The engagement is announced of Laura Genevieve Gray, daughter of Judge and Mrs. J. H. D. Gray, to Mr. Robert Catlin Wright, of Portland, and the wedding will take place in this city September 3.

Mrs. J. W. Gheen came down on the train last evening from a point near Portland where she has been visiting. She has the sympathy of her many friends in the loss of her little daughter, Grace, who died during her absence from home.

M. Christofferson was tried before Justice of the Peace Brower yesterday and the verdict of guilty was returned. Justice Brower sentenced him to pay a fine of \$50 and costs. In default of the cash Christofferson is confined in the county jail. When the case was called yesterday the defendant was not in court and a bench warrant was issued for his arrest.

Construction work on the regatta grand stand on the Flavel wharf at the foot of Eleventh street is already under way and will be completed in plenty of time for the opening of the regatta carnival.

Dr. C. C. Rosenberg wishes to deny the statement published in the Daily News yesterday crediting him with having been converted to Spiritualism and having given manifestations. The doctor states that there is absolutely no truth in the article from first to last.

The O. R. & N. has made a rate of \$56 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first to third Tuesdays, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

The differences between the partners in the fishing schooner Jessie have been settled by Alex Grant and W. W. Whipple taking over the one-fourth interest owned by P. D. Winton. The vessel will start for the halibut banks Tuesday, and in the meantime the temporary injunction granted by Judge Gray will be dissolved.

An application was made before Judge Gray yesterday for the release of Sakari Korpiola from the state asylum for the insane, to which he was committed some time ago. The two brothers of the inmate man have offered to care for him and Judge Gray has written the superintendent to turn him over to the custody of the brothers if he can be released.

The three furling race at Seaside yesterday between the horses owned by Willard Chase and Bert Allen was won by the latter's horse by a length in a thrillingly spirited finish. The beach was lined with people from Clatsop Plains, Seaside, and from Astoria, and contrary to general expectation but little betting was done. The statement published in the Daily News that the defeated horse was owned by J. W. Ellsworth is not true, Mr. Ellsworth having no interest in the animal whatever.

Application for the appointment of an administrator of the estate of the late Fred Wickman was made before Probate Judge Gray yesterday by Ludwig Hansen, one of the creditors of the estate. C. W. Fulton was appointed administrator and G. O. Moen, E. Hauke, and August Danilow were appointed appraisers. The estate is valued at \$2675, with several encumbrances, and the heirs are a brother living at Seattle and relatives in Norway.

The Trade, published in the interests of the canned goods trade, has the following to say concerning the salmon rock on Puget sound: The salmon canneries on Puget sound are equipped to pack fully 50,000 cases a day, but at no time this season was 40,000 cases a day canned. The scarcity of hands contributed largely to the falling off, while in the case of a large cannery at Fairhaven, the machinery is said to have been placed in such a way that it cannot be operated to advantage, thereby causing a lessened output of fully one-third.

The committee in charge of the water sports have arranged a splendid program for the regatta. One of the prettiest sights of the three days will be a fleet of fishing boats, at least one hundred, if not more, that will start from Sand Island and sail past the city keeping as near together as the conditions will allow. It is to be hoped that the committee on aquatic sports can persuade Alex Page, the champion amateur oarsman of the coast, to change his mind and be present at the regatta. At present writing it is understood that Page will not be here but those who remember his splendid race which won for him the coast championship will regret his absence. Page is also a swimmer of considerable ability and has won several important matches with speedy men.

According to observations made by a well-posted railroad man, who has just returned from an outing in the Northern Nehalem country, the Northern Pacific railway has now almost completed its survey from Seaside into the Nehalem, says the Telegram. He says the surveying party has reached Saddle mountain tunnel on the old grade of the South Coast & Astoria railroad, which company several years ago constructed the line from Astoria to Seaside, a distance of about eighteen miles, with the intention of ultimately coming into Portland by way of Hillsboro, thus tapping the Nehalem country. It is the opinion of this man that because of having concluded its survey at that particular place, the Northern Pacific will attempt to gain an outlet at the mouth of the Columbia river over the old grade of the South Coast & Astoria Co. "From appearances," he said, "the Northern Pacific will enter the Nehalem country unless the community of interest provisions are such as to exclude that road from operating in that territory. In fact, it is rumored that W. K. Vanderbilt, arbitrator of disputes between the three main lines, the Great

Northern, Northern Pacific and the Union Pacific, has ruled that the Northern Pacific should have no right in Oregon south of the Columbia river, except as to its entrance into Portland. In that event that city would have the key to the situation, and the early construction of the road proposed by the Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook Railroad Company may then be looked for."

ARE GETTING READY.

What Is Being Done by the Street Fair and Carnival.

W. T. Vaughn, advance agent of the Street Fair and Carnival Midway show, arrived here yesterday and is seeing to the arrangements as to putting the shows on view on Monday afternoon next. Much work has to be done in this direction but it is all well in hand and every thing will be ready on time.

It is intended to get up a masquerade ball on Saturday next within the Street Fair grounds, which, however, will be under the auspices of the regatta committee. This dance will be in addition to that accompanying the queen's coronation and reception on Thursday evening next. A customer is in the city and all desirous of obtaining dominos or other costumes for this event can rent them.

The Modern Woodmen of the World, it is understood, are issuing a challenge to the baseball team of any other fraternal society to meet them on Saturday afternoon at the baseball grounds after the athletic meet is over. This will provide an additional feature of great interest to the public and a large attendance is expected. Saturday will be a regular day for the fraternal organizations in general and a prize is to be offered for the best turn out and drill.

Chief Stockton has arranged for a flying harness with 500 feet of hose to be placed within the fair grounds at the hydrant on the corner of Ninth and Duane so that there shall be no fear of fire on the part of the exhibitors or of the residents in the neighborhood of the fair.

The decorators are working hard on the booths which are now all filled up. The Foresters have taken a booth and it is to be done up in good style. It is the only fraternal organization which will have a booth at the fair.

All parades will be in charge of Chief Stockton, who has appointed F. J. Carney as marshal. The parade on Monday will be headed by the king and will form on Commercial street west of the post-office. All fraternal societies wishing to participate will communicate with Mr. Stockton who will assign a place of assembly. The line of march will be along Commercial street east to Eleventh, south on Eleventh to Exchange, east on Exchange to Twelfth, north on Twelfth to Commercial, east on Commercial to the dock, where the parade will counter-march and proceed west on Commercial to Twelfth, north on Twelfth to Bond, west on Bond to Ninth, north on Ninth to Astor, west on Astor to Seventh, south on Seventh to Commercial, east on Commercial to Twelfth, south on Twelfth to Duane, west on Duane to Eleventh.

HARTMAN REFUSES TO EAT WHILE IN PRISON.

Peculiar Prisoner in the County Jail Who Says He Will Fast Until Death.

Unless Fred Hartman, a soldier of the Salvation Army, recedes from his present attitude he will maintain an absolute fast during his imprisonment in the county jail, where he is serving a sentence of twenty-five days imposed by Justice of the Peace Brower. Hartman was convicted of fishing without a license, and it will be recalled that he created something of a sensation in the court room by saying that the law imposing a license on fishermen was in conflict with the divine laws of God and therefore he would not recognize it.

Hartman has been a member of the Salvation Army for nine years, and is an enthusiast in the work of the army. Contrary to the general impression, life with the Salvationists is not one continual round of soul-saving. The members are obliged to earn their own living outside of their religious work unless the corps is in such prosperous condition that the expenses are made out of the nightly collections. Hartman refused to work for any of the regular fishermen because he was opposed to laboring on the Sabbath, therefore he hired a rickety boat and several fathoms of old net and started in alone, being both ill-fetter and boatman.

On the morning of July 21 Deputy Fish Warden Henry Bultman arrested Hartman, while he was waiting to dispose of his night's catch, which was miserably small. Hartman was taken to the county jail Wednesday morning immediately after his trial and up to last night he absolutely refused to touch anything in the way of food. The regular rations supplied the prisoners have been offered to Hartman, but he would not eat the food. To a reporter yesterday he stated that it was not the quality of the provisions that he objected to but the surroundings. He does not believe that jails are in conformance with the divine laws and he refuses to give them countenance.

At each meal time Deputy Sheriff Young has placed in Hartman's cell the same menu provided for all. Last night the last meal offered him still remained untouched. He confessed to being hungry but said that he was in the hands of the Lord and would be cared for. Hartman spends the most of his time reading aloud from his bible, which he has in his hands continually. He makes no attempts to proselyte among his fellow-prisoners, but devotes much time to praying earnestly for those whom he calls his enemies, and who are responsible for his confinement.

To a reporter he said that unless he received a divine command to eat "jail food" he would continue his fast, and if it pleased the Lord that he should die in prison he would willingly be a martyr to his religious convictions. Yesterday afternoon he was doing his share of the work around the jail that is divided among the prisoners and while it is not arduous labor it is sufficient exercise to promote a vigorous appetite. Hartman came to Astoria from Portland about six or seven months ago and has been working at odd jobs during the summer. He is about 40 years of age and talks rationally and with apparent sanity except on his martyr-like conception of his duties to his religion.
