At the session of the county court yesterday it was ordered that a rock-crusher and engine be purchased for the use of the county. The purchase is contingent upon the construction of a road by the city in the quarter, the present roads and bridges being in such condition as to render it impossible to deliver crushed rock in sufficient quantity to justify the taxpayers in hauling it.

At a conference held yesterday the county court decided to put up property held for delinquent taxes for sale on August 1. This is a deferred compliance with the law passed at the last session of the legislature directing that such lands be sold at public auction on July 8. It was the intention of the court at first to ignore the law until the next session of the legislature, but an effort would be made to repeal it. It was thought that compliance would entail a serious financial loss on the county but a large number of the delinquents have already paid up and it is thought the rest will do so before the date fixed for the sale.

The fishing schooner Jessie arrived yesterday from the Cape Flattery banks with 25,000 pounds of halibut and 5000 pounds of black cod (hoki). The vessel has heretofore made Seattle, her home port and the reason for her present trip to Astoria is that she may be leased on and sold under foreclosure of a mortgage for \$200,000 by Robert Garretts, former owner of the craft. The Jessie is now owned by W. W. Whipple, Joe Baker and Alex Grant, and has made several successful trips. After discharging her cargo the vessel will be taken to Young's yard, where she will remain until after the sale, which will take place sometime in August.

The body of D. S. Trowbridge, of Fresno, Cal., was brought to Astoria yesterday on the steamer Elmore, en route to the dead man's home. Mr. Trowbridge was a prosperous rancher near Fresno and was going to visit H. H. Hathaway and wife, who are the latter being a sister of the deceased. While the steamer was descending the mountains the horses became uncontrollable. The driver, Ernest Baker, was thrown from the seat and badly bruised, and a short time after Hathaway and a companion were thrown from the coach, the former being killed. The body was embalmed at Tillamook and will leave on the morning's boat for Portland.

By a vote of two to one the county commissioners decided yesterday not to reject Boardman's plan to proceed with the construction of the county road to Vesper. The following resolution was introduced by County Judge Gray: "Resolved that the roadmaster be directed to proceed with the construction of the road No. 77, known as the Scholten road, and grade the same six feet wide from outside to outside including ditches and the work of building said road should be pushed as fast as possible and be well and completely built." Commissioners Young and Peterson opposed the resolution and voted against it on the ground that the financing of the road is doubtful, no arrangements having been made for disposing of the warrants.

PLAN IS SUCCESSFUL

Railroad Trust Is Now Assured and Official Announcement Made.

An Associated Press dispatch to the Astorian from New York gives additional details concerning the formation of the On-Off railway syndicate. The dispatch says: "The first official announcement in connection with the organization of the Pacific Packing & Navigation Company otherwise known as the salmon canneries consolidation, has just been made at the office of the organizers. It was authoritatively stated that the papers in the deal had been signed and that the new company will be incorporated under the New Jersey laws, probably on Monday or Tuesday of next week. Incorporation papers are now being prepared. The new company will have an authorized capitalization of \$25,000,000, half preferred and half common stock with an authorized bond issue of \$7,000,000. The issued capital of the new company is to be as follows for the present: 100,000 shares of \$100.00, preferred stock seven per cent cumulative, 45,000,000; common stock, \$5,000,000, total, \$10,000,000. Among the most important companies entering the new consolidation are the following: Pacific American Fisheries Company; Pacific Steam Whaling Company; Arctic Oil Works; Fairhaven Canning Company; Alsworth & Dunn, Seattle; Quadra Packing Company, Alaska; Ivy Strait Packing Company, Alaska; Alaska Packing & Fishing Company, Alaska; Thinker Packing Company, Alaska; Chatham Strait Packing Co., Alaska; Chukchee Packing Company, Alaska; Alaska Fisheries Packing Company, Alaska.

These are the largest concerns. Others in Alaska and on Puget sound are to be taken over, the total number of companies being given at about fifty. The total yearly pack of the companies which it is now expected to take over is placed at about 125,000 cases, and it is said that the capacity of these plants could be increased by about 1,000,000 cases without difficulty. The steamship interests in the new company will be a very important item. The Pacific Steam Whaling Company has a large fleet, including four ocean-going steamships. The Pacific American Fisheries Company has nine ocean-going liners with other craft. It is understood that negotiations are also pending with the Alaska Steamship Company and it is possible that that company will be absorbed. The Alaska Steamship Company operates a service between Seattle, British Columbia and Alaska. The principal competitor to the foregoing companies is the Washington & Alaska Steamship Company which operates four steamships. It is reported that J. P. Morrison and company have just closed the purchase of this line of steamships.
