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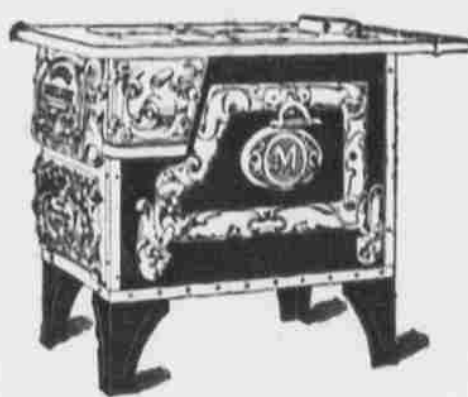

STRIKERS ARE NOT ALARMED

Amalgamated Officials Treat the Threat With
Indifference—Corporation Making Slow
Gains—Schwab Buys Bethlehem
Steel Company.PITTSBURGH, Aug. 27.—Practically
the only significant event in the strike
today was the positive stand taken by
the American Tinplate Company in re-
sponse to its course in the future.The official statement from the com-
pany denies that there are any nego-
tiations on foot looking to a settlement
of the strike and authorized the state-
ment that the mills put into operation
during the strike will be continued non-
union. Association officials treat the
threat with indifference.Developments of the day would ap-
pear to evidence slow but sure gains
by the corporation.It is learned late tonight that Presi-
dent Elmer has sent letters to all
members of the executive committee of
the Amalgamated Association inviting
the approval of the peace plan agreed
upon last Saturday by representatives
of the National Civic Federation and
the Amalgamated Association officials.
It approved the Civic Federation peo-
ple will endeavor to secure an audience
with steel corporation officials in New
York.

IN THE HANDS OF SCHWAB

Check of Over Four Millions Deposited
for Bethlehem Company.PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 27.—The
Bethlehem Steel Company, which in-
cludes the Bethlehem Iron Company,
today passed into the hands of Charles
M. Schwab. A check for \$4,622,600 was
deposited with the Girard Trust Com-
pany by Drexel & Company in payment
for the 188,000 shares of the Bethlehem
steel stock.The total number of shares in the
company is 200,000.

CHUN'S EXPIRATORY MISSION.

Belief That There Are Fresh Complica-
tions in Signing of Protocol.BERLIN, Aug. 27.—In view of the
fact that the expiratory mission of Prince
Chun, brother of the emperor of China,
was one of the conditions of peace em-
bodied in the demands of the powers,
the interruption of the journey of Chun,
who is now in Basle, Switzerland, has
created considerable comment. The ex-
cuse of sickness is nowhere entertained
seriously. Taken in conjunction with
the sudden detention in Shanghai of the
expiratory mission to Japan, it is be-
lieved to indicate fresh complications
with reference to the signing of the
protocol in Peking.

TO SIGN THE PROTOCOL

LONDON, Aug. 27.—La Hung Chang
has notified the minister of the powers
that the Chinese plenipotentiaries are
now ready to sign the protocol, says a
dispatch to the Times from Peking,
and has requested them to fix the date
for signing.

TO DEPORT NEGROES

Governor Yates Asked to Exclude Strike
Breakers in Chicago.CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Governor Yates
is to be asked by the union machinists
of Chicago to intervene with a view to
putting a stop to the importation of
strike breakers who are being
brought to this city daily from the East
and placed at work in striking machin-
ists' plants.Governor Tanner's action in excluding
negro strike breakers from the state and
deporting them from Springfield Valley dur-
ing the big strike of the coal miners,
is to be brought to the attention of the
present governor as a precedent.This plan was decided upon at the
meeting of the machinists' executive
board representing the eight local lodges
of the Machinists' International Union,
Business Agent Arthur E. Ireland asked
the meeting to empower him to send a
letter to the governor on the sub-
ject.

SHIPPING AT A STANDSTILL

Considerable Piling Off in Marine
Business at New York.NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Stagnation in
the shipping business at New York, and
even more so at the outports, is the
existing condition, according to the
Journal of Commerce, which asserts
that shipping is demoralized, and that
shipowners find themselves unable to
obtain business at any rate. The dearth
of merchandise is not confined to anyone department. It is general, includ-
ing manufactured products as well as
grain and provisions."This condition of stagnation," says
the Journal of Commerce, "applies to the
shipping business of the outports even
more than to New York, as practically
all the freight business out of this port
is carried in the regular line packets,
including the enormous freight steam-
ers of the White Star, Hamburg-Ameri-
can, North German Lloyd and Atlantic
Transport steamship lines, as well as
the smaller freight carriers on the other
lines. With these lines, the absence
of demand for freight room is indi-
cated merely by the low rates at which
they offer to take cargo. It does not,
however, interfere with their regular
sailing dates for, if they have not suf-
ficient cargo, they merely utilize their
water-ballast compartment and sail
light." It is a fact that large steamers
with 12,000 tons carrying capacity and
upward, have left this port carrying less
than 2000 tons of cargo all told."BOGUS EXPENSE ACCOUNT
IN DETECTIVE BUREAUTestimony of Chicago's Chief of Police
Creates a Sensation in Court.CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—The connection
of Sergeant Cramer, Detective Tracy
and Lieutenant Joyce with a bogus ex-
pense account which have developed in
the detective bureau and its chief, Cap-
tain Callahan, in the scandal, was told
today by Chief of Police O'Neill before
the civil service commission sitting to
investigate the matter.The announcement created a sensa-
tion, particularly when O'Neill told of
the alleged confessions of his subordi-
nates. The only thing not revealed was
the source of information that led to
the unearthing of the scandal.

WILL STUMP OHIO

Senator Hanna Interested in the
State Campaign.CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 27.—It
is announced that much of Sen-
ator Hanna's time during the
state campaign will be spent on the
stump, special attention being
given to Cuyahoga county.Senator Hanna returned home
today after a week's trip up the
lakes and will leave tomorrow
for North Solon, where he will
speak to the annual reunion of the
Western Reserve Association.

CONSTITUTION LOCKED

Several Plates on Yacht's Keel Found
in Bad Shape.BRISTOL, R. I., Aug. 27.—Several
plates were found in bad shape when
the Constitution was docked today. The
yacht got a bad wrench when she
grounded in Oyster Bay a few days
ago.It is thought possible much of the
yacht's unsatisfactory work may be
attributed to the condition of the plates
on her keel.

FROM THE ORIENTMassacre of Chinese in the Kwan
Tien Hien District.

RUSSIAN FORCE INCREASED

Twenty Thousand Men Placed on Korea-
Manchurian Frontier—Bloody Affray
Between Protestant and
Catholic Converts.VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 27.—W.
Whyte, of London, general manager of
the Canadian Pacific railway, returned
from the Orient today by the Empress
of China. General Gascoie, commander
of the British forces in China, was also
a passenger on the Empress of China,
bound for London.The Chinese papers contain accounts
of the massacre of Chinese in the
Kwan Tien Hien district, Manchuria.
Russians are excusing the massacre by
the statement that the peasants killed
were mistaken for insurgents. Few de-
tails are given.Further trouble in Mongolia and Man-
churia are reported and, according to
the North China Daily News the Rus-
sians have placed 20,000 men in the
Manchurian-Korea frontier to cope
with the rebels.The Shanghai Mercury publishes a
letter from North Shan Tung to the
effect that the Boxers are drilling and
preparing for a rising in that province.
A bloody affray is reported from the
Chinese village fifteen miles from Kian-
gsei, where Protestant and Catholic con-
verts quarreled and came to blows with
the result that thirty Protestants were
killed.

MORMONS IN JAPAN

Campaign Commenced by Missionaries—
Earthquakes in Yokohama.YOKOHAMA, Aug. 16.—The advent
of Mormon missionaries in Japan, is ex-
citing much comment. Four of them
arrived last Monday, and have already
commenced an active campaign.August 9th, Yokohama was visited by
two earthquakes of an unusual char-
acter, each being of abnormal length
and accompanied by a peculiar motion.
No lives were lost.

MINEWORKERS' CONVENTION

Delegates Will Discuss Many Griev-
ances Against Coal Mine Owners.HAZLETON, Pa., Aug. 27.—In pur-
suance to a call issued several weeks
ago by the district executive board,
the United Mineworkers of the anthracite
coal fields will hold a convention
here at which nearly 1000 delegates rep-
resenting 365 local unions, are expected
to be present.The convention will continue for three
or four days. Refusal of some of the
coal companies to countenance the card
company system, alleged failure of oth-
ers to pay ten per cent increase, sup-
posed to be granted by every mine owner
last spring, local grievances and the
amalgamation of stationary engineers,
firemen, blacksmiths, carpenters and
teamsters with the United Minework-
ers will be the most important matters
considered.

COST OF PROBATE

Settlement of Fair Estate Will Cost Up-
ward of Two Million Dollars.SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—The
fee and commissions amounting to
\$402,517, which Judge Trout has awarded
to attorneys and executors of the
estate of James G. Fair estate is in ad-
dition to the \$30,000 given each of the
executors by the New York probate
court for the administration of the por-
tion of the estate located in that city.
The total valuation on which the ex-
ecutors' commissions were computed is
\$7,371,615. Other heavy fees are yet to
be paid but it is estimated that \$5,000,
000 will remain for the late Senator
Fair's three children.

AMERICAN RACERS ABROAD

Followers of Motor-Pace Will Compete
in Big European Races.NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—A number of
the stars among the motor-pace fol-
lowing bicyclists of America will go to
England and South America for a win-
ter tour. The team will go first to Eng-
land, then to Birmingham, Manchester,
Leeds, Liverpool and possibly Glasgow,
Edinburgh and Dublin. Elkes, Walt-
hour and Sison have already it is said
engaged for the trip.

RAILROAD DEAL

Canadian Pacific Buys a Short Line to
Facilitate Grain Handling.NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—A special to
the Times from Montreal says:
The Canadian Pacific road has pur-
chased the control of the Kingston andPembroke railway. This line was built
in 1874 from Kingston, Ont., to Ren-
frew. The executives of the Flower es-
tate, of Watertown N. Y., hold a large
part of the stock and the rest was held
in Kingston. R. W. Folger, of King-
ston disposed of 75,000 shares to the
Canadian Pacific road.The Canadian Pacific is credited with
a plan to handle grain brought down
by vessels to Kingston by rail to
Montreal through its new line. The
president of the Canadian Pacific rail-
way, T. G. Shaughnessy confirmed the
news of the purchase.SAMPSON WILL BE
REPRESENTED BY COUNSELNew York Attorney Going to Washing-
ton to Consult the Navy
Records.WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—It is un-
derstood that Admiral Sampson is to be
represented before the Schley court of
inquiry by counsel. Navy officials say
they have no knowledge officially of the
retention of counsel by Sampson but
privately it is admitted that he expects
to be so represented.It was learned that W. H. Stayton, a
lawyer of New York, was expected at
the navy department tomorrow and it
is supposed his purpose is to consult
the record of the department in the in-
terest of Sampson.

Philadelphia bar, has been called as as-
sistant counsel for Admiral Schley in
the coming investigation.

ANOTHER DEATH ADDED

Texas Oil Gusher Spouting 70
Feet High.BEAUMONT, Tex., Aug. 27.—
The Palestine-Baumont well is
still spouting a stream of petro-
leum as high as the top of the
seventy-foot derrick and it has
added the death of another man
to the two killed yesterday.James Smith and John Mc-
Daniel were drowned in oil last
night, but their fate was un-
heeded by Peter Gallagher and
two companions. Gallagher went
to his death in the fatal spray of
gas and oil while his companions
barely escaped.AMBASSADOR CONSTANS
DEPARTS FROM TURKEYFrench Government Breaks Off Rela-
tions With the Sultan—Downfall
of Turkey Foreshadowed.PARIS, Aug. 27.—A semi-official note
has been issued, announcing that the
Porte had not carried out its under-
takings with regard to the disputed
questions between the French and Ot-
oman governments. M. Constans, the
French ambassador, acting under in-
structions from the foreign minister of
France, left Constantinople August 26,
the date named in his last communi-
cation to the Porte on the subject.An arrangement had been effected Aug-
ust 17, and its terms drafted by the
Ottoman foreign minister with the ap-
proval of the sultan, who had prom-
ised M. Constans that the text should
be handed to him August 18. M. Con-
stans telegraphed to Paris August 19
that none of the promises had been
fulfilled, and Mr. Delcasse, minister of
foreign affairs, August 21, telegraphed
M. Constans that in view of so flagrant
a disregard of the undertakings, the
negotiations could no longer be con-
tinued and requested M. Constans to in-
form the Porte that he had received or-
ders to leave Constantinople.

TURKEY'S FALL FORESHADOWED

Dissolution of Concert of European
Powers Inevitable.WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—It is feared
in official circles that the withdrawal
of the French ambassador from Con-
stantinople marks the dissolution of the
concert of European powers under
which the integrity of Turkey was guar-
anteed. By the treaty of Berlin all the
great powers of Europe subscribed to
an agreement to refrain from any act
that would tend to the destruction of
the Ottoman Empire. This action was
taken to forestall what were conceived
to be the designs of Russia to seize
Turkish territory, and Russia herself
was led to subscribe to the agreement
by force of circumstances.Although several times severely
strained, notably such events as the
last war between Turkey and Greece,
this pact has so far endured without
amendment, but it is apprehended now
that if the action of France is carried
out to the extreme indicated in the dis-
patch, each of the other signatory
powers will feel obliged in self-pro-
tection to disregard the agreement and
press upon Turkey the vast financial
and other claims that have accumu-
lated in the past quarter of a century,
with a result of disrupting the present
Turkish government.SPECTACLE WAS
MOST IMPOSINGThree Hundred Thousand Witness
Knight Templars Parade.

THIRTY THOUSAND IN LINE

Portion of Y. M. C. A. Reviewing Stand Col-
lapsed and Half Dozen Injured—
Mention of Schley's Name
Elicits Much Applause.LOUISVILLE, Ky., Aug. 27.—It is es-
timated that 300,000 persons today wit-
nessed the parade of the Knights Tem-
plars. Thirty thousand Sir Knights were
in line, forming an imposing spectacle
with which to begin the twenty-eighth
triennial convocation.By noon the heat became oppressive
and there were eleven cases of pros-
trations, none of which were serious.
A portion of the Y. M. C. A. reviewing
stand collapsed and half a dozen peo-
ple sustained injuries. The crack
commanders from Chicago, Pittsburg
and San Francisco attracted special at-
tention by their magnificent appearance.
The formal welcome to the Knights
was extended by Judge Barker, of
Louisville, and ex-Congressman W. C.
P. Breckenridge. The mention of Ad-
miral Schley's name elicited applause
so enthusiastic that both speakers were
compelled to stop for several minutes.
It was so late when the program was
completed that there was little time for
the actual business of the grand en-
campment.

PHILIPPINE MISSIONS

New York Pastor Has Been Requested
to Organize the Work.NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Rev. Dr. Geo.
F. Pentecost, pastor of the First Pres-
byterian church, of Yonkers, who has
been in England all summer, and who
sailed for America yesterday, has been
requested by the American Board of For-
eign Missions to organize the religious
work in the Philippines.
It is not known whether Dr. Pentecost
has accepted the call as he has been
breathing at the Maryland Presby-
terian church, London, for the last two
months.

ISTHMIAN AFFAIRS QUIET

COLON, Aug. 27.—Isthmian affairs
continue quiet. The United States gun-
boat, Machias probably will go to Bocas
Del Toro at the end of the week if fa-
vorable news to the government is not
received from that point. It is ex-
pected the French cruiser Suchet will
sail in a few days.

WANT NOYES REMOVED

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—A peti-

McKinley asking for the removal of
Judge Arthur Noyes, of the United
States district court of Alaska, has ar-
rived here.

SIX TEAMS RACING

BOSTON, Aug. 27.—Three teams of

20 laps at the end of the first day of
the six day race which started this
afternoon. Six teams are in it to race
eight hours each day.

ADDITIONAL CHARGES MADE

TUCSON, Ariz., Aug. 27.—United
States Collector of Customs Hoey has
been re-arrested on additional counts in
connection with the Chinese conspi-
racious case. The bond was raised to \$5000.
