The steamer North King returned yesterday from F. M. Warren's cannery on the Nushagak and reported a pack of 20,000 cases which will be brought down on the bark Kate Davenport. Selus Jensen was one of the party returning on the North King.

Tomorrow will be Labor Day and will be generally observed in the large cities throughout the country. Locally there will be no observance of the day but representatives of some of the unions will go to Portland to participate in the celebration there. The banks and public buildings will be closed tomorrow.

The O. R. & N. has made a rate of \$56 from Astoria and Portland for the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo. Tickets will be on sale first to third Tuesdays, June to October, inclusive. These tickets must be used for continuous passage going, but stopovers will be allowed within final limit returning.

The young salmon at the Fisheries exhibit in the street fair will probably be turned into the reservoir if permission can be obtained from the proper authorities. During the week some 1000 eggs were hatched in the exhibit, and the booth was visited by thousands of people who evinced great interest in the methods and results of artificial propagation.

From present indications the ruling price for salmon on the Puget sound pack will be \$1 for talls or \$1 per case. The Alaska Packers Association has sent out those quotations. Other packers, and among them the new corporations, are holding for \$1.10 for talls. In view of the enormous pack there must be increased consumption or there will be a large hold-over stock, and it may be that prices will go still lower. The Fraser river pack is equal to that of Puget sound, making a total of about 2,250,000 cases for the year.

Beginning Monday, September 2, the summer schedule of the A. & C. R. R. will be discontinued and the evening train will leave Portland every Saturday thereafter at 7:00 p. m. instead of 7:30 p. m. For Peasdo, Gearhart and points on the Warrenton-Port Stevens branch, trains will leave Astoria daily at 11:35 a. m. and 5:30 p. m. and 8:15 a. m. on Sundays only.

George Jabor, proprietor of the Midway shows, deposited \$1000 last night with Sheriff Linville in order to secure attachment proceedings. The contract made by George Hutchins with the regatta committee guaranteed the committee \$2000 and 15 per cent of the gross receipts. The percentage amounted to but \$200 and Jabor claimed that the committee had broken faith with him in regard to special days and other provisions. He demanded when asked to pay the \$1000 difference and only agreed to deposit it as a bond when attachment proceedings were threatened. Judge Alex Sweet and City Attorney Long, of Portland, will represent Mr. Jabor in the litigation which will follow. The midway played a losing engagement and Mr. Jabor stated last night that he was over \$200 to the bad on the week's business.

The Puget sound salmon canning season, so far as the sockeye run is concerned, is practically over, and the result has fulfilled the most sanguine expectations at the beginning of the season, says the Tacoma Ledger. According to the most accurate figures that can be obtained the pack in round numbers reaches 1,500,000 cases, which is slightly in excess of the prediction made by Fish Commissioner Little before the run commenced. It has broken all records since the establishment of the salmon industry on Puget sound. Of the total pack, Wharfedale canneries put up over 900,000 cases. The season has been a very profitable one for the canneries. For over a month they have been running to their full capacity and the salmon have rarely cost them as high as ten cents a case. However, the tin has been a heavier expense than heretofore, an advance of 30 per cent having been made over former years. The canneries claim that it will not pay to devote much attention to the fall run unless it is very heavy, as otherwise the price of fish would be increased to them and they could not afford to pay 12 to 15 cents for fish at the ruling price of the canned product. In fact, many of the canneries are out of cans and do not care to get any more. They are satisfied with their present packs and do not wish to assume any risk on the fall run.

REDUCED RATES FOR REGATTA.

For Astoria Regatta and Street Carnival the A. & C. R. R. have announced the following round-trip excursion rates: From Portland, Deer Island and intermediate points to Astoria and return, \$2.00; from Goble, Knappa and intermediate points and return, one fare; From Svensen to Astoria and return, 50c; no reduction from points west of Svensen. Tickets on sale for evening train of August 28, all trains of August 29th and 30th, and morning train of August 31st, good to return September 1st. Tickets sold from Portland will be of interchangeable form, giving visitors the option of returning by either boat or rail.

From all points on Seaside Division the round trip fare will be one and one-third times the regular one-way fare. Tickets on sale Aug. 29th, 30th and morning trains of Aug. 31st, good to return September 1st.

THE REGATTA A SUCCESS

Estimated That Attendance During the Three Days Exceeded 15,000.

"I have been connected with every regatta held in Astoria, and I want to say that this year's even, is far and away ahead of any previous year," said Admiral E. S. Edwards last night. "Your committee, of which Mr. Parker is the head, has earned glory and honor by the superb manner and methods of handling the regatta. The program provided has never before been equaled and the crowds in attendance exceeds any ever before. It has been a grand and glorious success. The regatta will not only be a fixture, but it will be the athletic and aquatic event of the Pacific coast."

The eighth annual Astoria regatta closed last night, and it has exceeded any previous event in the history of the city. During the three days over 15,000 people have been in the city. The weather, though threatening at times,

Director-General Fulton stated to an Astorian reporter last night that the street fair had been successful. The streets were dismantled last night and the Jabor show will get away this morning to Baker City, where a street fair is to open Monday. The work of taking down the tents and other apparatus began shortly after 11 o'clock and before 5 o'clock this morning it will all be loaded on the Jabor special train and the members of the show will be en route to their next stopping place.

A large number of visitors left last night by boat and train, but those who remained here, the streets populated until an early hour and the seawomen whose attractions were outside the grounds did a good business until after midnight.

There were two events on yesterday's aquatic program that were of unusual

interest. One was a 100-yard swimming race between R. B. Cornell, the Olympic Club champion, and H. F. Brewer, who holds the coast championship. A large amount of money was wagered by Cornell's friends that he would beat Brewer at the 100-yard and 50-yard mark, but the latter was too fast and led all the way, winning handsily by five yards. Cornell is a fast man but Brewer apparently has not been pressed to do his best in any of his exhibitions here and has a wonderful speed. Brewer expects to join the Jabor Midway show in Salt Lake in a fortnight. He will do a high diving and fancy swimming turn. Brewer leaves this morning for San Diego, where he will participate in the races given under the auspices of the Coronado hotel management.

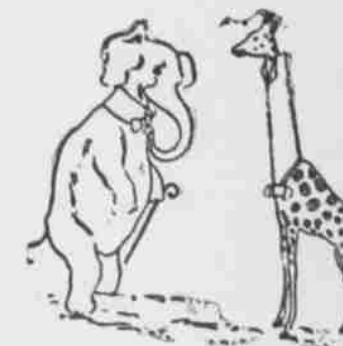
