The steamship Oceano is expected to arrive this week and will load a cargo of lumber for the Orient. It is expected that the Oceano will carry the largest cargo shipped from the Columbia river, her capacity being 3,700,000 feet, which will exceed the cargo of the Thyra by about 150,000 feet.

The impression seems to have gained ground that in removing to San Francisco, S. Danziger will sever connection with the store here that bears his name. The report is untrue. Mr. Danziger will continue to conduct his Astoria store which will be under the direct management of his business associates.

The O. R. & N. has made a rate of \$50 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first to third Tuesdays, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

Those taking examinations for state papers were Miss Jessie Sands and Miss Alice Gray. Their papers will be passed upon by the state examiners.

Deputies McReavy and Bultman have not found it necessary to actively patrol the river to prevent illegal fishing. There seems to be a disposition on the part of the fishermen to obey the law. But one gill-netter has been arrested since the season closed and he will be given a trial before Justice of the Peace Brower today.

Over a month ago C. E. Kullman was reported drowned in the Hoquiam river and a reward of \$1000 was offered for the recovery of the body. A large number of men and boys have been searching up and down the river but have been unable to find any trace. It is said that the deceased carried life insurance of \$10,000.

Recent reports from the Canadian side of Puget Sound indicates that the large run of sockeyes still continues. It is reported that the Fraser river pack now exceeds 600,000 cases. All the canneries have found it necessary to place a limit on the boats. One fisherman recently threw out fifty fatheads of net and secured over 200 fish.

The automobile service between Hoquiam and Aberdeen has been discontinued on account of the roughness of the road. Frequent breakages reduced the profits to nothing and the management of the line concluded that it would be better business policy to revert to older and more primitive methods of transportation.

The funeral of the late L. J. Hansen was held yesterday afternoon from the Pythian temple, and was under the auspices of the Scandinavian Benevolent Society, of which the deceased was a member. Members of the organization acted as pall bearers and a large number of persons were present at the interment in Greenwood.

The Evening Capital News, of Boise, will run an excursion from the Idaho capital to Astoria next week and the tickets will permit the holders to remain over for the regatta. The Capital News was started last February by Messrs. Fisher and Sheridan, of Roseburg, and in its short existence has grown to be the leading paper of the state.

The race arranged between running horses owned by Bart Allen, of Clatsop, and Willard Clark, of Skippoon, will take place at Seaside Thursday of this week. The race is for \$100 a side and will be three furlongs straightaway on the beach. Considerable money has already been wagered on the outcome and it is understood that a large amount will be bet at even money the day of the race.

Welch, George Muzzell, J. M. Johnson, John Blumfield and Thomas Nelson. Delegates to the trade council—H. M. Lornsen, Fred Wright, John S. A. Johnson, J. F. Welch and Thomas Nelson. H. M. Lornsen was re-elected secretary.

The gentlemanly burglar who visited the residence of A. R. Hammond at San Francisco July 13th, and relieved Mrs. Hammond of \$25 in cash, has been caught by the police and has been identified by Mrs. Hammond and her maid. The prisoner admits his guilt and also acknowledges having committed other burglaries "suggested" to the police. He gave his name as Robert Stone and afterwards said that it was not his right name.

Councilman Uttinger, at last night's council meeting, called the attention of the body to the recent decision of the supreme court holding the city responsible for accidents resulting from defective sidewalks and roadways. He stated that there were several places that should be fenced in to prevent accidents that would entail a heavy lawsuit against the city. Mr. Uttinger mentioned the strip on Twelfth street, north of Commercial street, which is over the water and, therefore, doubly dangerous.

Martin Denny and "Kid" Lee, who are to fight twenty rounds August 29, have started active training and are working every day. Yesterday Lee swam a mile with Brewer, who is matched against Nace Grant during regatta week, and afterwards Brewer donned the gloves and boxed with the Colorado man. Lee is a clever fighter and will be heard from yet among the top notchers in the business. Those who have already seen him go in training predict a splendid fight when he meets Denny. Local sports are familiar with Denny's stilet abilities and while they will probably back him to win they are aware of the fact that Lee will give him a fight that will be remembered.

If the county court yesterday the petition of the Wheeler Lumber Company for a lease of the Nehalem river and its tributaries for a term of years was denied. The county commissioners took as a precedent a case appealed to the supreme court from Wasco county, and reported in the 35th Oregon, in which it was held that where there was objection on the part of the settlers a lease could not be entered into. The conference of the Wheeler Lumber Company's representatives with the settlers of the Nehalem valley which was held Saturday was not productive of any agreement or understanding. The ranchers and others who were present refused to enter into any contract for the leasing of the stream and reiterated their protest against any such action by the county court. The decision of the commissioners virtually denies also the petition of the Oregon Coal and Timber Company for the same privilege.

J. P. Carlson and Gus Hegbloom were arrested yesterday afternoon on warrants obtained by Deputy Fish Warden Bultman. The two men own a trap near Sand Island which has been operating in defiance of the closed season laws. The owners declare that they did not know that the trap was running and that if so the man in charge was operating it on his own account. Deputies Bultman and McReavy found several fish in the trap yesterday, which were released.

Arch rock, in San Francisco harbor, has been blown up and instead of a ledge to menace ships there is thirty feet of water. The switch which controlled the electrical connections with the nitro-glycerine was turned by Miss Florence Axman, daughter of the contractor, and a column of water, rock and mud was thrown up into the air a distance of 400 feet. The destruction of Arch rock is considered second, in point of importance, to the blowing up of Hell Gate in East river in the New York harbor. Thirty tons of explosives were used and the scores of the bay were lined with thousands of spectators.

Henry Cameron is under arrest at the county jail and will be arraigned today on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. Cameron has been employed on one of the up-river seining grounds and was paid off Saturday. He proceeded to get rid of his coin with such rapidity that it was gone by Sunday morning. He secured it on a check for \$15, purporting to have been drawn by "John Strom." It is thought that Cameron intended to write John Strom and the omission of the final letter will be fortunate for him as it will prevent the more serious charge of forgery being preferred against him.

THIRTY-FIVE-YEAR TELEPHONE FRANCHISE

Council Passed Amending Ordinance by a Vote of Six to Three.

At the meeting of the city council last night the telephone franchise ordinance introduced at the last meeting was amended and passed by a vote of six yeas to three nays. Under the provisions of the ordinance the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company is granted a franchise for a term of thirty-five years, in consideration of an annual payment of \$250 for the first fifteen years and \$400 annually for the remaining twenty years. In addition the corporation agrees to pay into the city treasury the sum of \$500 when the conditions of the ordinance are accepted by the company.

Before reading the ordinance City Attorney Smith made a statement in which he said that if the impression prevailed that he had tried to influence the council or members he wished to deny any such intention. The city attorney said that he had no desire or intention to attempt in any manner to influence councilmen or any legislative matter. The amended ordinance extends the time the franchise will run and also increases the bonus and annual payments. Free telephones will be placed in the offices of the police station, auditor, water commission and the three engine houses. Although some opposition to the passage of the ordinance was developed in the voting the dissenting councilmen did not present their views to the council. The roll called stood: Ayes—Agren, Hansen, Parker, Scherneckau, Swensen, Uttinger, Nacey-Brix, Cook, Wright.

For several meetings past it has been expected that some action would be taken looking to the extension of Astor street through to Uniontown. Last night Councilman Cook introduced a resolution directing the city surveyor to make a survey to ascertain the most practical plan to extend Astor street through to Taylor's addition. Councilman Uttinger introduced a resolution declaring intention to improve Commercial street from Tenth to Fourteenth. Both resolutions were passed.

Councilman Scherneckau introduced a resolution, which was passed, authorizing the employment of clerical aid to compile a list of all property bought in by the city for delinquent taxes, the same to be turned over to the sheriff. Several tax matters were under discussion either in the form of communications or reports from committees. C. R. Thomson, representing Colonel James K. Kelly, of Washington, D. C., made a tender of \$400 held in the name of the Union Real Estate and Improvement Company, now held by Colonel Kelly. The matter was referred to the committee on ways and means and the city attorney with power to act.

A communication was received from George Noland offering to pay \$30 in full settlement of tax assessments for 1892, which was referred to the committee on ways and means. A report was presented from the ways and means committee recommending that the offer of M. J. Kinney to compromise taxes against him for \$877.14 be accepted. The report was adopted. The petition of the regatta committee to station buoys in the stream during the regatta events was granted. The ordinance by Scherneckau, providing that warrants on special funds be drawn in amounts of \$100 was passed. A favorable report was presented on the petition of the school trustees of district No. 1 that the fire apparatus stored in the lower rooms be removed as the entire building is needed for the pupils, with the provision that the school directors find some place to care for the fire department property.

City Attorney Smith reported that the owners of the fish trap driven near the Scandinavian cannery without obtaining consent of the city authorities could be prosecuted for violating the city ordinance forbidding piling to be driven without permission. The ordinance by Uttinger for improving Commercial street between Fifth and Sixth was passed. The ordinance by Scherneckau providing for a general election to be held December 11 was passed with an amendment providing for the election of a city treasurer which was omitted in the original measure.

Retail liquor licenses will be granted at the next meeting to Johann Hendrickson, Charles Wise and Anderson & Borne. A petition for retail liquor license was received from Lindbeck & Carlson. A belated communication was received from County Judge J. H. D. Gray asking permission to operate the rock crusher to be constructed by the county on the rock deposits on Sixteenth street, and Jerome avenue. Referred to the street committee. The same committee reported on the remonstrances against the proposed improvements on Thirtieth street and the establishment of a drain on the street, and recommended that the remonstrances be granted. The committee on fire and water reported the arrest of Ed. Lewellyn, of the fire department, charged with violating the law prohibiting the dumping of sawdust and refuse in the river and asked that the council take steps to protect him inasmuch as there is no crematory or other way of disposing of accumulated refuse from the stables.
