

MOSQUITOS TO BE EXTERMINATED

Plans of New York Health Officer Are Successful.

LIMA OIL WILL BE USED

Spread of Malarial Fever on Staten Island Believed to Be Caused by These Pests—Experiments to Be Made.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Dr. A. H. Doty, after this week, will leave mechanical operations to abate the pest of mosquitoes on Staten Island to the city authorities, says the Times. But in view of the demands on his time as a state health officer and the success he has had in his work he has decided to limit all operations outside the laboratory of the quarantine.

"I have," said Dr. Doty, "succeeded beyond my expectations and as the work is a labor of love, I prefer that the proper authorities take up my burden. I have proved that Lima oil will destroy mosquitoes in their larval and matured state and that anopheles, which spread malaria, exist on Staten Island and have caught this culex in a house where there are several cases of malarial fever of a severe type.

"I have also pointed out that Lima oil may be used with success on the breeding places of the culex, but at the same time I have contended that the right way to go about it is to drain or fill up such breeding places.

"All that there is to be done now is to elicit the association of malaria with anopheles to find the same plasmodium or germ in the insects captured at Concord as may be found in the blood of the persons who suffer from malaria there. This is the scientific end of it. I shall follow this up at the quarantine laboratory."

ALL AGREED ON TARIFF.

Details of the Arrangement for Signing of Protocol.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The following exact statement of certain phases of the Chinese negotiations is given from authoritative sources in order to correct some misapprehension which has arisen from published reports as to the possible causes of delay in signing the protocol at Peking.

All the negotiators are agreed on the tariff matter. The present ad valorem tariff is to be converted into a specific tariff at the average rates of the present treaty tariff, five per centum, effective and articles now on the free list are to be included in the new specific schedule. The details of this arrangement are to be left to a special commission, to sit hereafter, probably at Shanghai.

The details of the arrangement for the prohibition of the importation of fire arms, munitions and materials for their manufacture were settled some months ago. They provided for the seizure by the foreign warships, of any Chinese or foreign ships entering Chinese waters with the prohibited articles on board and also for such steps as each of the several foreign governments may deem it proper or be in a position to take in order to prohibit the exportation of arms and supplies from their respective countries to China.

The state department is not officially advised of the provisions of an amendment to the article of protocol which is reported to have been introduced recently but its object would seem to be to require the Chinese authorities to actively co-operate in enforcing the prohibition, which the Chinese negotiators have already adopted in principle.

THREATENED WITH BANISHMENT

Kitchener Calls on All to Surrender on September 15th.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—A parliamentary paper has been issued containing the proclamation issued by Lord Kitchener August 7 in accordance with instructions from the imperial government, the governments of Cape Colony and Natal concurring. The proclamation says:

"All commandants, field cornets and leaders of armed bands, being burghers of the late republic and all engaged in resisting his majesty's forces whether in the Orange Colony, the Transvaal or other portions of his majesty's South African dominions and all members of the late governments of the Orange-Free-State and Transvaal, unless they surrender before September 15, be permanently banished from South Africa.

"The cost of maintenance of families of the burghers in the field who have not surrendered by September 1, shall be recoverable from such burghers and shall be a charge upon their property.

The preliminary correspondence shows that the proclamation is based upon the suggestions which the government of Natal forwarded to Colonial Secretary Chamberlain July 4th, and that the date September 15 was recommended by Lord Milner.

SUIT INVOLVES MILLIONS.

Binghamton Woman Sues to Recover Large Tract of New York Realty.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Rebecca Ann McDonald, of Binghamton, N. Y., is said to be preparing to enter suit to recover property in the city the value of which is estimated at \$100,000. Two hundred and eighty property owners are said to be involved.

The claims will be made under the will of Jacob T. Arden, who died in 1893. He owned what was then known as the Arden farm, situated on the east side of Manhattan island. At that time it was wild land but is now situated in the center of the most populous up town district of New York.

Jacob Arden left a will leaving his property to his only son, Jacob S. Arden, but provided in the will that in the event his son died without issue the property should go to John Summers, his nephew. It is asserted that John Summers sold his contingent claim to Jacob S. Arden for \$500 and believing that he had thus purchased the right to dispose of the property, Jacob Arden did so before he died a bachelor. It is on this issue that the claim of Rebecca Ann McDonald is based. She claims to be a granddaughter of Jacob Arden.

RACE FOR CUP DEFENDERS.

Atlantic Yacht Club Offers a Trophy for the Three Races.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The regatta committee of the Atlantic Yacht Club has announced that the club will offer a trophy for a race off Sea Gate, Norton's point, between the yachts Columbia, Constitution and Independence. It is the desire of the committee that the contest shall take place after the club's cruise in September.

The course will be one of two, which may be decided upon by the owners of the big yachts, either from Sea Gate to the Sandy Hook lightship and return or an outside triangular course of thirty miles with a ten mile stretch to each leg.

The club is anxious to bring about the meeting between the big boats before the international yacht races.

TAKEN FOR AN ANARCHIST.

New Jersey Councilman Has an Unexpected Experience in Holland.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Word has been received at Plainfield, N. J., regarding a public experience that Councilman Vonhorwerden of that city had in Holland, where he is on a visit. It was while attempting to see Queen Wilhelmina that he got into trouble.

He was accused by some of the guards of the court, who it is said regarded Mr. Vonhorwerden with suspicion and took him for an anarchist. He tried to explain but to no purpose. The guards placed him under arrest and he was taken before a magistrate. As soon as the prisoner got an opportunity he satisfactorily explained his actions and was released.

APPEAL TO CHURCHMEN.

Strikers Ask That Only Union Men Be Employed on Churches.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—A committee has been appointed by the Building Trades Unions to wait upon Archbishop Corrigan with the request that he use his influence with the contractors on the extension to St. Patrick's Cathedral on Fifth avenue to prevent the employment of non-union workmen.

Complaints have been made that non-union men, rock-drillers, engineers and blacksmiths are at work. Similar request will be presented to Bishop Patterson, with regard to the new Episcopal Cathedral of St. John the Divine. The delegates say they believe the matter can be settled without any resort to a strike.

INSURANCE COMPANIES JOIN

Phoenix Assurances Take Over the Atlas of London.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—A special cable to the Journal of Commerce from London announces that the Phoenix Assurance Company of London takes over the Atlas Assurance Company of London and that Samuel J. Pipkin, general manager and secretary of the Atlas of London, has been elected general manager of the Phoenix, succeeding the late Francis H. McDonald.

In 1900 the life premiums of the Atlas were \$785,000 and the fire premiums \$217,000, of which \$731,000 was from the United States.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The best known bicyclists in the country will meet at Madison Square Garden tonight in a contest for the national circuit championship. Among the starters scheduled are Kraemer, Taylor, Cooper, Penn, McFarland, Gascoyne, Jenkins, Kimble, Newhouse, Fisher, Leander, Collet, Wilson and the new star, Iver Lawson.

The leaders stand: Kraemer, 37; Taylor, 23; Cooper, 12; Fisher, 12; Penn, 11; Wilson, 7; Lawson, 6; Gascoyne, 5; McFarland, 4; Kimble, 4.

EFFECT NOT SERIOUS

REPORTS OF DAMAGE TO CORN CROP EXAGGERATED.

Unusually Heavy Harvest in All the States Which Have Been Affected by Drouth.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The Journal of Commerce has collected opinions from the leading bank officials and the prominent dry goods and grocery houses of the west tending to show that business interests have not been seriously affected in that section as a result of damage to corn by drouth in the states of Kansas, Missouri, Iowa and Nebraska.

The reports in question, the Journal of Commerce says, will prove something of a surprise are explained by the fact that it is generally believed that the effects of drouth upon corn, especially those forwarded while the drouth was in full swing, were more or less exaggerated.

Continuing, the Journal of Commerce says: "The effects are quite numerous and important. Among them may be mentioned the unusually heavy harvest of winter wheat in all the states in question. This has already been secured and is a matter of conjecture. Again there is the large production of soy and in connection with this may be noted the large foreign crop, some now being planted, which are a guarantee that the farmers will be able to carry their stock cattle through regardless of the damage to and high price of corn."

PANAMA REBELS DELAY TRAIN.

Four Government Officials Were Forced to Abandon the Coach.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—A dispatch to the Herald from Panama gives the following account, of the manner in which the Panama railway train was stopped by revolutionaries at Matichin station. The train which left Panama for Colon on Tuesday morning had been held up at Matichin station half an hour by a band of revolutionaries. Twenty-five armed men boarded the train and abducted four government officials. They did not fire any shots or injure the railway employees or passengers.

On the train were passengers en route for New York by the steamship Financiero. There were also on board fourteen members of the National Association of Agriculturalists of Colombia who recently arrived from Cauca and several other women. After waiting the government officials the revolutionaries went in the direction of Empress station. Their present whereabouts are not known.

Dr. Arkonis, secretary of the government in Panama, has now arranged so that every train leaving Panama and Colon shall be guarded by 50 soldiers for the protection of passengers and to insure free transit. This procedure will be followed as long as the Panama Railway Company deems it necessary.

No further trouble has taken place on the railway line. Traffic is going on in a normal way.

It is reported that 150 government soldiers will arrive from Buena Ventura next week to reinforce the lathras troops.

URGENT PROTECTION.

German Manufacturers Favor the New Tariff Bill Against America.

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—At a meeting of the Manufacturers Union of the District of Cologne, a resolution was adopted declaring that an agreement on the new tariff bill would be likely to increase the prosperity of the agriculturists. The manufacturers, however, decided to urge the government strongly to take sufficient protective measures against the powerful competition of America.

OPPOSE ROGUE DIPLOMATS.

Denists in National Convention Appoint Committee to Fight Them.

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 9.—The National Association of Dentists has passed a resolution for the appointment of a committee on ways and means to fight so-called "rogue-diploma mills." This legislation is in line with the work mapped out by the National Association of Dental Examiners and the National Association of Dental Faculties.

GIRL CAMPERS POISONED.

Suddenly Taken ill After Eating Corned Beef.

CATSKILL, N. Y., Aug. 9.—The girls summer camp here was in a panic today. Sixty young women, mostly residents of Albany and Poughkeepsie, were suddenly taken ill, displaying symptoms of poisoning.

HAVE FAITH IN DUMONT.

Parisians Believe the Young Brazilian Will Yet Succeed.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—A dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from Paris gives the following additional details concerning M. Santos-Dumont and the recent trial of his airship. All Paris is excited as only Paris can be over M. Santos-Dumont.

The dirigible balloon has become the personal pride and joy of Parisians. They know the whole world was watching every flight of this balloon. So their disappointment was acute, their chagrin intense, their excitement overwhelming when they heard the balloon was wrecked. First reports making it appear that the young Brazilian aeronaut had been killed.

"From all over the city people hurried telling each other the news. The accident was bad enough but not nearly so bad as first flying rumors had it.

WINTERS THE RIGHT MAN.

San Francisco Police Believe He Robbed the Smuggling Works.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—In the opinion of the police the mystery of the theft of \$25,000 from the Smuggling Works at Vallejo Junction has all but vanished. They are convinced that John Winters, or "Buck" Taylor, as he is sometimes known, who is now in custody is the man who planned and executed one of the most remarkable crimes of the century.

Some of the detectives also express the opinion that Winters had no accomplices in the job. While the evidence against the prisoner is thus far purely circumstantial the officials consider it overwhelming and conclusive. The stolen money is yet to be recovered and this it is thought will be found buried near Winters' cabin, but far from the smuggling works, a cabin in the shallow waters of his bay house. Winters had been an employee of the smuggling company, was dismissed after the robbery and on the day of his capture was found a notice reading:

"Any one who enters here will be shot." A dark cloth was drawn over the window so that the interior could not be seen. The detectives watched the cabin all Tuesday night but Winters did not return.

On Wednesday morning they broke into the house. Here they found many articles leading to connect him with the crime. No drill was found in the cabin but there was a bolt cutter. In the stove was found ashes left by some clothes that had been burned and a buckle, such as is worn at the back of a pair of trousers.

Winters, when questioned, admitted he had burned his old trousers because he did not want them being around.

Winters is a native of Prussia, 37 years of age, and has no relatives in this country. He is a man of some education and reading, but from the day he landed in America he has led a rove-

FELL THROUGH BRIDGE

Entire Train Plunges Into Lake Bayou But No Lives Are Lost.

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—A special to the Record-Herald from Galveston, Texas, says:

A dispatch from Sabine says the south-bound Southern Pacific passenger train from Beaumont to Sabine, fell through the bridge over Keith Lake Bayou, seven miles north of that place yesterday. The entire train was precipitated into the bayou, almost sinking out of sight.

Thirty passengers were aboard and had it not been for the tug Earnest, being anchored nearby with a fishing party aboard, they would have perished in the water.

The members of the fishing party and the crew of the tug hastened to the rescue of those in the train and cutting through the roots of the cars got all the passengers out.

T. S. Strickland, a prominent physician, and the fireman are the only ones hurt and their injuries are not thought to be serious.

IRISH MEMBERS JUBILANT.

Drasie M. Thoma, of Chicago, Inspired by the Nationalists.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Summing up upon the effects of the changes of methods of application of revenue rates in the house of commons the Tribune's London correspondent says:

With the closure of outstanding supply votes in commons financially, the business of parliament has been greatly facilitated. There has been much expressed excitement and the Liberals shook their heads ominously over the division business over every detailed estimate, but the government benches were relieved by the discussion placed upon obstruction.

Carroll's words in place of being an exciting comedian must be regarded as a trenchant satire on the decline and fall of parliamentary privilege. Was not in sympathy with the new method of dispatching financial legislation by railroads through the remaining votes of supply in commons.

The Irish members were perhaps the happiest men in the house. They took upon the subject of financial reform as a practical demonstration of their own power. Manly T. P. O'Donnell, a leader of the Irish cause has made great progress during the last eight months. The Nationalists have been humbled and are now full of indignation and defiance.

The Nationalists do not hesitate to claim the credit of having secured now in 1899, a victory over their opponents and have of their own accord, in disapproval and practicing the business of the session and in forcing Mr. Balfour to lay first and second with the rules and settled practice of the house and his own pledges.

The Irish members assert that the cause of home rule has advanced by leaps and bounds since 1899. Their own performance in conducting the constitutional agitation at Westminster. This is purely an Irish view of the situation but it is confirmed by the barren record of legislation during the session now drawing to a close.

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ANARCHISTS' DISCLAIMER.

WILL BE LAUNCHED.

Cramps Will Be the Leading Firm and the Capital Will Be \$45,000,000.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Says the Journal and Advertiser:

It is reported that all the details connected with the proposed shipbuilding combination have been arranged and that the new corporation will be launched in a few days.

OPERA HOUSE POLITICO.

DO NOT INTEREST VENEZUELA.

The People Do Not Approve of Castro's Plans to Overthrow Colombia's Government.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The Port of Spain, Trinidad, correspondent of the Herald says:

The situation in Venezuela is impossible to define in detail. There are no further reports of invasion. The officials of the government are silent. There has been no engagement since July 29. The public now believes that President Castro hoped to give to the press news of a Colombian invasion in order to influence the country and obtain support of the masses.

The people are apparently not interested in the matter. President Castro without the support of the people will not be able to declare war on Colombia and assist General Urdaneta in the effort to overthrow the government of Colombia.

BRESCI WAS NOT KING.

HUMBERT'S ASSASSIN.

Italian Detective Says the Real Criminal Was Luigi Granotti, a Comrade of Bresci.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Alexander Secura, a detective in the employ of the Italian government, is credited by the Journal and Advertiser as saying that Bresci is not the man who killed King Humbert of Italy.

The man who killed King Humbert is one Luigi Granotti, a former comrade of Bresci in Patterson, who stood right at Bresci's side when the latter fired on the king. Granotti is said to have fired the fatal shot after Bresci had twice discharged his revolver without effect.

This discovery was made by Secura, he maintains, while he was working in the guise of a silk mill hand among the anarchists of Patterson.

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They also say that they are glad that it is to be stopped as they understand it to be a hoax by Italians from South America and will depict anarchists in an odious light.

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
