THE UTMOST CONFIDENCE PREVAILS

President's Physicians Hold Out Strong
Hopes for His Ultimate Recovery.

NOTHING BUT GRADUAL IMPROVEMENT

Only an Absolute Change for the Worse Can Shake Confidence of the Physicians in Attendance—
Every Hour a Victory.

MUCH OF THE DANGER IS NOW SAID TO BE PASSED

Another Week Must Elapse Before Patient Is Pronounced Out of Danger—His General Strength and Spirits Improving—
Nourishment Successfully Administered—
Mrs. McKinley Admitted.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—"God's contribution to the American people will be the sparing of the president's life,"

As the evening shadows were falling tonight, John F. McIlroy, president of the Pan-American exposition, reverently uttered these words as he stood before his home in which the Nation's newest hero was fighting so bravely with death. And all who have been at the Buffalo meet have to day reflect the view that the battle will be won and the world's prayers answered.

With the spirit of unfavorable symptoms now agreedly silent near has been a shadowy faith. Faith in the imminent victory and success and recovery until in the minds of some the danger of all future complications have vanished and hope has become a conviction. Indeed, many of the president's friends seem possessed with a sort of supercilious confidence in the president's recovery when nothing but a slight change for the worse can make. This confidence is exercised as well. There has been nothing but improvement, gradual, but sure. Every bulletin, every private and public word of the physicians in attendance breathes encouragement. The reports which the physicians have given on artifacts as they exist from recent conferences, unimpaired with the sentiment, nevertheless, that the president is not out danger is the verdict by all of them. Neither of them would risk his professional reputation with the statement that the president will live. All they will say is that with every hour, the danger of complications from peritonitis or blood poisoning decreases.

Dr. McBurney, the most eminent of the physicians in attendance, expressed the opinion that if the improvement continues it will be a week before the president can be pronounced out of danger and convalescent. And some of his colleagues, like Dr. Mann, place the patient still further away. The fear of peritonitis, it can be said positively, has well nigh disappeared. At the expiration of the twenty-four hours period, at 4 o'clock this morning the danger from that source was almost gone.

The president himself has been cheerful today and has expressed confidence of recovery. Today he asked for the morning paper, out of course, had to be denied him. It is only with some difficulty that he can be restrained from talking, and Colonel Myron P. Herrick, of Cleveland, is quoted as authority for the statement that he has spoken at intervals of several things he has proposed to do in the future.

This morning he wished to be allowed to change his position and when permission was given, before the attendants could move him, he changed to a position he found to assume without difficulty or pain. This spoke much for his general strength and spirits. Mr. McKinley saw him again today. He was given nourishment in the form of eggs beaten in milk.

Since last night very hot water has been taken into the stomach through the mouth with有利的结果. If he continues to improve it will be gradually. If he should grow worse, the change in that direction also probably will be slow. This is the opinion of Doctor Mann. There will be no crisis.

NO BAD SYMPTOMS.

Possibility of Danger. However, Will Exist for a Week.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—Dr. McBurney said this afternoon:

"No bad symptoms have appeared. No one can say now that the president is out of danger, and for a week the possibility of complications may exist. At the end of that time, if all goes well, we may be able to say that he is convalescent."

"You may assure your clientele that all goes well. President McKinley's condition could hardly be more satisfactory."

OPINION OF PHYSICIANS.

Doctors Mynder and Wasdin Expect Complete and Rapid Recovery.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—Dr. Herman Mynder, one of the consulting physicians, said tonight:

"I may say that at this stage of the occurrence, the condition of the patient is remarkably favorable and personally I cannot expect anything except recovery."

Dr. Eugene Wasdin, who was with Dr. Mynder, said:

"I agree that the president's condition is one that strongly favors complete and rapid recovery."

DR. RIXLEY'S OPINION.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—Dr. Rixley, private physician of the president and Mrs. McKinley, said tonight:

"There will be no attempt to extract the bullet at present. I see no reason why the president will not recover rapidly."

ZOLLOWSZ CLOSELY QUESTIONED.

Denies Having Accomplices in the Commission of the Crime.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—Czolgosz, the would-be assassin of President McKinley, went through another long examination today at the hands of police officials, but emerged from it without having added anything material to their knowledge of the case.

He persistently stuck to his denial that he was assisted in any way in the commission of the crime.

MIL. ROOSEVELT'S POSITION.

His Attitude Since Shooting of President Wins Respect of All.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—Vice-President Roosevelt has occupied a peculiar delirious and lying position since the event which threatened the president's life, but

MAIL CONTRACT CANCELLED.

Carrier Who Expessed Satisfaction Over Shooting of President.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Second Assistant Postmaster General Shallenberger today summarily cancelled the contract of Chas. F. Corrington, a mail carrier, for expressing satisfaction over the shooting of President McKinley. He had the contract for carrying mail between Homer, N. Y., and Spafford, Oneida county.

Mr. Shallenberger took prompt steps to cancel Corrington's contract upon the ground that a person capable of such sentiments is not a fit custodian of mails of the government.

SPEECHES WILL BE CANCELLED.

Ohio Campaign Managers Tribute of Respect to the President.

COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 9.—Chairman M. A. Dougherty of the Democratic executive committee, today addressed a letter to Chairman Chas. Dick, of the Republican state committee, suggesting that as an evidence of respect to the president, all political speeches for the campaign in Ohio be cancelled.

Tonight Chairman Dick replied to Chairman Dougherty requesting to re-quire in his suggestion.

LAWLESSNESS DENOUNCED.

Trades of Unions Take Action on President's Assassination.

BOSTON, Sept. 9.—The trade unions of Boston took action on the attempted assassination of President McKinley at their meetings last night, and in every case they expressed their sorrow at the deed committed in Buffalo on Friday last.

Instructions have been issued to the owners of halls not to rent them to anarchists. The same conditions ruled in Paterson, where no big gatherings were held as is customary Sunday. Mayor Hunefield, of Paterson, has given notice that any saloon keeper who rents his hall for anarchist meetings will have his license revoked. Licenses will be refused to applicants known to be even friendly with followers of the red flag.

ANARCHISTS' HAUNTS DESERTED.

Annual Sunday Meetings in New York Are Not Held.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Haunts of anarchists in this city were deserted yesterday, according to the police. Special detectives have been on the watch everywhere, where members of the band are known to have collected in the past.

ALL EFFORTS
HAVE FAILED

PEACE OVERTURES REJECTED
