The opening salts were 2½c high at \$1.22½, and in some quarters as high as \$1.35 with a prospect of a still further increase. It would be impossible to estimate how much has changed hands at the high color but the control of the light control of the control of the light control of the control of the light control of the control at the high prices, but as one jobber is buying from another continually the aggregate of the transactions must be larger than the total supply. There are known to have been numerous sales July. of 1900 cases and one of 5000 was re-ported, though unconfirmed.
