The fisheries display at the street fair is proving of great interest to visitors. The little salmon are hatching out hourly and are thriving. Yesterday the school children manifested the usual juvenile tendency to investigate with the result that several of the larger fish were killed. There is also exhibition models of traps and wheels, constructed by the Fishermen's Union.

Everything points to this year's regatta being far and away the best ever held. Already the crowds have commenced to pour into the city and today will see the number of strangers largely increased.

The Robertson log raft has been released from the mud near Westport and is back in the slough. A channel of sufficient depth will be dredged out before another attempt is made to tow the raft to sea.

The street fair management has set apart Saturday as a D. U. W. day and indications point to a large attendance of members of the order from neighboring cities and towns. Invitations to lodges in the state and in Washington and Idaho are being sent out by the local lodge.

The O. R. & N. has made a rate of 15c from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first to third Tuesdays, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

On another page is published a picture of Martin Denny, who will meet "Kid" Lee, of Colorado, tonight in a twenty-round glove contest for a purse of \$500. Both men are in splendid condition and with two interesting preliminaries there will be a good evening's sport. The main event is scheduled to be called about midnight.

The parade of the school children yesterday was in every way successful. Over 600 were in line and the procession was led by Grand Marshal Stockton, assisted by Sheriff Livette, who brought up the rear. The children were admitted free to the street fair and midway and thoroughly enjoyed the different performances.

It is now under speed that the Oregon naval reserve, composed of the First and Third Divisions, both of which are located at Portland, will leave on an eight-day practice cruise next Monday. The United States flagship Philadelphia, Captain Meade, has been placed at the reserve's disposal, and has received orders to proceed from San Francisco, where she now is, to Astoria. The vessel is expected to reach the mouth of the Columbia Saturday night. Owing to the limited time and desiring to make all possible time in getting down to work on the deep, Captain R. E. Davies, commander of the reserve, has decided to bring his boys down to Astoria on a river boat, and from here board the Philadelphia. This will save much valuable time.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM A HORRIBLE DEATH

Carbide Gas Tank Explodes and Operator Slightly Injured.

Will S. Hale, of Portland, who has operated a moving picture show on Duane street between the office of the water commission and the Methodist church, had a narrow escape from a horrible death this morning shortly after midnight. Hale was unable to get electric light connections to operate his machine and attempted to work it with carbide gas.

The gas was generated in a retort and passed to a sixty-four-gallon tank, in which a pressure of ten pounds to the inch was maintained. After the show last night Hale was attending to some work about the machine when, without the slightest warning, a terrific explosion occurred. The front of the building was wrecked, every pane of glass broken and the heavy iron tank twisted and bent and then by the force of the explosion, Hale was within two feet of the tank when the accident occurred and was partially covered with the wreckage.

He crawled to the sidewalk and found that he could not stand. Hale was carried to Dr. Estes' office, where it was found that the bones and flesh about the left knee had been bruised and shattered. The injuries were dressed and beyond being obliged to use crutches for a few days, Hale will be none the worse for his experience. The picture machine is a wreck but Hale intends to have it repaired today and expects to resume exhibitions tonight.

REGATTA QUEEN'S WELCOME

Whistles and Cannon Noisily Give Greeting to Miss Barker and Admiral Edwards.

The booming of cannon, the shrieking of innumerable whistles and the cheers of 5000 people mingled in the royal, rousing welcome to the distinguished party aboard the Harvest Queen last night. Miss Ivy Barker, the queen of the eighth annual Astoria regatta, was naturally the center of interest and as soon as the steamer approached sufficiently near to permit those on board to be recognized the royal party was seen on the side of the boat facing the grand stand at midnight. Miss Barker was in the center and was surrounded by her maids of honor, all gowned in nautical costumes of white.

Long before the hour scheduled for the arrival of the Harvest Queen the people began to congregate on the grand stand at the foot of Eleventh street and on the wharves adjoining. Word had been received by the regatta committee that the steamer had left Portland at noon and had passed Hecetae at 3 o'clock. To the right of the White Collar line warehouse was one of the field pieces from Fort Stevens, and manned by a detail of artillerymen. Shortly before 6 o'clock the steamer could be seen approaching and a little later the tug Challenger, having aboard the reception committee, put off to meet the Harvest Queen. The launch Sylph, with a party aboard, also proceeded up the river.

When the Harvest Queen was opposite the Flavel wharf the whistles of the Manzanita and Columbia opened

the volentous tumultuous welcome. Other crafts joined the chorus and suddenly there came the deep resounding boom of the cannon, the first of the twenty-one guns—the royal salute. The steamer proceeded down stream and turned below the United States training ship Mahan. As the steamer rounded the Mahan both the union jack and national flag on the former were dipped in salute and in the intervals when anything was distinguishable above the din of the whistles there could be heard fragments of the "Star Spangled Banner," by the Third Regiment band, which accompanied the party down the river.

It was truly a royal welcome and pretty Miss Barker and her maids were a picture to be long remembered. When the Harvest Queen tied up the reception committee went aboard and informally offered their allegiance to the queen. Today Mayor Beukman will formally present Miss Barker with a golden key to the city's gates. Miss Barker had an informal reception aboard the steamer and graciously received the throngs who desired to meet the regatta

is queen. Afterwards Miss Barker and her maids were driven to the private homes, where they will be entertained during their stay in Astoria.

Admiral Edwards and his party were greeted by the reception committee and escorted to the quarters provided and reserved for them. Today the regatta will be formally opened with a grand parade and appropriate ceremonies at the grand stand. Tonight will take place the regatta ball and the impressive coronation ceremonies in Bond & Stokes hall, who has been elaborately decorated for the occasion.

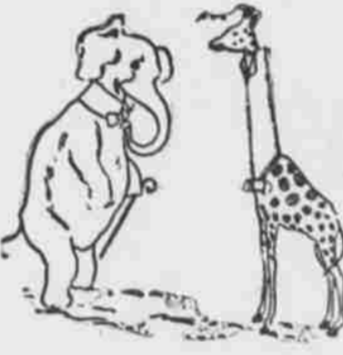

The procession will form on Commercial street, right resting on Twelfth. The line of march will be as follows: East on Commercial to the O. R. & N. dock; countermarch on Commercial to Fourth; west on Bond to Seventh; south on Seventh to Commercial; east on Commercial to Eleventh, and thence to the grand stand, where the opening ceremonies will occur.

STREET FAIR CARNIVAL

Over Two Thousand People Saw the Performances Last Night.

Yesterday crowds thronged the street fair both afternoon and evening. At night it is estimated that over 2000 people were on the midway during the evening and all of the performances went with a snap and dash. The lack of sufficient electric lights prevented some of the attractions being seen at their best, but splendid entertainment was provided despite the handicap. It is a good natured carnival crowd

that is frequenting the street fair and the liberal use of confetti is a source of much amusement, both to onlookers and participants.

The daring aerial act of the Austin Sisters, the mysterious "Maid of the Air" Lunette, the Oriental strangeness of the Streets of Cairo and the Algerian village, the stuprid Col. Boone, "Daniel of the Lions' den," and the various other shows proved unusually interesting to the thousands of visitors during the day.
