Inspectors Balles and Bulger, of San Francisco, have concluded the investigation of the collision between the steamers George W. Elber and Minicola, which happened June 17 off Point Arena. Both captains were exonerated from blame.

These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

A team attached to a wagon loaded with boxes of furniture was excitedly running away yesterday morning by running away. The outfit belonged to the Prael & Cook Company and no damage was sustained other than a general distribution of the wagon's contents along the road.

John Opeel who was charged with having a slung on his possession out of season was arranged before Justice of the Peace Brower yesterday for trial. The defense was that the fish was dead when Opeel pulled it in and the state consented to a dismissal, the costs being paid by the defendant.

Deputy Fish Warden Bullman and Walter Haller Wickman arrested John Hansen today for fishing without a license. Hansen was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Brower and released on bail until next Wednesday, on which date the trial will take place. Hansen was employed by Schmidt & Company.

F. A. Fisher and Earl Fisher returned yesterday from the East. Mr. Fisher attended the meeting in New York of the representatives of the salmon syndicate and revisited his old home at Lynn, Conn. The intense heat in the East has not been exaggerated, according to the experiences of Mr. Fisher and there is much suffering.

The baseball game between the merchants and professional men will not be pulled off tomorrow as was at first announced. Captains Harrison Allen and Charles Higgins have found it impossible to get their respective teams in shape by that time and by mutual consent a postponement has been taken to Saturday, July 27. The proceeds of the game will go to the regatta fund.

There was a decided falling off in the run of fish yesterday although the lower grounds and gillnetters on the river did fairly well. At the jetty over 1200 pounds were caught in the morning haul and several boats made good catches. Apparently there were no fish in the upper rivers, neither the boatmen nor seamen getting large catches.

President Nelson, of the San Francisco chamber of commerce, declares that the tree popularly known as the "Oregon pine" outlasts every other pine known to civilization, and that it is superior for all purposes of manufacture to every other variety of the genus Abies, and that the navy department ought to adopt it officially for the sheathing of battleships. "Instead of Southern pine."

Earl Holmes, the 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Holmes, celebrated his 3rd birthday yesterday at the home of his parents and entertained thirteen of his friends. The family residence was tastefully decorated with beautiful ferns, margarites and other blossoms. Mrs. Holmes was a delightful hostess and at the conclusion of the party made each child guest happy by the presentation of a book. Master Earl received a number of pretty presents from his little friends.

The traps, appliances and canneries of the Ancores Packing Company have been turned over to the Alaska Packers' Association and articles of incorporation of six new fishing companies have been filed with the authorities at Whittier, Wash. The latter move is in compliance with the law prohibiting one fishing company from controlling more than three traps. The consideration for the transfer has not been made public but is known to be in the neighborhood of half a million dollars.

The postoffice department has contracted for an increase in the postal service in Alaska, that will provide quicker time between Seattle and Circle City and intermediate points and furnish a direct steamboat service to Sitka. The new contract calls for an additional round trip every month between Seattle and Circle City via Sitka and Valdez and the all-American overland route. The schedule time is shorter than ever before. The contract runs from October 1 to June 30.

The deep sea fishing schooner Jessie will hardly make this port again with a cargo of fish. The schooner returned yesterday from Portland and on the way down the river it was found necessary to throw 14,000 pounds of the cargo overboard. Three hundred pounds were sent to each of the charitable institutions in Portland and a small portion of the cargo was sold at retail. The trip to the Columbia has been profitable and in addition has entailed a loss. It is possible that hereafter the schooner will make San Francisco her home port.

The grand lodge of the A. O. U. W. is evidently not disposed to meddle with its constitution and by-laws. Nearly the entire session of yesterday was given up to the discussion of proposed amendments and their rejection. All said eight amendments were voted upon, and every one was defeated. The amendments were ordered filed away in the secret archives of the order, and are not to be made public. More amendments will be offered this afternoon, and if the grand lodge remains in the same mood, there is little question that they will meet the same fate.

The following from the Chicago Tribune will be of more than usual interest to local members of the Knights of Pythias: Having got rid of John A. Hiney, whom it charged with the troubles which have bedeviled the employment rank, the supreme lodge of the Knights of Pythias has decided to reorganize the insurance branch and to make impossible any such interference in the future. Its most important action is an increase in rates of 51 percent on the average. This drastic measure is expected, according to C. P. S. Next, the new head of the employment rank, "to drive away at least 20,000 members at the start," but it seemed the only way out. Besides this, the supreme lodge has formally pledged the entire membership and assets of the order for the speedy payment of the death claims due and for the maintenance of the certificates now in force.
