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Every place of business in Astoria should be closed on Thursday, when the funeral of President McKinley will be held.

Persons who believe that anarchy clings to the skirts of organized labor should read the resolutions passed by Astoria council, Federation of Labor, which appear in today's Astorian.

The assassination of President McKinley is as much deplored in foreign countries as in the United States. The world over, the late president was regarded as a man of the kindest impulses, and in history he will be known as the gentlest statesman of modern times.

It is to be hoped that the property owners will take the broad view of the matter and grant an 80 or 100-foot right of way for the road to connect with the Nehalem highway. It should be remembered that the avenue will connect with a city street, and that sooner or later it will be necessary to widen the avenue to the usual width of streets.

There seems to be general regret that Czolgosz, the assassin of President McKinley, was not lynched by a mob, and now the press of the country is clamoring for his speedy execution. There is no occasion for haste, however. It is not so much the execution of Czolgosz as the detection of the whole anarchist plot that the authorities desire, and Czolgosz will be more useful as a live witness than as a dead murderer.

If anarchy is to be stamped out, the police must get at the bottom of the organization, and, with a death sentence hanging over him, Czolgosz should constitute a most instructive source of information.

The execution of this assassin will not, as many believe, serve as an example to others of his class, for the anarchist who kills does not fear death, or if he fears of the consequences, commits the act with full knowledge of the penalty which he shall pay.

When Czolgosz stepped up to President McKinley on the afternoon of September 6, he knew well that he would kill the president; that the crowd would overpower him and perhaps at once pay him to death, or that, if he escaped the fury of the mob, legal execution would follow.

Yet the anarchist did not falter. He killed the president at the sacrifice of his own life. His execution, then, will be a matter of little consequence as an example to other anarchists.

These outbursts do not fear the law; they are willing to die if they can first strike down the head of a nation. With a class of this sort mere execution of an individual assassin is inadequate punishment.

The anarchistic organization must be ferreted out; and the name of every member become known. Then disposition of the entire brood can be made. From men who do not fear death—who commit such terrible crimes as that enacted at Buffalo—there will be no protection until anarchy is stamped out.

Anarchistic agitators, assassins and recruits must also be corded together and dealt with in a manner that will forever obliterate the possibility of further such crimes. There is no need for the speedy execution of Czolgosz. His death will not strike terror to the souls of his fellows, but his imprisonment for a time may be the means of gathering information that will go far toward stamping out this curse.
