The British ship Strathgyle for Manila with a cargo of lumber came down yesterday afternoon and will proceed to Nainmbo for coal and from there to the Philippines.

Judge Gray has set Monday, September 23, as the date for hearing and filing the final accounts of Mary J. Wood, administratrix of the estate of W. H. Wood, deceased.

Captain and Mrs. Kuhn, prominent Salvation Army workers, who are touring the Pacific coast, will be in Astoria on August 24, and will address meetings at the local barracks.

In order to get the Robertson log raft out of the mud at the Westport slough entrance it will be necessary to dredge under the raft and it will be several days before it can be floated.

At the A. F. C. grounds today the Elks baseball team will meet the Rainier team and a good game is promised. The visiting aggregation has defeated all teams in Columbia county.

A baseball tournament will be held at St. Helens, September 5th and 6th. A purse of \$100 is to be played for. It is expected that three or more visiting teams will take part with the local club.

The improvements to the Olney district school house will be made with day labor, all bids for the same having been thrown out as excessive. Four rooms will be fitted up on the second floor to accommodate the increased number of pupils.

The first run of the Gaston feed mill yesterday demonstrated the fact that the capacity of the mill will be 5000 pounds an hour, instead of 4000, as was at first stated. Mr. Gaston left last night for The Dalles, where he will make contracts for grain shipments.

The fishing season, which closed yesterday, was not so good as the spring season of last year, says the St. Helens Milt James Shelton, the principal buyer at this point, gives the total catch for St. Helens drift as 145 tons against 200 tons last year, and the price paid was from one to three cents less than last year. The gill-netters averaged about three and one-half tons per week.

The O. R. & N. has made a rate of 50c from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first to third Tuesday, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

Malcolm Bros., who are operating a shingle mill on Upper Clatskanie, which flows into the Columbia river, made a phenomenal run last week, establishing a record that will be difficult to equal. They worked a crew of six men and in sixty hours turned out 155,000,000 shingles.

The representatives of the Wheeler Lumber Company, George R. Vosburg and Judge Magors, will make contracts with the settlers along the Nehalem river and its tributaries for right of way across their property. An equitable rate for booming logs will also be agreed upon. And the formal application for the lease will be renewed before the county court Monday. The petition of the Wheeler Lumber Company is meeting with considerable opposition, and possibly may have to be abandoned.

The strike in San Francisco is proving advantageous to Columbia river box factories. The mills in the California mountains are handicapped by their inability to get the raw material and the finished product hauled from the factory to the cars and ships. Nearly all of the large canneries have switches or sidetracks near their plants and box shocks loaded here are delivered direct. Within the next week the German schooner Lena Sweesay will take on a cargo of box shocks from the Necanicum Springs Lumber Company for Mexico.

The proposed new paper for Portland will receive liberal support here from present indications. Attorney George Noland has been interviewing merchants and citizens with good results. The promise in the prospectus that appeals to Astorians is that the news of the entire state of Oregon will be sent broadcast and that the new paper will endeavor to build up the entire state, and not one particular locality. The Oregonian has been for Portland, first and all the time. The rest of the state was secondary. Portland and the O. R. & N. have predominated in any effort to build up and to attract capital and settlers.

A machinist who joined the strikers on Puget sound decided that any kind of work he did doing nothing, so he went into the employ of the Northern Pacific railway. He was set at work with a shovel and pick. The day was hot, the work hard for one not accustomed to it. He took hold of the job, intending to earn his wages. By noon of the first day he had raised blisters and backache and reached the conclusion to quit. He asked for his time. It was given him. When he went for his pay, he found that the company deducted fifty cents for hospital dues, leaving him a few cents, his blisters and backache. He also was credited experience up with part of the venture.

A buyer for an Eastern lumber company recently received a letter that was comical from every standpoint. It is evident that he was satisfied that the buyer wandered from the truth. The letter was from a coast saw-mill man and ran as follows: "Dear Sir, Say that is perty- thing, abought that other fellows. Mill Being Brook down Dont he expect to start, again. Say next time try & Make a Better, Excuse, for I am to old for that. ((BABY)) is well — I just went & Measured those, Guides, & find, that a great many have sunk to Just even 6 inches. Will they do to wise any seen, I am afraid I will have to throw ought to many, if they have to be fix. Plump after dressed — If you want them you will have to raise to \$13.50 or weight until, the other fellow Gets his Broken mill together, & my Guides are nice & Dry, & I would not let you have them at \$13.50, only for your good Naturedness, I rather not have the order at that price. But dont want you to wait for the other fellow that never had a mill nor never will, I did not proms you the guids for \$12.50 I said I wood go home & Count & report, & I doen so, I still remain yours very truly." —West Coast and Puget Sound Lumberman.

The funeral services over the remains of the late Fred Wickman were held in the open air at the corner of Eleventh and Duane streets yesterday, because of the large attendance, but a small part of which could have crowded into the undertaking parlors. Probably there was 1000 people in the congregation, and they represented all walks of life. The Rev. J. McCormac conducted the impressive services, which were under the auspices of the Finnish Brotherhood. The pall bearers were chosen from this organization and other fraternal orders with which the deceased was affiliated were represented. The funeral procession was headed by the Astoria Military Band, and in line were members of the Finnish Brotherhood, Eagles, Knights of Pythias and A. O. U. W. Mrs. John Mangas, of Silver Lake, a sister of the deceased, and an adopted daughter, Miss Pauline Wickman, were escorted by members of the Finnish Brotherhood. The steamer Astorian conveyed the remains to Greenwood, where the interment took place in the presence of a large number of mourners.

The Rev. L. T. Chamberlain and L. H. Britton, both of New York, spent yesterday in Astoria, and were the guests of County Judge J. H. D. Gray. Dr. Chamberlain is a man of national prominence in many directions. He is secretary of the United States Evangelical Alliance and is president of the Pan-African League. The latter organization has accomplished and is still doing a marvelous and most necessary missionary work in Africa. But the institution in which Dr. Chamberlain is interested over and above all others and which will stand forever among lovers of gems as a monument to his endeavors, is the National Museum, of Washington, D. C. The institution is a part of the Smithsonian institute, and its establishment was largely due to the efforts of Dr. Chamberlain. It is the repository of the nucleus of a collection of gems that ultimately will be developed into a comprehensive and complete exhibition of precious stones of the American continent. Most of the specimens were purchased by the doctor and presented to the museum, but gem-lovers throughout the country have aided in the work and are giving financial and other assistance to the founder. Almost every known stone has been acquired and some of the specimens are without equal in the world. A ruby found near Philadelphia is superior to any ever produced by India. A tourmaline discovered near Paris, Maine, weighed 57 carats and was purchased by Dr. Chamberlain for \$2500 for the museum. Dr. Chamberlain and Mr. Britton have been spending the summer in Alaska and are now en route to Yosemite. They came to Astoria to see the salmon fishing industry in full swing, but unfortunately were a day late.

STREET FAIR PARADE.

Opening of the Carnival Season Will Be Appropriately Inaugurated.

Saturday during regatta week has been set aside for the A. O. U. W. and the Workmen intend putting up quite a big parade in which numbers of guests and visitors will join. The Workmen are determined to make the day as big an occasion as has ever been witnessed in Astoria. The Foresters are also considering the question as to whether that body as a separate order should not also make some special demonstration worthy of the occasion. A day will be awarded to them just as soon as a formal application is made.

The prettiest sight of the fair will be perhaps the opening procession. This will be headed by the marshal of the day. Following him will come the king, seated in a decorated carriage, and after him the band and then the militia from Fort Canby. Then will come the governor of the state with Director General Fulton and immediately behind, the mayor and civic officials. After these will come the fire brigade and other civic bodies to be followed by the fraternal organizations.

Then will come another band and then the parade made by the Midway performers, who number 150 people of all nations. Some are in carriages, some on horses and some afoot. Some bear-bridle camels while others ride on she-asses from Egypt. Some are Americans, some Europeans and many are from Turkey, Arabia, Egypt, Algeria, India and Japan. The national costumes of the people are preserved as far as possible and in consequence the appearance of the procession is extremely striking.

The sight of Hadji is Mahafode Cheriff on his charger with the white burnous of the Oriental chief floating from his shoulders is one not often seen upon this continent. The Hadji has been brought from Buffalo by George Jabour where he was an attractive sight at the Pan-American exposition. The pleasing figures of la belle Fatima and Amnia on camels usually call forth much comment.

At an appropriate place the procession halts and the ceremony of delivering over the keys of the city by the mayor to King Rex is gone through and some speechmaking befitting the occasion is then the order of the hour. After this the procession resumes its way to disband at the fair arch.

All processions made during the fair will be head by the king and it is trusted that on one occasion at least the sea queen will grace the land rejoicers with her presence at their carnival.

On some evening, probably Wednesday, during the coming week the advent of the king will be announced amid the blare of trumpets and the music of patriotic themes by his duly appointed herald from the fair arch. The occasion will also be marked with the discharge of rockets and other pyrotechnic displays. Quite a large crowd of people may be expected to be present to witness and listen to the arrival of the herald and the giving forth of his proclamation. A band, made up of some local musicians, will also be present.

The booths on the fair grounds are making good progress, the frame work of those belonging to the A. Dunbar Company and to Fisher Bros. are nearest completion and by tomorrow evening should be making quite a good show.

Some work is being done upon the floral parade but nothing definite has yet been decided upon.
