Mayor Bergman has signed the ordinance passed at the last session of the city council with the exception of the telephone franchise measure which he has until August 29 to consider.

The lighthouse tender, Columbine, returned yesterday morning from a fortnight's trip down the coast, visiting aids to navigation. The vessel will remain in the river until after the regatta.

The union picnic of the Baptist and Methodist Sabbath schools will be held at Youngs bay, opposite the city on Friday next. Those who desire to attend are requested to assemble at the Methodist church at 9 o'clock with lunch baskets.

Elaborate preparations are being made for the state fair which will be held in Salem next month. Particular attention is being paid to the racing program and already a number of fast horses have been entered for the different events.

The O. R. & N. has made a rate of 35¢ from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first to third Tuesdays, June 10 to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

Carmelo de Amico, who conducted an Italian lodging house on Water street, died yesterday morning after a short illness. The funeral will be held from the late residence Friday morning and interment will be in Greenwood cemetery. De Amico was 54 years old and for several years has been a fisherman on the river.

A sporting event that has attracted considerable attention will take place at Seaside today, when the running horses owned by Burt Allen and William Chase will race three furlongs for a side bet of \$100. A large amount has been wagered by the friends of both owners at even money and several hundred dollars will change hands as the result of the match.

Regatta Queen Miss Ivy Barker has appointed the Hon. C. W. Fulton her prime minister during the coronation exercises. Miss Barker will have for her use the carriage brought to Portland to be used by President McKinley last spring. It is lined with dark green cloth, with lace trimmings. The harness is silver mounted, and a coachman will accompany the carriage and horses to Astoria.

President Parker, of the regatta committee, yesterday appointed F. J. Carney as grand marshal of the parade that will be held next Thursday, one week from today, and will mark the opening of the regatta proper. The parade will be held in the morning and the queen, admiral and other dignitaries will be in the procession. Following the declaration of the formal opening of the regatta the water sports will begin.

The efforts of the regatta committee to secure a United States warship here during carnival week have been successful. C. W. Fulton received a letter yesterday from Governor Geer enclosing a letter from Rear-Admiral Cressy containing the information that the Philadelphia would be here probably next Wednesday or Thursday and remain until September 2, when the naval militia will be taken out for a practice cruise.

Martin Denny and "Kid" Lee, who are to fight twenty rounds in this city on the night of August 29, are working out every day in the hall over the Wells-Fargo office, where the apparatus of the old athletic club is at their disposal. Denny does his work in the morning and Lee in the afternoon, and friends of the two boxers are nearly always present to watch them work. Both men are in splendid condition and are ready to go the limit and put up a good fight.

John P. Carlson and Gus Hegelstrom, owners of a fishing trap near Sand Island, who were arrested at the instance of the deputy fish warden and charged with operating the gear during the closed season, were discharged yesterday by Justice of the Peace Brower upon the jury returning a verdict of not guilty. The defendants showed that they were in ignorance of the trap being operated and that the caretaker was running it on his own account and not for his employers.

Fred Hartman, a member of the local Salvation Army corps, will serve out a sentence of 60 days in the county jail for fishing without a license. He was fined that amount yesterday by Justice of the Peace Brower after hearing the evidence of Deputy Fish Warden Henry Bulman, who caught Hartman on July 31, with the fish in his possession waiting an opportunity to dispose of them. Hartman's defense was that he had violated no law of God but that the state had in making it impossible for a penniless man to catch fish from the river and thereby earn a living. He refused to plead to the charge and the prosecuting attorney entered a plea of not guilty for him and proceeded with the case. When sentence had been pronounced after conviction Hartman announced that he would absolutely refuse to pay the fine.

Miss Holden entered the church on the arm of her father and was attended by Miss Strong, maid of honor, and the Misses Harriet Tallant, Maude Stockton and Opal Hall, of Portland, bridesmaids. Mr. Brink and his groomsmen, Randall Reed, met the bride's party at the altar, where the ceremony was performed by the Rev. Henry Martineau. Following the church service a reception was held at the residence of the bride's parents, where the magnificent gifts received by the contracting parties were displayed. Luncheon was served from 3 to 5, and Mr. and Mrs. Brink took the evening train for Portland, en route to Oakland, where they will reside in the future and where the groom is in business. The bride was gowning in a creation of white silk grand over white tulle, with point lace bolero, collar and yoke. Father Dellman performed the ceremony with high nuptial mass, during which solos were rendered by Mrs. J. T. Ross, Mrs. O'Connell and Mrs. Brooks. Mrs. Richard Cairns presided at the organ. The bride was handsomely attired in a costume of white landowne silk, with a veil of white moline and a wreath of orange blossoms, and carried a bouquet of white

THE KING'S HERALD.

Official Proclamation of the Arrival of the Carnival Monarch.

There was quite a large crowd of people gathered last night at the Street Fair arch to await the arrival of the avant courier of the king of the carnival, that mysterious personage, whose identity is still a matter of profound secrecy. Shortly after half past 7 o'clock the strains of a band were heard marching up from the headquarters of the fair on Bond street and the musicians presently took up a position on the corner of Duane and Eleventh streets, and for the next half hour there was some very enjoyable music, much to the delight of the audience who, up to that time, had some sort of an idea that a colossal joke was being played off and felt like declaring that they were not having any. Still the music was there, its quality was unquestionable and made the good Astorians feel as if they would like to have a little more.

Just at dusk, everybody being on the tip of expectancy, a sudden glare of Greek fire lit up the southeast angle of the Irving Club and the band ceased playing. A herald, whose form was but dimly seen through the gathering darkness, stepped to the front and made the following proclamation:

"Oyez! Oyez! Oyez! To all my loyal subjects of the fair city of Astoria, I, King Rex I., through my worthy and honorable herald of ancient blazonry, greeting: I do hereby lay my commands on you that for the space of one week during my royal sojourn in your city you do enter into the spirit of joyous way and do refrain from tachynousess and tales of hard times and that you and your fair spouses and budding progeny do attend my arrival on next Monday in true spirit of jollity and take every advantage of the carnival prepared against my coming. Hear ye and obey!"

The discharge of a couple of firecrackers and the applause of the multitude formed a fitting finale to the function and the ceremony closed with the inspiring sounds of the band marching off to the ground. The general comment was that if the courier has such brave words to salute the loyal subjects of King Rex, what, oh, what must that reputable monarch himself be like? And the guessers are guessing more wildly than ever.

The commercial exhibit in the Street Fair is confined strictly to the merchants of Astoria and it will be a surprise to most people to see how very good a display can be put up by this enterprising city. The state exhibit of fisheries, the displays by the American Can Company, the Columbia River Packers Association and by the A. Booth Company comprise a section all to itself, and is one of the most interesting, as it represents the chief industry of the city and one that may well be said to be its very life blood.

The state exhibit will not only include a miniature hatchery with a row of 150 larvæ showing the life of the fish from the first ova to the developed salmon, but will also present a model fish trap and wheel, together with other displays pertaining to the industry. The Can Company will show the various cans in which the fish are placed after being handled and the A. Booth Company and the Packers Association, representing the largest canneries in Astoria, will exhibit the finished product as shipped to various parts of the world.

Among the merchants, one of the finest booths is undoubtedly that of the A. Dunbar Company, which will make an exhibit of dry goods; Fisher Bros., who have the oldest established shoemaking business in the city, and who have grown with its growth, are also putting up a booth which is sure to be a credit to themselves and to the city. The aggressive young firm of Ross, Higgins & Co., made up of Messrs. J. T. Ross, J. E. Higgins, H. C. Thompson and E. Z. Ferguson, all young men of this city, are also making a display at the fair. If the display made anything approaches the tasteful exhibition of their shop windows, which would be hard to beat west of Chicago, the booth will certainly attract much attention from visitors to Astoria.

Messrs. Peterson & Brown are also making an exhibit of shoes which they intend to display tastefully. Messrs. Peterson & Brown are making great efforts to deserve the patronage of their customers and to reach for fields which should be well within the grasp of enterprising Astoria merchants and their efforts will no doubt meet with that success which they merit.

A. V. Allen, whose character for probity and uprightness of dealing has long been known here, is also coming into the Street Fair industrial section and intends to make a display of his stock. Mr. Allen has been for a very long time identified with this city and he has considered its interests as tantamount to his own.

Foard & Stokes, who own the finest

building in the city in the retail trade, are also making a special display which it is understood will be confined to merely a small section of their large general stock. Whichever may be the department that these gentlemen purpose to exhibit it may be assumed as accurate that the display will be worthy of it and themselves.

Mr. John Kopp, the well-known brewer, who coming here as a comparatively poor man, has built up one of the finest businesses in the city, and has at the same time created a taste for his beer that has placed it in the very front ranks of all the brews in Oregon, is also making a display.

Another exhibitor is Mr. H. H. Hoefler, who will put in a fine line of confectionery, ice cream and sweet stuff generally. Mr. Hoefler has only been in business in this city for the past three years but has already created a name for himself in this city, and is therefore a welcome addition to the list of merchants who are displaying their wares.

These are the merchants who have at present signified their intention of taking part and who by their own displays will make a showing which will not alone be creditable to this city but will reflect much honor upon themselves and which will at the same time advertise this city and its resources in a manner which will scarcely be realized until the whole function is ended.

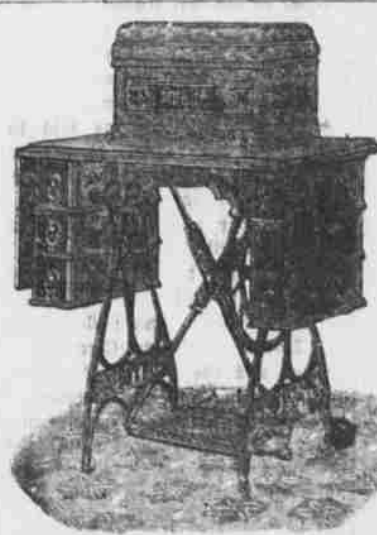
