## THE UTMOST CONFIDENCE PREVAILS

### President's Physicians Hold Out Strong Hopes for His Ultimate Recovery.

### NOTHING BUT GRADUAL IMPROVEMENT

### Only an Absolute Change for the Worse Can Shake Confidence of the Physicians in Attendance—Every Hour a Victory.

### MUCH OF THE DANGER IS NOW SAID TO BE PASSED

### Another Week Must Elope Before Patient Is Pronounced Out of Danger—His General Strength and Spirits Improving—Nourishment Successfully Administered—Mrs. McKinley Admitted.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—"God's" contribution to the American people will be the sparing of the president's life. As the evening hours were falling tonight, John J. Myer, president of the Pan-American exposition, reverently uttered these words as he stood before the scene in which the Nation's president was fighting so bravely with death. And all who have seen at the Midway find new today reflect the view that the battle will be won and the world's prayers answered.

While his signs of unfavorable symptoms have improved, every hour has seen a victory. Faith in the outcome grows stronger and stronger and hour mounts until, in the minds of some, the danger of this famous complication has vanished and hope has become a conviction. Indeed, many of the president's friends seem possessed with a sort of supernatural confidence in the possible recovery, which nothing but a sudden change for the worse can shake. The basis for confidence is expressed as well. "There has been nothing but improvement, gradual, but sure. Every bulletin, every private and public word of the physicians in attendance breathes encouragement. The reports which the physicians have given on all facts as they exist from recent conferences, unclouded with the sentiment, nevertheless, that the president is not out danger is the verdict by all of them. Neither of them would risk his professional reputation with the statement that the president will live. All they will say is that with every hour, the danger of complications from pneumonia or blood poisoning lessens."

Dr. McBurney, the most eminent of the physicians in attendance, expressed the opinion that if the improvement continues it will be a week before the president can be pronounced out of danger and convalescent. And some of his colleagues, like Dr. Mann, place the limit still further away. The fear of pneumonia, it can be said positively, has well nigh disappeared. As the expiration of the seventy-two hours' period, at 4 o'clock this morning, the danger from that source was almost gone.

The president himself has been cheerful today and has expressed confidence of recovery. Today he asked for the morning paper, but this, of course, had to be denied him. It is only with some difficulty that he can be restrained from talking and Colonel Myer T. Herick, of Cleveland, is most anxious for the statement that he has spoken at intervals of several things he has proposed to do in the future.

This morning he asked to be allowed to change his position and when permission was given, before the attendants could move him, he changed to a position he found to assume without difficulty or pain. This speaks much for his general strength and spirits. Mrs. McKinley saw him again today. He was given nourishment in the form of eggs beaten in milk.

Since last night very hot water has been taken into the stomach, through the mouth, with excellent results. If he continues to improve it will be gradually. If he should grow worse, the change in that direction also probably will be slow. This is the opinion of Doctor Mann. There will be no crisis.

### CIVIL WAR VETERANS.

Annual Reunion at Cleveland—All Functions Modified or Omitted.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 9.—The city was brilliantly illuminated tonight in honor of the visiting veterans of the civil war who have been pouring into Cleveland all day, to participate in the exercises of the annual reunion of the G. A. R. This afternoon a statement was issued announcing that all functions connected with the reunion of the Grand Army, in which the president was to have participated, will either be omitted or modified.

### OUT OF COMMISSION.

### WILL BE BROKEN UP.

BOSTON, Sept. 9.—The work of breaking up the yacht Independence will begin tomorrow.

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LONDON, Sept. 9.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg says the Russian government has ordered to build five battleships, each of 20,000 tons.

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CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—Chicago Posters last night denounced the crime of Leon Cozlogosz and regretted that he claimed to be of their race. Meetings were held at St. Stanislaus church, at which fifty societies of the church were represented and at the lodge rooms of the Polish Roman Catholic Union, 108 West Division street.

Translation of the resolutions were made, those of the Catholic Union being sent to Buffalo to George B. Cortlevou, President McKinley's private secretary, and those of the St. Stanislaus church to Secretary of State John Hay.

Emma Goldman believed to be Prime Mover in President's Assassination.

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That there was a conspiracy in which many besides Cozlogosz were concerned and which had the destruction of President McKinley as its purpose is the firm conviction of all the members of the cabinet and the Buffalo police. An agent of the United States coast service said that the theory is held that Emma Goldman, the anarchist, was the prime mover in this plot which may have contemplated a series of crimes, of which the murder of the president was only the beginning.
