

TURKEY'S REQUEST WILL BE REFUSED

France Will Not Agree to Resume Diplomatic Relations.

CLAIMS MUST BE SETTLED

Believed That the Sultan Will Eventually Give In—Tubini Claim Settled—Head of Turkish Police Ordered to Leave France.

PARIS, Sept. 11.—It is expected in official circles here that the Tubini claim has been settled by direct negotiations between the claimants and Porte to resume diplomatic relations. France however, will reject any such proposition until the sultan has yielded in the case of the Lotrandi claim which is nearly four times the amount of the Tubini claim. M. Constant will not return to Constantinople. Advice from that city say it is believed the Lotrandi claim will soon be settled.

THE CZAR'S VISIT.

Character and Number of French Guests Yet Undecided.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—The Paris correspondent of the Times says: The Bethany review promises to be the greatest attraction to the crowds in connection with the czar's visit. In spite of all that has lately been done, France is far more of a military than a naval power.

It is not yet known what the exact character of the Compiegne fetes will be—whether only French guests or representatives of the diplomatic world of Paris will attend. While the czar is at Compiegne as the guest of France that will be his home and the choice of guest will belong to him.

Another authority asserts that the czar comes to France to pave the way for a new Russian loan larger than any previous loan. For half a century, he declares, Russia has been living solely on loans. Nine-tenths of the empire is unproductive. The last loan long ago vanished.

Another authority asserts that the czar comes to France because France is jealous of Germany after the exhibition of brotherly love between the czar and kaiser in Alsace last year. It is said that President Loubet in conversation with an exalted Russian personage, did not conceal his opinion of the unfortunate effect this had produced on France and that his remarks were repeated to the czar.

MUST ENLIST UNTIL END.

English Yeomanry Being Recruited for One Year or Longer if Necessary.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—The Times says: With the approach of mid-September, sanguine Britons believe Lord Kitchener and the government have a plan in mind other than Mr. Dole's simple recipe of "declaring the Boer war off." It is still expected that there will be a great change in the situation on September 15, when Lord Kitchener's proclamation goes into effect, the only ground for such belief being that the government would not be so fatuous as to issue a proclamation without a definite scheme in regard to following it up.

On the other hand the conservative papers now speak of the likelihood of continued guerilla warfare throughout the coming South African summer while the war office has issued an order that imperial yeomen "must enlist for one year, or, if the war lasts longer, for the war."

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COLORADO CONVICTS ESCAPE

Overpower Warden at Canon City Prison and Get Away to the Mountains.

CANON CITY, Col., Sept. 11.—Three convicts at the state penitentiary, Ed Pavness, sent up for murder, Frank Harris, for stealing beef cattle, and D. K. Reed, serving time for larceny, escaped from the penitentiary ranch two miles from the prison.

They overpowered Overseer King and taking his carbine and revolver, and taking horses from the stable, started for the mountains. A large posse is following with bloodhounds. The men are expected to flight if overtaken.

JAPANESE USHS REVOLVER

PRESNO, Cal., Sept. 11.—A Japanese named Panoung was shot and instantly killed by another Japanese earlier this morning. The murderer fled and was pursued by police officers. The fugitive turned and shot Officer McSwain twice, inflicting painful wounds. Nelson then fired and wounded the Japanese, who was forced to surrender.
