Captain Young of the Portlath, returned yesterday from Portland, where he secured a charter. The ship will take on a cargo of wheat for Europe and will leave up the river this morning.

The steamer Indravelli, from the Orient, arrived yesterday with four Chinese passengers and a small cargo. She proceeded up the river and will take on a cargo of general merchandise for Oriental ports.

Mrs. Munson, of Skippoon, will soon be able to return to her home, as she is rapidly recovering from the effects of a critical operation successfully performed by Dr. Owens Adair at the hospital.

Services will be held tomorrow at the Swedish Baptist church at their hall on Franklin avenue. Missionary G. A. Ostrink will conduct the meeting both morning and evening, and everybody is invited to attend.

Grays Harbor is strictly up to date on the transportation proposition. An automobile capable of carrying thirty people has been placed on the run between Hoquiam and Aberdeen, making the round trip every two hours.

At a meeting of the directors of the Commercial Club held last night, an amendment to the constitution was adopted whereby non-resident members will be admitted without initiation fee and will pay dues of \$5 annually.

Louis D. Campbell, receiver for the Lewis Dredging Company of Tacoma, has wound up the affairs of the receivership and between himself and law partner \$10,000 in fees have been allowed. Absent a receivership is a profitable appointment.

Linn county's largest crop this year is hay. It is the largest in the history of the county, and the farmers have been taxed to secure sufficient help to save it. The immense crop has lowered the price, and the best quality is selling for from \$1 to \$1.50 loose delivered.

The Evening Telegram prints a story on the scarcity of labor in the canneries here and says that \$100 advance, fare both ways and three months' employment at \$75 with board and quarters has been offered for Chinese help and none can be found even at these prices.

Matthias Albrecht, living near Milton, has made his will and died with the county clerk, W. D. Chamberlain. So far as is known, this is the first instance of the kind in Tillamook county, and it is not improbable that not half a dozen such cases are on record in Oregon.

The O. R. & N. has made a rate of \$6 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first to third Tuesdays, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

The county court adjourned yesterday for the term. Experts Clark and Buchanan were engaged to examine the reports of the county officials. Clinton and Son were awarded a contract to rebuild the bridge across O'Hanna creek, near Leighton's. The Columbia Digger company received a contract to construct 3000 yards of dike on the Nehalem road at 87 cents a lineal foot, provided the work is completed by May 15, the payments to be in warrants.

A second filing on the Nehalem river and tributaries with a map and declaration of intentions to improve the waterways was accepted by County Clerk Wherity yesterday. It will be recalled that a filing was previously made on the same territory by the New York and Oregon Coal Company. Representatives of the Wheeler Lumber Company alleged the papers to be faulty and offered a filing sometime ago, which the county clerk refused, because of the provision of the law directing that 30 days must elapse before the second filing can be received. A similar situation arose in Columbia county and upon mandamus proceedings being instituted Judge McBride held that the clerk of that county should accept the second filing.

The cottage at Clatsop beach built by Mother John the Baptist, provincial superior of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, will be ready for occupancy August 1. The lots were donated by Rev. Leopold Diehlman and the cottage will be a haven for members of the order who are in need of rest and recuperation.

Announcement has been made that the construction work on the telegraph line to Dawson will be completed on August 1. According to the present plans there will be 1754 miles of line in operation in Alaska. The southern terminus of the line will be at Ashcroft and Vancouver messages will be repeated from that point.

Lizzie Wilson, who has been at the hospital for some time suffering from a complication of diseases, died yesterday morning. The woman recently had a severe attack of typhoid pneumonia. A brother in San Francisco has been notified and it is expected that he will direct what disposition shall be made of the remains.

John Carr, who has been arrested on several occasions, set fire to the mattress in the cell occupied by him in the city jail, early yesterday morning with the evident intention of burning the place. The screams of the other prisoners were heard outside and Chief Hallock summoned. The fire was extinguished before it had made much headway.

There will be a baseball game tomorrow at the A. F. C. grounds between the teams representing the Elks and Eagles. The game was scheduled for last Sunday but inclement weather made a postponement necessary. Both teams have been strengthened and a rattling good game should be put up. Admission, including the grand stand, has been fixed at 25 cents.

The Columbia River and Puget Sound Navigation Company are to have a new vessel completed to add to the Flyer by the time the new interurban line between Seattle and Tacoma is in operation. The surface transportation is expected to cause a decrease in the water traffic but the owners of the latter service are getting ready for active and vigorous competition.

Mrs. J. T. Ross entertained Governor and Mrs. Geo. W. and Mrs. Perry Trullinger and Miss Agnes Watt, of Portland, on board the launch, Sylph yesterday afternoon and various points of interest on the river were visited. Later the party attended the baseball game between the professional and business men's teams and in the evening Mr. and Mrs. Perry Trullinger entertained with a box party at the opera house.

The usual services will be observed at the First Lutheran church tomorrow. Topic for morning sermon, service in Swedish, "The Kind Warning of the Savior. Beware of False Prophets!" evening topic, in English, "The Gifts of the Holy Spirit." The pastor, Rev. A. G. Rydquist, will leave Monday for La Crosse, Wash., and will remain over the following Sunday. Services will be omitted on that date.

Fish Commissioner Little has been interviewed in Tacoma on the probable season's pick on the Sound and predicts that the output will exceed 1,000,000 cases and under favorable circumstances may reach 1,500,000. Mr. Little further said that he would recommend to the next legislature to include May and June in the closed season on the Columbia river. Mr. Little pins his faith to artificial propagation as the only salvation for the industry.

The run of fish continued good yesterday and the canners and cold storage men are still bemoaning the scarcity of labor. At the Elks Miller sands between fifteen and twenty tons were caught during the day and other localities reported plenty of fish in the river. Four cars of fresh fish were shipped to Warren's canneries at The Dalles last night. There is a lack of refrigerator cars available or more fresh fish would be shipped to up-river canneries.

The largest crowd that has greeted the Waldmanns repertoire company during its engagement, was present last night. By 8 o'clock all the seats were sold and standing room was at a premium. The farce comedy "A Steam Laundry" was well presented and the clever specialties were fully appreciated by the audience. At the matinee today the society comedy "Village Bells" will be presented and for tonight the bill is "Little Miss Thompson," a comedy of much merit. The engagement will close with the performance Sunday night at which time the roaring farce, "Tut! Naughty Kid," will be the bill.

There is apparently a decided division among the members of the county court as to the completion of the Nehalem road. On two occasions Judge Gray has introduced resolutions instructing Roadmaster Frye to proceed with the construction work. Each time Commissioners Young and Peterson have voted against the resolution. When the matter was discussed at a previous term of the court the commissioners gave as their reason for opposing the construction of the road that the source of the money to pay for the work was uncertain. Yesterday Judge Gray added to his former resolution the words "as long as the warrants on said road fund can be disposed of at par or face value." A substitute measure was passed authorizing the construction of the road to the four-mile post, the men to be paid with warrants on the fund.

MERCHANTS WIN OUT.

Ten Thrilling Innings and the Score Was 14-15 at the Finis.

You may talk about the Giants, and baseball in the East. You may shout it 'til your's purple in the face; We have got an aggregation that are champions of creation, And we'll win the minute Thompson steals a base.

We have heard a lot of Casey and the time he fanned the air— We begin to think that Casey had a pull. But we'll bet that Casey never, at least—well—hardly ever Tried to steal a base with all the bases full.

There was lots of trouble brewing as the innings rolled around. In the fifth the merchants very softly cured. For defeat was at them staring despite their deeds of daring. Until Thompson gently sneaked away from first.

The movement came so quickly that the others stood aghast. For both the other bags were occupied. While they stood around and bantered, toward the home plate "Perry" cantered. And McLean moved up to third with swinging stride.

Dan Allen did some batting that helped the runners home— Gibson's pitching shortly evened up the score. Then came victorious ending, cheers and hurrahs loudly blending. When in the tenth the Merchants scored one more.

So here's to you, Mr. Thompson, 'twas a very daring play. And in baseball fame your name should have a place— Not many would have done it, the game you surely won it. When you started in to pilfer second base.

There were not several thousand people at the A. F. C. grounds yesterday to see the baseball game between the merchants and professional men. The ragtag and bobtail will not be more than 500 or 600 dollars ahead as a result, but those who were present rejoiced. To say that it was a great game but fairly expressed it. The inadequacy of mere words is pitifully apparent in an attempt to do the game justice. The score of 14 to 15 in favor of the merchants' team expresses nothing. National league teams have played games where the score was as close but they never played a game that could compare with yesterday's.

The brass band that had been faithfully promised did not materialize. But the enthusiasm of the players was in no way dimmed by this omission, and they left for the ball ground on scheduled time. The festivities opened promptly at 2:30. The costumes varied all the way from the regulation baseball uniforms to Hoffman's "candy pants."

The majority of the professional men had their rather limbo clad in garments made of bed-checking. Probably this was a joke but nobody asked the answer and it was left. "Doc" Gordiner walked up to the bat as soon as Umpire Johnson called time. Walter Ross, attired in a blue-striped shirtwaist, was in the box. Behind the bat was Charles Higgins. Mr. Ross led a pretty curve out but the "twirl" was to the back, and Gordiner connected with it for a grand slam towards third base. Possibly the doctor's intention was to hit right but he didn't hit hard enough and the ball came in half-traced. McLean the batter was safe at first. G. A. Fulton fired the pitcher out towards the shortstop but neither could not reach in time. A wild throw came Fulton second and advanced Gordiner to third. But when you think of it, it was a wild throw the first time through, the second time it was 10-15.

Then Thompson stole second base and from that time on all the good little spirits of fairplay including Umpire Johnson, pulled for the merchants. The way Thompson stole second should be historical. Ferguson and reached second and McLean was on first when Thompson walked on four balls. This made the bases full but Thompson didn't care and as soon as Pitcher Cordner let the ball go he started in to steal second. For a moment the play was not comprehended and when it was, large gobs of advice were hurled out from every side. "Go to first!" "Hold second!" "Throw the ball!" and somebody did throw it up in the air. Unfortunately Captain Allen had supposed to have that part of the ball caught and Ferguson, who had been watching the trend of things reached the home plate before the ball. This allowed McLean to reach third on safety, and Thompson reached on second while he modestly bowed off. The assignment of the bases then three and a tiger came out when two men are on the same base some one has been put out but the board of strategy had eliminated all possibility of defeat and the maneuver went through.

Umpire Johnson was very kind—to both sides. Some of his decisions were excellent. Others were—but what's the use. There was a good natured disposition to let the merchants catch up in the first part of the game, which same disposition vanished when the score was a tie and ten innings were required to score the winning run. Gibson was put in the box for the merchants after the third inning and Cordner was in the same position for the professional men during the entire game. Seriously speaking, considering the fact that the players' acquaintance with baseball has been practically nil since their school days there is no room for criticism, neither is there any reason to doubt but that with a little more practice the two teams could put up a rattling good game. Harrison Allen covered second like a leaguer, Higgins, Strupp and others played good ball. Flies were muffed, and grounders allowed to pass, but the wholesome fun of the proceedings more than repaid the errors.
