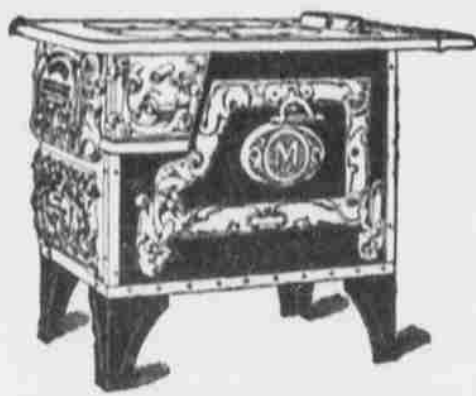

CAUSED DEATH OF SEVEN PERSONS

Boiler Explodes on Steamship
City of Trenton.

OVER A SCORE WERE INJURED

After the Explosion the Steamer Took Fire
and Ran Aground—Feared That
Passengers Are Dead in the
Hold.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—While
the Wilmington Steamboat Company's
steamer City of Trenton was on its
way from this city to Trenton, N. J.,
this afternoon, the port boiler ex-
ploded, killing seven persons and injuring
over a score of others. Four passen-
gers are missing. The dead are:
J. W. CHEW, assistant engineer,
MISS ELIZABETH GREEN, Phila-
delphia.

Two firemen, names unknown.
One deckhand, name unknown.
Two passengers, names unknown.
The missing are:
Mrs. John Matthews, Philadelphia.
Mrs. Matilda Cross, Philadelphia.
Two children, seen to jump over-
board.

The injured are:
Theresa Rhein, Philadelphia, fatally.
Louisa Panschick, Philadelphia, fa-
tally.

A large number of residents of Phila-
delphia, Camden and towns nearby were
nearly or seriously hurt.

After the explosion the boat took fire
and ran aground. Tonight she lies a
wrecked and blackened hulk in the
marshes opposite Torresdale. The hold
is filled with water and it is feared
more passengers and crew may be
found in the bottom of the boat when
the water is pumped out.

Later tonight, two additional bodies
were recovered from the wreck.

SENATOR BRINGS LATE

ADVISES FROM ALASKA

Suldr's Body Brought Down—Murder-
ous Attack on Miss Annie Cur-
ran—Two Men Drowned.

SEATTLE, Aug. 28.—The body of
Nate Walters, who committed suicide
in Nome, was brought down on the
steamer Senator today. He shot him-
self in a fit of despondency.

According to late Nome advices,
Thomas Duncan made a murderous at-
tack on Miss Annie Curran, near Sali-
van City, with a revolver, resulting in
the probable fatal wounding of Barney
Fay, a bystander.

Two men, strangers at Teller City,
whose names were Twombly and Tobin,
were drowned near Teller, August 19.

SIX DAY BICYCLE RACE.

Positions of Riders Changed at the
End of Fifth Day.

REVERE, Mass., August 28.—The
positions of riders in the six day bicy-
cle race were unchanged at the close
of riding today. At the end of the
fifth day of the race the positions
were:

Moran and McLean, Maya and Bailey
and McDuffie and Pierce, each 342 miles,
two laps. Blacker and Dowhey, and
Stevens and Alexander each 343 miles,
one lap; Targem and Dubois 343 miles.

AFTER ORIENTAL TRAFFIC.

May Use Pacific Mail Steamships in
Connection With Alaskan Road.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Directors of
the Alaskan, Tokpa and Santa Fe rail-
way and Pacific Mail Steamship Com-
pany have had under consideration
a proposal to utilize the steamships of
the latter company as the means for
the Orient for the rapidly increasing
traffic of the Alaskan.

Vice-President Morton, who has
charge of the negotiations on behalf of
the railroad, is in the city, but declined
to give particulars of the proposed ar-
rangements.

LYNCHING AWAITS HIM.

Negro Fled Who Outraged and Mur-
dered Missouri Girl.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 28.—"Bender"
Francis, a negro who outraged and
murdered Miss Mary Henderson, at
Columbia, Mo., last night, has not
been captured, but four or five hundred
men are tonight scouring the woods in
the vicinity of the scene of the crime,
and it is said Francis cannot possibly
escape.

Francis undoubtedly will be lynched if
captured.

MARINE CABLE LAID.

SEATTLE, Aug. 28.—The laying of
the government marine cable from
Skagway to Juneau was completed Aug-
ust 23, and is now in operation.

State Convention of Nebraska
in Session.

M'KINLEY HIGHLY ENDORSED

Policies of Administration Commended—Pla-
form Recognizes Rights of Wage Earn-
ers but Draws the Line at
Lawlessness.

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 28.—The Re-
publican state convention today nomi-
nated this ticket.

Justice of the supreme court—Samuel
Sedgewick, of York county.
Regents of the university—Carl J. Er-
nest, of Lancaster; H. L. Gould, of
Keith.

The nominations were without fric-
tion. After highly commending the pol-
icies, purposes and achievements of the
national administration, the platform
says:

"The right of every man to enjoy the
fruit of his labor should be insured by
every known safeguard.

"Its invasion, either by blacklist or
boycott, is contrary to the spirit of
American institutions. We recognize the
right of wage workers to organize for
mutual protection, but we draw the line
at violence and lawlessness."

Commandery, No. 1, of Denver, before
a throng of 18,000 people, today cap-
tured the first prize in the competition

place, while Golden Gate, No. 16, of
San Francisco, and Hunsdon, No. 16,
of Cincinnati, came in for third and
fourth places respectively. California
Commandery, No. 1, being the only

MRS. NATION MAKES

CALLS IN NEW YORK

Tells Commissioner Murphy a Little
Agitation Would Do Good—
Could Not See Sullivan.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Mrs. Carrie
Nation arrived in the city today. She
had an interview with Police Commis-
sioner Murphy. Mrs. Nation also called
at John L. Sullivan's saloon to see
the ex-bugle in reference to the
statement he was alleged to have made
that he "would throw her into the sewer."
Sullivan sent word down that he
was ill.

During her interview with Commis-
sioner Murphy, Mrs. Nation addressed
him as "Father," which the commis-
sioner warmly resented, but the Kan-
sas reformer persisted. "Father, don't
you think a little agitation would be
good for New York?" she asked.
"If you violate the laws I will have
you locked up," responded Murphy.

SULTAN PLEADS WITH CONSTANCE

Begged Him to Consider His Ma-
jesty's Feelings.

CONSTANS WAS OBDDURATE

Declined to Alter His Decision—Sultan Will
Not Yield to Unreasonable Demands
and Has Ordered Guns From
Germany.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—"Before M. Con-
stance left Constantinople," says a dis-
patch to the Standard from the Turkish
capital, "he received a letter from the
sultan begging him to consider his ma-
jesty's feelings and not act in a man-
ner his majesty thought uncalled for."
"M. Constance declined to alter his de-
cision."

PREPARING FOR WAR.

Sultan Orders Three Hundred Guns
From Germany.

VIENNA, Aug. 28.—The Tagblatt to-
day publishes mail correspondence from
Constantinople, which says the sultan
will go to war rather than yield to un-
reasonable demands, that he is studying
plans for defense and that he has or-
dered 300 guns from Germany.

FRENCH FLAG HAULED DOWN.

Will Not Be Restored Until Diplomatic
Relations Are Resumed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 28.—The
French flag was hauled down from over
the embassy of France after the de-
parture of Ambassador M. Constans,
and it will not be hoisted again until di-
plomatic relations are restored. The
staff of the embassy remains here, but
there is no charge d'affaires. The
French consuls in Turkey have been
directed to continue to protect French
interests.

Besides the immediate causes of the
disagreement, it is pointed out that
constant difficulties were placed in the
way of French commercial interests in
Turkey, which contributed to Mr. Con-
stans' resolution. All the embassies
complain of vexatious interference with
trade.

GUARD SHOTS PRISONER.

Convict at Walla Walla Penitentiary
Shot Through Left Thigh.

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 28.—Guard
W. H. Collins, at the penitentiary this
morning shot George Howard, serving
a sentence for burglary committed at
Seattle, through the left thigh. The
prisoner left his work in the jute mill
and refusing to halt when ordered, the
guard fired.

After the shooting fifty prisoners re-
fused to go to work. The strikers are
being punished.

RETURNED TROOPS STATIONED.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Orders
have been issued at the war department
sending one squadron of the Fourth
cavalry, which arrived at San Francisco
from Manila today, to Fort Riley; an-
other to Jefferson barracks, and an-
other to Fort Leavenworth.

ENGINEER'S AWFUL DEATH.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Aug. 28.—
Just as the steamer Roanoke was en-
tering this port on the way to Nome,
Assistant Engineer Muse was caught in
the electrical machinery and almost de-
capitated. The body was brought
ashore here.

GIVEN LIFE IMPRISONMENT.

WETUMPKA, Ala., Aug. 28.—George
Howard was today convicted of murder
in the first degree and sentenced to
life imprisonment. Howard was a
member of the mob which lynched a
negro some months ago.

THE HANCOCK ARRIVES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—The
transport Hancock arrived from Manila
today. Among the passengers was Con-
gressman Hall, of Iowa, wife and
daughter; Colonel A. S. Burt, of the
Twenty-fifth infantry, and Colonel Alex.
Moore, retired.

sponsible for three deaths, was placed
under control today without further fa-
talities.

ADDING MEN TO NON-UNION FORCE

Operation of Two Pittsburg Mills
Now Assured.

SHAFFER DENIES ANY GAINS

Says Assertion of Corporation Cannot Be
Made Good—Association Lodges Said
to Be Voting on Settlement
Proposals.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 28.—The steel
corporation continues making gains in
this district and today added enough
men to the force at the Star plant to
insure the working of two mills, double
turn, night and day. The management
asserts the entire plant will be in full
operation before a week ends.

Strikers say this assertion cannot be
made good. In pursuance to its an-
nounced plan to run all the plants ab-
solutely non-union, the American Tin
Plate Company today commenced ad-
vertising for non-union men.

President Shaffer declared tonight
that the strike, in spite of claims of the
other side, is proceeding satisfactorily
and that the association is making such
inroads upon the corporation's business
that it will be compelled sooner or later
to come to terms.

Another arbitration scheme was
launched this afternoon by Simon
Burns, president of the Window Glass
Workers Association. Burns proposes
an arbitration committee selected from
among such men as Archbishop Ireland,
Bishop Potter, Seth Low and others
of like prominence who, after having
the entire matter explained to them by
both sides to the controversy, should
have absolute authority to decide upon
the terms of settlement, their decision
to be final and accepted by both parties.

ASSAULTED A CHILD.

Flendish Crime of 16-Year-Old Youth in
Indian Territory.

ARDMORE, I. T., Aug. 28.—Great ex-
citement prevails at Troy, because of
an assault on Cora Bell, 5 years old.
Don Petty, aged 16, is in jail at Tish-
moningo, on a charge of assaulting the
girl.

The girl, it is rumored, died last
night.

MRS. LOVELACE'S LIBERAL GIFT.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 28.—Mrs. Jo-
hanna M. Lovelace, of Turner, Kas.,
has made an offer to the Kansas City,
Kas., Baptist theological seminary of a
gift of ninety acres of land valued at
\$20,000 near that city. The gift is made
on condition that \$5000 be raised to
purchase the building on the property
to be used for seminary purposes.

COURT OFFICIALS ARRESTED.

GUTHRIE, O. T., Aug. 28.—Judge
Jefferson Ward and Clerk William Hen-
derson, of the Indian court, at Spiro,
I. T., were arrested at the instigation
of Governor Dukes, of the Choctaw na-
tion, and placed in jail at Sallis to
await trial and charge lese majeste.

STOLEN MONEY FOUND.

OMAHA, Aug. 28.—Three boys play-
ing in a lumber yard today found three
packages of paper money aggregating
\$8000. It is thought the money was
stolen from the Pacific Express Com-
pany years ago.

DAILY TRIBUNE SOLD.

NEBRASKA CITY, Aug. 28.—The
Daily Tribune has been sold to the Mor-
son Printing Company, of which J.
Berling Moran, ex-secretary of agri-
culture, is the head and will be edited
by him.

DOWAGER EMPRESS' WILL.

HAMBURG, Aug. 28.—The will of the
late Dowager Empress Frederick was
opened today. Her fortune totals eleven
million marks. Her six children receive
a million each.

PASSENGER TRAINS COLLIDE.

TACOMA, Aug. 28.—Two Northern
Pacific passenger trains collided near
Hot Springs this morning. Both engines
were badly wrecked but no one was
injured.

BRACELEN'S BODY RECOVERED.

LOST BY ONE VOTE.

LIMA, Peru, Aug. 28.—In the Peru-
vian senate today a motion to impeach
the cabinet was defeated by one vote.
