usual fine being \$50 and costs, with confiscation of gear.

The insertion in the new telephone tax ordinance of a penalty of \$500 for refusing to pay the quarterly license imposed, will probably be the line along which the constitutionality of the ordinance will be tested in the courts. A similar tax was recently imposed by the Salem city fathers and the telephone company beat it in the courts.

Agent L. E. Selig reports that business on the Clatsop-Astoria line is improving daily. Mr. Selig says that while the number of passengers may not seem large when expressed in figures that the shipping done here aggregates considerable, and that as soon as the fish come in profitable numbers the business of the Vanguard will be greatly increased.

Two games of baseball were played Sunday at the Astoria C. Y. The morning game was between teams representing the clerks and barbers and was won handsily by the latter, the score being 12-7. In the afternoon game from the Elks and Foresters met and after an interesting game the score was 17-4 in favor of the Elks. The Foresters asked for a return match to be played for new uniforms.

Master Fish Warden Van Dusen returned yesterday from a trip to the Sandy river where he had been reported that railroad employees had been killing quantities of salmon by exploding blasting powder in the stream. Mr. Van Dusen had a conference with the men in charge of the work, resulting in a promise to discontinue the blasting. The warden left last night for the Clackamas hatchery, where extensive improvements are in progress, which will increase the capacity of the plant.

Recent advices from London regarding the market for canned salmon to be in a very dull state, complaints being received from all points of the country of the absence of demand. One of the best authorities there states they can not remember ever having seen through such a period of depression as has existed for the past five or six months, and it appears as though the British public had made up their minds to do without salmon. The total deliveries for the month were only 15,000 cases against 25,000 cases at the corresponding period in 1900.
