

TO ABANDON USE OF STEAM ENGINES

Canadian Pacific May Substitute Electric Power.

PROJECT BELIEVED FEASIBLE

Electricians Studying the Practicability of Using the Vast Water Powers of the Rockies to Haul Trains Up Steep Grades.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Shall the Canadian Pacific in the near future abandon the use of steam engines on the high mountain grades and have recourse to electric power? That is a question that will be submitted at the next meeting of the board of directors, says the Montreal correspondent of the Times.

It is well known that for some time past the company has had electricians at work studying the practicability of utilizing the energy contained in the vast water powers of the Rockies as a means of supplying electric power to haul the trains up the steep grades. At present a number of engines have to be kept at these points to assist in hauling the trains.

The greatest difficulty the electricians have been trying to overcome is the transmitting of the power over a distance. Superintendent Timmerman, in the employ of the road at Toronto, firmly believes, however, that the scheme can be carried through successfully and that owing to the unlimited electric power available, it will take the place of steam power all through the Rocky Mountains.

DR. KOCH'S DISCOVERY

STARTLING STATEMENT OF A BERLIN PHYSICIAN.

Meat and Milk of Infected Cattle May Be Consumed With Impunity.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Prof. Koch, of Berlin, will announce, says a Herald dispatch from London, his discovery that having tuberculosis is not transmissible to the human system. The famous bacteriologist in an interview announced the statement that he has demonstrated that meat and milk from tuberculous cattle may be consumed with impunity.

Dr. Koch's discovery, the official representative of the American Medical Association, says: "If I had not heard Prof. Koch's discovery, I would have believed that the discovery would have seemed to me absolutely incredible. I can only say that Dr. Koch is a profound student and has been much helped in his studies by the discovery of the tubercle bacillus." "If he is able to demonstrate that the tubercle bacillus is not transmissible to the human system, the world will be shaken to the very foundations. This would revolutionize the entire system of the world, and the discovery will be of the greatest importance to the human race."

English experts talked of the theory with mingled astonishment and contempt, and asserted that the German professor would encounter stubborn facts and learned disproof of his "discovery."

Dr. Robert, health commissioner of Chicago, when informed of Prof. Koch's discovery, said: "The discovery is certainly of the highest importance especially in regard to milk. As far as meat is concerned, I have believed it contained elements of danger when cooked and therefore the announcement has comparatively less significance for the people of the civilized world. As to milk taken in its natural state, it is a difficult proposition. While probably nobody is desirous of drinking the milk of tuberculous cows, yet a great many would be assured if it could be consumed with impunity. The discovery will also have a practical result in simplifying the work of milk inspection, although not altogether rendering this unnecessary."

PROSPECTS NOT SO BAD

EFFECT OF THE HEAT ON WESTERN CROPS

Secretary Wilson Hopeful of an Average Corn Crop—Advice to Farmers.

NEW YORK, July 23.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Washington says: Mr. Wilson, secretary of agriculture, has favored the Tribune with a talk on the effects of the long continued drought on the growing crops of the West. He does not take so gloomy a view of the agricultural prospects as some of the agricultural experts who are not connected with the government service.

Not yet does Mr. Wilson attempt to minimize the injury already done and that will increase unless there is a great precipitation of moisture during the next few weeks in the vast stretch of country between the continental mountain ranges. While he acknowledges that the wheat belt of the Northwest has been damaged, he does not say that it is as bad as some of the agricultural experts who are not connected with the government service.

The secretary is especially hopeful of an average corn crop. He says it will not be a record breaker or a "bumper" in the parlance of the agricultural department, but at this moment the prospects favor a fair average yield. Mr. Wilson said:

"If something could be done to induce the farmers in the corn belt to extend their production of cultivation about two weeks this year beyond the usual limit I would look for a big crop. But the usual season for cultivation is rapidly passing and it is not a fact that with comparatively few exceptions the farmers will try by shortening the regular time of cultivation of the crop."
