A report received by the fish warden yesterday from Special Deputy E. C. Greenman states that he has already commenced putting racks in the Umatilla river and prospects are for an unusually large supply of eggs for the hatchery.

Owing to the recent death of Mrs. L. T. Gerds the joint installation of recently elected officers of the Knights of Pythias and Bathhouse Sisters was conducted privately last night instead of having the exercises public, as was first intended.

Mrs. R. Ingelson is now displaying a full line of the latest styles in fall millinery at the establishment recently opened by her at 614 Commercial street, opposite the Budget office. Mrs. Ingelson also carries a full line of ladies' and children's furnishings goods.

When Dr. H. L. Henderson attended the annual convention of the Elks to be held in Milwaukee he will wear a watch chain that is bound to attract attention. It is made of ten elk teeth joined together with a skull in the center made of perforated wood known as "tiger eye."

Architect De Lin has let the contract for the extension to the Masonic building. An addition of twenty feet will be built on the west end which will provide for toilet rooms and a large anteroom. The general architectural appearance of the building will be preserved.

The steamer C. B. Hanthorn has arrived at Seattle after a disagreeable trip owing to her engines having broken down shortly after crossing the bar. After a few days spent in trying to fix the machinery the tug Printer was engaged to tow the Hanthorn around to the Sound.

The challenge for a baseball game between the Foresters and the Clatskanie nines has not been accepted owing to the absence from the city of Steve Grant, captain of the former team. It was desired to have the same Sander and arrangements to that effect may yet be made.

The tug Samson was delayed in going to sea yesterday by coming in contact with a drifting net opposite the factory of the American Tug and Company. The net became entangled with the propeller and bow and had to be cut away from the former, delaying the tug's departure until 1 a. m.

The logging camps near Grays harbor are starting up again after having been shut down for several weeks. At the time over forty camps were closed in accordance with the agreement among the loggers to shut down for a month each year. Over production is given as the reason for the shut down.

The twenty-sixth annual review supplement to the Daily Commercial News of San Francisco has been issued and contains valuable statistics of interest to mariners and shippers. Among other interesting features is a table giving the yearly pack of salmon on the Pacific coast from the beginning of the industry in 1866 to the present time.

The O. R. & N. Co. has made a rate of \$56 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first and third Tuesdays, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

Samuel Twitt, a laboring man, living near Riverdale, died in the Multnomah county hospital Tuesday. While under the influence of liquor he stepped in front of a moving Southern Pacific locomotive and dived the engine to run over him. As the engine was moving at a good rate it was impossible to stop it in time and the unfortunate man was decapitated.

A telephone message received from Port Canby last night conveyed the news that fishing boat No. 28, operated by Harry Mitchell and John Ellis was capsized. The boat was in charge of Captain Stewart and the members of the crew rescued both men and also recovered the boat and net. The men were fishing for the Columbia River Packers Association.

Two arrests were made yesterday by Deputy Fish Warden Bullman and Water Bailiff Fred Wickman of fishermen without licenses. The prisoners are O. W. Olsen and A. Lawson, both are employed at Harrington's Pillar Rock cannery. Each boat had about a dozen salmon which were seized and sold to Schmidt & Co., the proceeds going to the hatchery fund. The men will be arraigned in court today.

Deputy Warden Bullman discovered yesterday that one of the fishermen working for Harrington's Pillar Rock Packing Company had paid their licenses. Mr. Harrington said he had written the body of the authorities that he would pay over the amount, whenever demand was made but in the meantime any fisherman caught on the Oregon side who has not complied with the law will be severely dealt with.

The arrangements for the funeral of John Shoreau, the fisherman who died Tuesday of apoplexy, have not yet been completed. The body is in charge of Coroner Fohl, who has wired the widow asking for instructions concerning the interment. Friends of Shoreau stated yesterday that the report that the dead man and his wife had been separated for some time, previous to his death was untrue, there having been no trouble between the couple.

Henry Claws, the New York banker, says in his weekly financial review: Crop reports are generally of a favorable character, notwithstanding the extraordinary weather of last week. The wheat crop is practically safe, and some estimates run as high as 700,000,000 bushels. While this seems an exaggerated figure, there is little doubt that the crop will be the largest on record. General business conditions are certainly satisfactory, and there is every prospect that the last six months of 1901 will be as good as the same time in 1900, if not better.

The Oregonian of yesterday said: "A. B. Hammond, president of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad, is now a full-fledged member of the chamber of commerce. He was elected at yesterday's meeting of the trustees. President Hahn is in the chair. The election is the result of the recent meeting of the creditors of an obscure New York street which has been crying Portland down. In the heat of a spirited discussion, Mr. Hammond declared that though he had been the means of introducing a great deal of capital into Oregon, he had never before been invited to a meeting of the chamber of commerce. He was assured that he would be welcomed at any and all times, and followed up the cue by putting in his application for membership. (Astoria papers please copy.)"

John Nordstrom returned last night from New York City, where he disposed of the shares of the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company to T. B. McGovern, who will in turn transfer the property to the Onifroy syndicate. The round about way employed was due to Mr. Nordstrom's instructions to sell for cash only. An offer was made of \$100,000 in cash and \$150,000 in preferred stock, but the syndicate insisted on the terms of the original option, which was for \$200,000 in cash. Mr. McGovern agreed to buy the stock for \$200,000 cash and will make \$50,000 on the deal. The money will be paid over July 25, when the deal will be completed.

The San Francisco Chronicle says an investigation will be held by the government inspectors relative to an alleged narrow escape from collision by the steamers George W. Elder and Minnie, which occurred a few days ago about 100 miles north of the Bay City. The Minnie coal laden, was on her way down from Puget sound, bound for Port Los Angeles, and the Elder was on her regular run to Astoria. During a light fog the two vessels narrowly avoided collision, and it was necessary for both steamers to reverse their engines and rapidly shoot off. There have been several allegations of neglect on the part of lookouts, but the master of the Elder is confident an investigation will clear every one connected with his steamer.

FOR PORTLAND'S GOOD.

Board of Trade Arranging for Big Meeting to Discuss Situation.

Chairman Francis I. McKenna, of the subcommittee recently appointed by the Portland board of trade to arrange for a mass meeting for the presentation and discussion of matters of vital interest to the city of Portland and state of Oregon, announces that arrangements have already been made for a number of good addresses. The exact date of the meeting has not yet been fixed, but it will be held some time between the first and the 15th of September, the time to be determined by the open dates that may be found in the Marquam theater during this period. It has been decided to hold the meeting in the Marquam theater because of its central location and the excellence of its seating equipment.

Among the speakers who have already been secured for the occasion are H. W. Best, editor of the Oregonian; City Attorney J. M. Long and Ellis E. Hughes, president of the port of Portland commission. Each of these speakers will speak upon a subject with which he is thoroughly familiar, and in reference to which he may be considered an authority.

Mr. Scott will speak upon "The Necessity of the Citizens of Portland Going Down Into Their Own Pockets for the Purpose of Exploiting and Developing the Coal Resources of the State."

In addition to these speakers, perhaps two or three others will be secured to discuss matters of equal importance, while an hour or more will be given to general discussion.

ARE HUMMEL INJURED.

Several others, attracted to the scene, had a similar experience. The current was finally cut off but not before Nelson had been literally cooked by the electric current. Mr. Nelson has a brother and several sisters in Evanston, Ill.
