Over \$2000 has already been subscribed in Portland for the erection of a free swimming bath for boys. The committee in charge are determined to raise \$5000, the amount they claim will be necessary to carry the enterprise through to successful completion.

The semi-annual report of County Clerk Wherry will show an excess of the county's liabilities over its resources of \$20,000. This does not take into consideration the \$5000 to the credit of the Nehalem road fund. Last January the excess of liabilities was over \$40,000.

Major Humphries, who will have charge of the fortifications at the mouth of the Columbia river, has arrived from Manila and is now in Portland. He was granted a leave of absence by the department of thirty days and as soon as that expires he will assume charge of this station.

The second week of the harvest in the Walla Walla country is now in progress and the crop is a splendid one. There is plenty of help to care for it, and with prices soaring because of the drought in the East and South, farmers in the Walla Walla country are pleased with their prospective prosperity.

The proved claims of the First National Bank of Vancouver affected by the declaration of a 50 per cent dividend aggregate \$113,558. Temporary Receiver Maxwell will be succeeded, on August 15, by A. H. Eastham, of Vancouver, who has been appointed permanent receiver and will wind up the bank's affairs.

The special train carrying the party of Portland business men to Lewiston, where they will meet the congressional committee on rivers and harbors, which will arrive from Seattle over the Northern Pacific. The entire party will arrive in Portland on the return trip Friday and will immediately proceed eastward over the O. R. & N.

The incorporation papers of the Nehalem Coal Company were filed in Salem Monday. The plans and scope of the company have been previously published. The capital stock is \$150,000, divided into shares of \$100 each. W. H. Copeland, James A. Fay, W. J. Cook and J. F. Hamilton are the incorporators of record.

Owing to a delay growing out of the steel workers' strike in the East, construction of the new bridge at the mouth of the Columbia river is progressing as rapidly as they expect on the installation of the four Stevens water system. A consignment of machinery ordered some time ago has not yet arrived and the probable date of its delivery is uncertain.

The Oregonian recently stated that there was a chance for the development of deep sea fishing industry off the Oregon coast. As a matter of fact numerous attempts have been made to work the fishing banks below the Columbia but the fish have been found so infrequently as to be practically unobtainable, a condition attributed to a mineral contamination of the water, the exact nature of which is not definitely known.

Leslie Balliet, the Baker City mine promoter, whose mail was temporarily stopped by the United States authorities, has returned to Eastern Oregon. After visiting Washington, where he satisfied the postal officials that his business was legitimate, Balliet purchased a newspaper in Boston, which is being filled with a complete new plant. The city of Browning and beans has long escaped "yellow journalism," perhaps Mr. Balliet will show them what it is.

Preparations are maturing for the Sunday school convention for Clatsop county to be held at Astoria on July 30, for the purpose of organizing a county association. An all-day program will be given, of addresses, papers, discussions and conferences, which will be beneficial to all who are interested in such work. State Field Worker Dotson and Primary Superintendent Mrs. Kiggins, of the state association, will assist in the convention. All Sunday school officers, teachers and pupils are invited to attend.

The terms on which Mr. Cudaby, the Chicago pork packer, agrees to relinquish his interests in the Pacific American Fisheries Company, are these: The new concern is to pay \$100,000 cash for the \$1,000,000 preferred stock of the Pacific American, and to give one-half a share of the common stock of the new company for a full share of the common stock of the Pacific American, of which there are four million shares. In other words, supposing the common stock of the new company is worth 25 cents on the dollar, Mr. Cudaby will get \$1,500,000 for his mammoth plant here. The option expires August 10, 1901.

The baseball game between teams composed of the professional and business men of the city has been set for Friday of this week and will be called at 3:30 p. m. An admission fee of 25 cents, including the grand stand, will be charged and the proceeds will go to the regatta fund. The teams will be made up as follows: Professional—Dr. C. A. Cardner, C. C. Fulton, Harrison Allen, C. R. Thomson, J. A. Eakin, John H. Smith, Neil Stupp, John McCue, Geo. W. McBride, M. M. Bransford, A. M. Smith. Business men—Robert Gibson, W. E. Ross, Duncan McLean, C. R. Higgins, O. J. Peterson, H. R. Hoeder, John R. Griffin, H. C. Thompson, Payne, Messers, C. R. Higgins and Harrison Allen are captains of the respective teams.

The state board of agriculture has completed its arrangements for the prompt erection of the buildings as the fair grounds, and a full force of carpenters have begun work under the direction and supervision of S. A. McFadden, in erecting the buildings, and finishing the contract abandoned by R. T. Denham. The board is much pleased with the progress made in every way for the success of the fair this fall, as the outlook is the brightest possible. M. D. Wisdom, secretary of the board, in speaking of the fair recently said: "It will be the greatest exposition and school ever seen in the Northwest Pacific coast states, for the industrial work and will be a magnificent showing of the wonderful resources of the state of Oregon."

The coroner's jury empaneled to determine the cause of the death of Wong Gok, who was killed in an accident at the Kinross cannery Monday, will report this morning. Yesterday the jury viewed the remains and the report room of the cannery. In the absence of Coroner Phil Justice of the Peace Brower presided. Dr. A. A. Finch testified that death was caused by a compound comminuted fracture of the skull, nearly the entire front having been crushed in. Frank Crang, who was in charge of the reports, said that there was ten pounds less pressure in the exploded round than is ordinarily used. Owing to important business engagements of several members of the jury the inquest was continued until this morning. The body will be shipped to Portland today for interment.

Another large audience greeted the Weidemann Repertoire Company at Fisher's opera house last night, the bill being a clever and entertaining comedy-drama, "In the Ropes of the Gallery." The comedy parts were in the hands of Tom Weidemann and Nellie Long. The former, as the rollicking Irish servant, who stood with his young master when all the world was against him, made friends with the audience from the start. Jack T. Williams played the part of the wronged hero who eventually came into his own in a more creditable manner, and Frank Long gave a successful representation of a stern villain. The specialties were entertaining and particularly so because of the beautiful electric dances of Miss Weidemann, with the accompanying brilliant combinations of lights and colors. The company has made a decided hit with Astoria players, and should have crowded houses nightly. The bill for tonight will be "A Soldier's Sweetheart."

Officers of the national guard of the state of Washington, both commissioned and uncommissioned, are reported as taking strong exception to that part of article XIX, of the military code, just issued by Governor Rogers, which refers to the enforcement of laws and the conduct of the troops facing a mob. In paragraph 54 of the article, commanding officers of troops called into action against a mob are directed that their men shall never be given an order to fire over the heads of the mob but should aim at the center of the body of the nearest member of the mob. This rule, it is contended, is revolutionary in character and goes much farther than the regulations of the United States army governing the same subject. It is claimed that the precedent established in the United States army is that on the first volley aim shall be taken over the heads of the mob and not at its members, thereby giving the rioters a chance to disperse and the innocent spectators an opportunity to seek cover.

At the State Agricultural College experiment station a discovery was made recently that promises to throw some light on untimely rains, of which there has been considerable complaint from various sections of the Willamette valley. In a number of samples of unhealthy grain Prof. Corbridge detected a clearly defined parasitic fungus. The fungus appears in the lower latitudes of the stem, particularly at the crown where the roots are given off from the stem. The attack is characterized by a blackened condition of the tissues, giving it the appearance of blackened decay. The investigations are to be continued, and for the purpose Professor Corbridge desires to secure samples of the diseased grain from as widely scattered fields and from as many kinds of soil as possible. It is highly probable that the light yield of last year was occasioned by the disease of which discovery has just been made. Of this, however, investigations have not yet proceeded far enough to speak with any degree of certainty.

SOLDIER OF FORTUNE.

Astoria Visitor Who Has Passed Through Stirring Scenes.

A dark complexioned, fine appearing man of about 27 years, arrived in the city yesterday, and attracted the attention of all who chanced to see him. He is Alfred E. Rose, former Brazilian capitalist, revolutionist and late scout in the American army. He is now an exile from his native land, and, like other exiles, has sought the protection of the Stars and Stripes.

Mr. Rose comes of an old Brazilian family. His father owned a large plantation near Rio Janeiro and amassed a fortune in the coffee trade. The family was always loyal to the monarchy and bitterly opposed the revolutionists who overthrew the old government and set up the republic. When the change came, the Rose family submitted peacefully, but eventually the practices of the men at the head of the republic became so obnoxious that there was a revolt.

A brief but fierce struggle ensued, and the royalists were subdued. Among the other prominent men captured was Mr. Rose, who was held in prison for a time, but finally released. Ere long, however, another revolution occurred. This time the royalists were much better prepared, and, as will be remembered, the fighting became so fierce that all the powers sent warships to Rio to protect the interests of the various governments. Rose, with other leaders, was again taken prisoner, and he was finally exiled.

Without a home—his plantations having been confiscated by the greedy, state-borne came to America. He took up his residence in Springfield, Mass., where he became quite popular, being very well educated and of gentlemanly demeanor. When the Spanish war broke out, Rose went to Cuba, where he was a scout in the American army. He has credentials from several commanders which are highly flattering to his valor. He was in the thick of every fight and lost the sight of his right eye and two fingers from the right hand in the fighting.

When the war ended in Cuba, Rose returned to America with his regiment. He was not long here when the command was ordered to the Philippines. There Rose again acted as a scout for our troops, and especially distinguished himself by capturing a Filipino officer. During all the trouble he was at the front and was engaged in all the important battles, the nature of his duty taking him where the bullets flew thickest. His regiment was finally sent home, arriving on the transport Garconna at the Presidio last month.

"I believe the Philippines will not be pacified for at least two years," said Rose yesterday. "They regard the Americans as intruders, just as they regarded the Spanish, and not until that feeling is entirely obliterated will there be peace. The Philippines are a worthless place, and I think the government made a bad investment in ever asserting its sovereignty."

"While the American troops are the finest I have ever seen, I am somewhat disappointed with many of the American officers. In Manila the Filipinos were given better food than that apportioned the soldiers and the transport service was really awful. There is certainly need for reform in the Philippines."

"In my native country conditions are worse than ever. The men at the head of the present government are there for their own gain and sooner or later the government must fall. I hope the day will come when Brazil will be annexed to the United States. Personally, I am in favor of another demonstration against the republic and will join the first revolutionary movement that is started."

Rose likes the coast much and will probably locate here.

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

Shows Oregon Fall Grains Are in Excellent Condition.

The following is reprinted from the weekly crop bulletin issued by the department of agriculture:

The week has been rainless, except along the coast and in the lower portion of the Willamette valley, where a few small showers have been reported. There has been an abundance of sunshine. The maximum temperatures during the week in Western Oregon ranged between 69 degrees and 88 degrees, and the minimum temperature between 48 and 61 degrees. In Eastern Oregon the maximum temperatures ranged between 50 and 66 degrees. The nights have been uniformly cool and the days ideal for the ripening of grain and fruit.

Haying is now nearly finished in all sections of the state and the crop has been secured in excellent condition. The yields have been above the average in Southern Oregon and the coast districts and slightly below the average in Eastern Oregon. The second crop of alfalfa is making excellent progress and will be ready to cut by August 1. Pastures are drying up rather earlier than usual and in some few places range stock is falling off in flesh.

Fall grain is filling well and ripening rapidly and harvest work in the grain fields is now general. In the Willamette valley the crop of both fall and spring wheat will be heavy and of a good quality. The oat crop is even more promising than wheat. In Southern Oregon the outlook is not favorable for a large crop, but the expectations are that the grade will be higher than usual. In Eastern Oregon what is maturing rapidly, but the crop is uneven, some correspondents reporting the prospects favorable for average yields, while others claim that the late frosts and winds have

shriveled the berries and that the yields will be considerably below the average.

The hop foliage is not as thick as usual, and some yards look rather yellow, but the berries are developing nicely and give promise of a full crop. Lice are reported in small numbers in nearly all yards, and many growers are spraying or else getting ready to spray. Corn is tasseling low and now growing rapidly, but owing to the lateness of the season the prospects of a full crop are rather discouraging. Potatoes, as a rule, are not doing as well as usual, owing to the dry weather, and corn, gardens and spring wheat would all be benefited by rain.

Fruit is maturing nicely, and blackberries, raspberries, early plums and peaches are in the market.
