The quarterly report of the city's finances show the receipts for the three months ending June 30 to have been \$34,616.18, and the disbursement to be \$28,957.07. The city's indebtedness amounts to \$223,221.51.

Owing to lack of quorum no meeting of the Push Club was held last night. Action was to have been taken on the proposition submitted by the Commercial Club for the consolidation of the two organizations. Considerable opposition to the proposed merging has developed and the plan will probably be defeated.

An elaborate program has been prepared for the ceremonies at Salem today when the crew of the battleship Oregon will turn over to the representatives of the state the colors of the ship flown on the homeward voyage. A number of Astorians will be present at the ceremonies.

The Portland Chronicle says: Hon. C. W. Fulton is not dead. His smiling fish traps at the mouth of the river, and that "Charlie" don't know about fishing isn't worth knowing. The O. R. & N. Co. has made a rate of \$86 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first and third Tuesdays, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

W. J. Ingalls, the well-known Lewis and Clarke rancher, was in the city last night to summon aid to a Mrs. Robinson, living near his place, who ruptured an artery of the leg yesterday afternoon. Dr. J. A. Fulton went out with Mr. Ingalls, but it was feared that he could be of but little assistance as the sufferer was thought to be bleeding to death when Mr. Ingalls started for this city.

The suit brought by the Baker's Bay Fish Company to restrain Charles A. Davis and Peter Anderson from constructing a fish trap within 500 feet lateral passage way on either side of traps owned by the plaintiffs will be argued in South Bend today. The law requires that 500 feet shall intervene. A temporary order was issued several days ago and the plaintiffs ask that the injunction be made permanent.

Judge Boise, of Salem, handed down an opinion Saturday holding that the law under which Ex-Fish Commissioner Reed held office was repealed by implication when the Home bill was passed at the last session. The decision was in the matter of E. C. Reed vs. Secretary of State Dunbar and was intended to compel the issuance of a salary warrant. This will probably dispose of the matter finally.

The work of rescuing car No. 3 from the river will be commenced today, and until it is taken to the shops for repairs it will be impossible to estimate the damage. Superintendent Colledge said yesterday that it would amount to at least \$1500. Mrs. Peterson, who was the most seriously hurt of the occupants, is feeling badly. Mr. Colledge has not yet made any extended inquiry into the accident and its causes. Motorman Meade has not been suspended and no action will be taken pending the investigation.

Sheriff Lavelle left last night for Salem with James Morrison, who was adjudged insane yesterday, and ordered confined to the state asylum. Previous to his arrest Morrison annoyed the residents of Seventeenth street considerably. He would stop children on the street and talk to them in an aimless, senseless sort of way. Also he was frequently found sitting on the door steps of occupied houses and in other ways made himself a nuisance. Morrison has been previously confined in asylums and according to his own story he escaped from the St. Jackson (Cal.) institution.

The twenty-two glove contest between Willie Cole, the crack California lightweight, and Toby Irwin who is rated as the best 120-pound boy on the coast, which is to take place in the Exposition building, Portland, on the 19th of this month, is attracting much interest in Portland and in fact all along the coast. Cole and Irwin fought once before and after a slashing battle which lasted fourteen rounds it was stopped and declared a draw. Both have improved considerably since their last contest and are anxious to settle their differences and the outcome will be a great contest.

The demurrage association recently formed in Seattle embracing all lines in Washington and Oregon, has adopted the following charge for demurrage to be effective July 20: On all cars held within a radius of ten miles of Seattle, Portland, Tacoma, Spokane, Everett and Astoria and other competitive points on the lines of the parties to the demurrage agreement, not including Sundays and holidays, rates shall be charged on demurrage as follows: On cars loaded with wheat held over seventy-two hours \$1 per day for the first five days and \$2 per day for each succeeding day. On all other cars held over forty-eight hours, \$1 per day for the first five days and \$2 per day for each succeeding day. A straight charge of \$2 per day will be made on all Standard Oil cars after forty-eight hours, as well as on all special cars, so designated by the superintendent or manager of the association.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Ordinance Introduced to Raise Salaries of Certain Officials.

At the regular meeting of the city council last night several matters of importance came up for discussion and disposal. An invitation was received from the Tacoma Elks to attend the carnival to be held in that city next month. An invitation was also received to attend the ceremonies at Salem today, attendant upon the turning over of the "homeward bound colors" of the battleship Oregon to the representatives of the state.

Three ordinances were introduced providing for increased salaries for the number of officials. They were read for the first time and will come up for final action at the next meeting. The proposed increases are: City attorney, from \$70 to \$90 a month; auditor, from \$100 to \$120 a month; city surveyor, from \$4 to \$5 per day, assistants to city surveyor, \$2.50 a day, ten hours to constitute a day's work. An ordinance was introduced by Mr. Scherneckau instructing the chief of police to return the delinquent tax roll for 1892 before September 2, and also to make out deeds to the city for such property as was bought in by the city at previous sales. Prior to September 1 property held for delinquent 1892 taxes may be redeemed without interest, cost or penalty.

The proposal of C. H. Page offering to pay \$44 in settlement of the Astor street improvements was declined. City Attorney Smith reported the status of cases now pending in which the city has an interest. Two ordinances for street improvements were passed under suspension of the rules. The streets to be improved are Sixth from Commercial to the street car tracks, and Seventeenth, from Commercial to Franklin avenue. Ordinances were introduced providing for appropriation for the benefit of R. Coast of \$150, and for C. G. Palmberg of \$206.14 for repairs to the two bell towers. Councilman Fitzgerald introduced an ordinance providing for the improvement of Thirty-fourth street, from Franklin avenue to Harrison, and also an ordinance for the construction of a drain on that street.

A communication was received from the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union calling the attention of the council to the construction of a fish trap within the city limits at a point near the Scandinavian cannery. The city attorney had informed a member of the union that there was no ordinance in effect governing the point involved, and he latter requested that some action be taken. The communication was referred to a subcommittee. Chairman Hanson, of the fire and water committee, was authorized to sell the heater in No. 2 Engine house to the Portland fire department for \$75. A communication was received from M. J. Kinney offering to pay taxes for 1896 on the same basis as had been previously proposed. No action was taken. A retail liquor license was granted to Mrs. Edwin Cummings, owner of the Occident hotel.

EDITORIAL ASTORIAN.

What a Californian Thinks of Editor Scott, of the Oregonian.

The Oregonian has apparently stirred up the wrath of the San Francisco Call. The following was published editorially in the Call in the issue of July 12, under the caption, "Oregonian Antics."

"We seem to have offended the Portland Oregonian and it has become peculiar in its temper toward the Call and all things Californian. We were not aware that the Oregonian considered Oregon such a wilderness among the states, that she gets green-eyed when the beau of the ball dances with California."

"Mr. Scott, who edifies, owns, inspires, guides and fashions the Oregonian, should not bite his thumb at California nor say bad things about the Call because we think well of this state. He should not let his temper go off in a way to disturb the cordial relations between the two states. If we are not all he could wish us to be let him remember that all things are accomplished by growth, and by what is today none can judge of what may be tomorrow."

"When Mr. Scott was spending all he had in live stock over in Clackamas county, he could not look forward with prophetic vision and see himself now, the Tyson of Oregon, and censor morum of the Pacific Coast. His personality has suppressed the Oregon as a figure, and the familiar lines of the great thrasher are now read:

"Where rolls the Oregonian And hears no sound Save its own lashings."

"Journalistic peace has been broken and grim-visaged war has taken its place, because we said the Grecian climate of California would produce here the Greek genius. To this Mr. Scott objects. Why? Does he expect an Attic development on the Willamette? While the future legend and vignette of California may be Venus rising from the sea, that of Oregon may be a duck sitting under an umbrella. Even now Editor Scott is dampened to his marrow by the clammy atmosphere which prevents the Attic salt from getting through the holes in the shaker. His editorial utterances have come to closely resemble the angry hiss of an old gander guarding his brood of green geese."

"Why does he object to Treks and Greek art in California? No one down here is in any agony of jealousy because of any of the gifts and graces of Oregon. From the dusty banks of the Malheur to the mouldy borders of the Columbia, where the air smells of a mixture of sagebrush and alkali and the contents of the dustpan are used to make salutaris biscuit, there is much picturesque misery in Oregon. But rising upon the plain of wet distress towers the form of Editor Scott, like Rooster Rock above the surging Columbia, or the tri-faced figure of Satan over the thick ice of the ninth circle of the tenth hell in Dante's Inferno; and like that diabolical image, chewing an offender in each of its mouths."

"Just now he has California in each of his three jaws and the champing is like the noise in Governor Panney's sawmill. The scene is attractive to the Greek intellect of California merely as an artistic suggestion. Here where the distils of the earth and the hues of the sky, in color though varied, in beauty may vie; it is a relief sometimes to turn for the pleasures of contrast to such a scene of terror and of tribulation. But recently this Oregon Wallpaper was tanning President McKinley for devotion to his sick wife, and now is tapering off on the Call and California. May the gods of Olympus get him and Chiron cool him off in the Styx by towing his inflamed ghost astern of his ferry-boat."

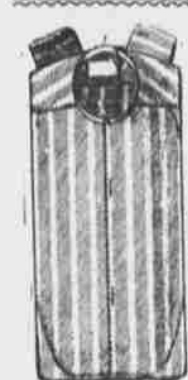
