Arrangements for the entertainment of the visitors will now be made, and at 10 o'clock tomorrow several sub-committees were appointed to arrange details. The committee adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman.

Two games of baseball will be played at the A. F. C. grounds today. In the morning the Eagles and Barbers will cross bats, and in the afternoon the longlooked-for game between the Elks and Foresters will come off. For the morning game no charge will be made, but a small fee will be charged for the Elks-Foresters game. The proceeds from which will be devoted to the expense of this and future games. Despite the fact that the art-rangers are being a member of the league fell through there is excellent prospect if good sport during the summer.

The Women's Club of Astoria held their last assembly before vacation yesterday. These papers were so instructive and enjoyable that the club decided it possible to have them printed for the enjoyment of the general public and they will appear in the Astorian next Monday. Mrs. Jane Smith read a very entertaining selection from "McLoughlin and Old Oregon," which was taken from one of the most vivid work pictures of the book and it was most delightfully read. Mrs. Maddock and Mrs. Mary S. Kinney each rendered a delightful solo. The club adjourned to meet the second Saturday in October.

During the closed season on the Willamette river the authorities propose to see that the letter of the law is observed. On the recent patroling trip several men were warned and a plan was formed to catch the offenders in the act but the plan was tipped off over the long distance telephone. Deputy Warden Bulman stated yesterday that the fish wheels below the Cascades would probably have to shut down in July owing to low water. The pack on the upper river has been small. The patrol boat will remain in the lower river for some time and all fishermen who have not complied with the section of the law requiring that the number of the license be painted conspicuously on the boat will be arrested and prosecuted. Today the launch will call at the different sealing grounds from Miller Sands to Jim Crow point, leaving licenses.

The following program has been arranged by the Portland committee for the entertainment of the Congressional Committee on rivers and harbors. Arrive in Portland Saturday morning, June 23, at 7:30. Breakfast at Hotel Portland. Leave fourth and Morrison over West Side Southern Pacific Railway at 9 a. m. and take in valley as far as Corvallis. From Corvallis to Albany, from which the trip to Oregon City will be made over East Side Southern Pacific road. Half an hour will be spent at Salem on the return trip, arriving at Oregon City the party will leave the train and take a steamer for Portland. Sunday the party will be left to their own pleasure, carriages, however, being provided subject to their call for pleasure rides or a view of the city. Monday the party will go down the river. The hour of leaving has been fixed at 8:30, and one of the fastest river boats will be secured for the trip. Lunch will be served on board the steamer, and Astoria will be reached between 1 and 2 p. m. From Astoria the party will go either by team or steamer to the jetty at the mouth of the river. After an inspection of the government works here the party will return to Astoria, there to be entertained by a dinner provided by the citizens of Astoria. From Astoria the party will go by train to Goble, where they will meet their regular train for the Sound.

At the meeting of the Women's Club yesterday, Mrs. Stokes, at request of the regatta committee presented the matter of choosing a regatta queen in Portland, and asked for an expression of opinion from ladies of the club. After a general discussion of the question a motion was carried unanimously that the chair appoint a committee to wait upon the gentlemen and inform them that the club was decidedly averse to such a move and would decline absolutely to assist in any way if such a course was taken.

David M. Dunne, collector of internal revenue, stated while in the city yesterday that he had heard a report that E. H. Plagg, of Salem, recently appointed a deputy collector for the district of Alaska, had been lost while traveling from Valdez to a point in the interior. Colonel Dunne had no positive information on the subject. Plagg is well known to the newspaper editors at one time running a newspaper in Salem. He also served a term in the lower house of the state legislature. During the last session Plagg was editor of the Salem Sentinel which was maintained by the anti-Corbett forces at the state capital.

The Fishing Gazette says: The local salmon market was without a special feature this week, but prices are somewhat firmer. It is claimed by some that stocks in first hands have been entirely cleaned out, and that the situation is in the hands of a few holders, who are waiting for a higher market which it is thought will come shortly, and that the supply is limited, but all these statements are disputed by others. Alaska reds, tails, have been advanced from \$1.25 to \$1.75, and the price of Alaskas now range from \$1.25 to \$1.65, in lieu of quotations hitherto quoted. Reports received from Columbia river pickers indicate at the present time that there will be a shortage in the pack the coming season, but it is recalled that in other years, when the same conditions prevailed, the fishing finally picked up so that in the end the pack was equal to if not greater than was hoped for. The same may be the case this year. The season is yet young.

There was a large attendance at the mass meeting of gill net fishermen held yesterday afternoon at Fishermen's Union hall, the object of which was to take steps for the removal of piling that step in the removal of piling recently driven in the same above Tongue Point in such a position that it is a menace to the gear of the gill-netters. A committee consisting of O. J. Johnson, J. P. Welch and Thomas Whitcomb was appointed to consult with the proper officials regarding the removal of the obstruction. An attorney has been consulted and is of the opinion that the piling can be removed and a social meeting will be held next Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock to receive the report of the committee and discuss what further action shall be taken. The piling complained of was driven by D. H. Welch and is about a half-mile in length. It is situated at Tongue Point in such a position that it obstructs the net during three-fourths of the good tide and considerable gear has already been lost because of the obstruction.

NEWS FROM NOME.

James J. Stokes Writes Interestingly of Astorians There.

The Astorian is in receipt of an interesting letter from James J. Stokes, dated at Nome City, May 27, in which he tells of Astorians who are in the frozen north and the success they are having. Mr. Stokes is a firm believer in the future of the Nome country. In his letter he says:

"The future I will predict is very great: It is beyond the estimation of conception of the mind of man. I predict that inside a period of ten years the output of gold will appal the gold syndicates of the world. The gold obtained here is produced by the most primitive methods. Should the same energy and capital that is expended outside be displayed here, together with all the improved appliances, both for rock and placer mining, in a few years the gold production would be stupendous. But this is not the only valuable mineral here as platinum is found in many of the creeks and is not saved owing to the ignorance of the mine owners, who are for the greater part sailors and farmers. Copper will also be one of the products of the country."

Concerning the Astorians in Nome and the surrounding country, Mr. Stokes says: "D. E. Ryckman, who was in the draying business here, is at present on a lay on a fraction of Gold Run, which creek is reported to be fabulously rich. He conducted a road house on the road between here and Point Clarence during the past winter. Pete Kinney is and has been around town all winter, but he has an interest in a claim on Gold Run and from all indications he stands a chance to make a barrel of money. Cecil Sover is in town and has been with the 'Second-Class' saloon. Will Clinton is up at Point Clarence but will strike out."

Hugh Boyle is in Blue. Stone. Hope Ferguson has gone to the Kuskokwim. C. E. Bayles is in the contracting and building business here. Barney Gibney has a saloon at Teller and has made some money. 'Robbie' Harris has been up in the Arctic with my brother, Henry, where they staked a number of claims, the value of which will have to be determined after the break-up. Al Cody is a deputy United States marshal. Tom Rawlings is working for C. D. Lane. J. L. Osgood has been around town during the past winter, as have also Mrs. Rock, 'Red' Johnson and 'Big' Maaten; the latter two are well known Columbia river fishermen.

Charles Gleason, the former instructor of the athletic club, is around Nome. Mr. Barrett, ex-mayor of Seattle, has been out on Anvil creek all winter, but says that he did not do much for himself, he is now foreman for Tom Varner, who owns a very rich piece of ground. Will Russell has been driving a team for the Red Line Company during the past winter. Mr. Ironson, of Chinook, has been doing winter mining but said that he had hardly made wages. N. Wentworth was at Point Safety working in a road house. Bob Ford, for a long time head teamster for the Northwest Transfer Company, of Portland, has been with me since last fall. We were engaged in the transfer business and the firm name had a peculiarly home-like sound to it—'Ford & Stokes'. Lou Burrows, from the Nasel, died last winter from the effects of being caught out in a blizzard. John McCelland, also from Nasel, went up into the Arctic early last winter with a party and they suffered severely from exposure and a shortage of grub. Through his pluck and endurance McCelland saved the entire party from perishing by making a perilous journey for relief that arrived in the nick of time. He was rather the worse for his experience upon returning but is right now and has started out again."

Mr. Stokes writes that the country is a paradise for sportsmen, a great variety of game being plentiful.
