At a meeting of the Rathbone Sisters held last night it was decided to give an entertainment Wednesday night to which visiting Sir Knights, Rathbone Sisters and the public generally is invited. A musical program composed of the best talent in the city will be presented and other interesting entertainment will be provided.

Mrs. F. D. Keutner received a telegram Sunday announcing the death of her father, Judge J. S. Dilley, at Mount Tabor, Ore. Judge Dilley was a native of Wisconsin, 85 years of age, and came to the coast across the plains in 1848. The funeral will be held from the family residence at Mount Tabor today.

Captain Goodale, in charge of the improvements at Fort Stevens and Columbia will leave today on a trip of inspection to the latter fort. Captain Goodale stated yesterday that the pumps and boilers for the new water system being installed at Fort Stevens were in Portland and would probably arrive down today. The work will be completed within two or three weeks after the arrival of the machinery which has been delayed because of the strike.

A long-denied woman and an outraged appetite have combined to work a change of heart in Fred Hartman, the member of the Salvation Army who is serving a sentence in the county jail for fishing without a license. Yesterday he broke his fast and ate heartily of a meal brought to him by comrades in the Salvation Army. Hartman showed signs of weakness in his determination Sunday when he informed Sheriff Laville that he would eat if taken from the jail to a restaurant. To this the sheriff replied that the prison rules hardly provided for such accommodations and that he would have to eat in jail or not at all. Yesterday several members of the army called upon Hartman and urged him to eat. He

agreed to do so if the food was furnished by the army. This was done and the work of destruction accomplished by Hartman when the meal was brought him proved that it was what he needed.

At prices already announced by the Pacific Packing and Navigation Company the season's pack of sockeyes on Puget sound will be worth \$5,400,000. The pack of the canneries on the Sound up to the evening of August 22 was as follows: Alaska Packers' Association, 250,000 cases; Pacific American Company, 245,000 cases; North American Fisheries Company, 60,000 cases; Stanwood cannery, 10,000 cases; Myers' cannery, 36,000 cases; International cannery, 7500 cases; Rosario straits, 20,000 cases; Fidalgo, 70,000 cases; White Crest, 20,000 cases; Sunset cannery, 25,000 cases; Carlisle, 47,500 cases; Pacific Northwest, 25,000 cases; Cooks', 27,500 cases; Almsworth & Dunn, 50,000 cases; George & Barker, 37,000 cases; Falc'haven Cannery Company, 36,000 cases; Puget Sound cannery, 45,000 cases; Astoria Packing Company, 50,000 cases; National Packing Company, 10,000 cases, and Port Townsend Packing Company, 25,000 cases.

The United States training ship Mohican arrived in the river Sunday afternoon and anchored abreast of the city. She will remain here during the regatta. The Mohican is an old wooden vessel, bark rigged and has 360 persons on board, including officers, crew and apprentices. The officers of the vessel are as follows: A. R. Condon, commander; H. S. Mackery, boatswain; W. H. Schluter, gunner; W. W. Tolos, carpenter.

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E. McReavy and Deputy Warden Bultman returned yesterday from Sandy hatchery with a fine lot of royal chinook salmon eggs. Sandy hatchery is about forty-five miles from Portland and can only be reached by wagon. They brought the eggs through in good condition; some of them are hatching out now.

The moving picture show that was in Astoria last spring has returned and brings a lot of new pictures of world famous celebrities. For instance there is a series of pictures showing Carrie Nation in her joint smashing specialty. Another film that has been of unusual interest to the public depicts Vice-President Roosevelt hunting mountain lions in the wilds of Colorado.

George A. Shields, superintendent of the water works, has resigned his position and will leave for Oakland, Cal., where he has accepted a position with the Contra Costa Water Company. Mr. Shields has been superintendent of the local water system for several years and his many friends regret his departure. His successor will probably be appointed at the next meeting of the water commission.

A very pleasant party assembled last evening at the residence of Mrs. Chas. W. Holmes, in honor of the forthcoming marriage of Miss Laura G. Gray. The rooms were decorated with ferns and flowers appropriate for the occasion and presented a handsome appearance. Frank Greenough won the gentleman's prize and Miss Lila Sutherland won the ladies prize. A light lunch was served by Mrs. Holmes and the party separated at an early hour in the morning, after spending a most enjoyable and long to be remembered night.

The Skamokawa was strong and had some cleverness but Denny had the best of the fight from the start; to the finish and landed whenever and where he pleased. The citizens of the little town on the North Shore are mightily well pleased with the success of their first affair of the kind and the event will likely become an annual fixture.

The place will be conducted in an orderly and respectable manner, and patrons can enjoy a lunch at the place without being disturbed. The beer garden may be entered from Duane or Eleventh streets or through the National cafe, facing on Commercial St.

Both Martin Denny and "Kid" Lee are in splendid condition for their fight scheduled for Thursday night and the event promises to be the best pugilistic contest ever pulled off in Astoria. The men have been working faithfully and while Denny's form is better known to Astorians than is Lee the latter has shown that he possesses both strength and skill and there is good grounds for predicting that the fight will be hard fought, while it looks. The seats are going rapidly, several reservations having been made for sporting men who will come from a distance to see the fight.

In all nine ships have been chartered to date to carry the British Columbia salmon pack to England, and the fleet is the largest for several years.

An attempt is again being made to effect a combine among British Columbia canners and Mr. Wurzburg, who is engineering the deal, has offered to deposit \$50,000 in a bank to guarantee his agreement to pay from 12 1/2 to 25 cents a fish next season. The Vancouver unions have accepted the offer and other unions are expected to follow suit. The cannermen profess to have but little faith in Promoter Wurzburg and his plans, but he is going ahead and is confident of success.

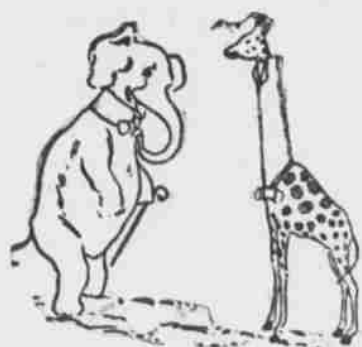

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REGATTA PROGRAM

Events That Have Been Arranged for the Three Days.

Following is the detailed program for the regatta carnival.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 23.

Sunrise, salute of 21 guns by U. S. Artillery.

Grand street parade in which will appear the queen and maids, attended by her prime minister, Admiral Edwards and staff, Governor Geer and staff, Mayor Bergman and the city council, escorted by a detachment of U. S. Artillery from Fort Stevens, and blue jackets from the U. S. training ship Mohican. The parade after traversing the principal streets will proceed to the regatta grand stand, whereupon the queen, after being accorded the royal salute of 25 guns by the artillery will be presented to her subjects by her prime minister, and after receiving

a formal welcome will receive the keys of the city, on behalf of the people of Astoria, will declare the regatta opened.
