For the Portland carnival and exposition the A. & C. R. has named a special round-trip rate of \$1 from Astoria to Portland and return.

The frogs for the street railway switch to be installed at the A. & C. depot have at last been located, and the work of putting in the switch will be commenced this morning by Superintendent Conledge.

Oscar B. Berendes, one of the best-known young men of this city, died last evening of typhoid pneumonia.

M. J. Kinney came down from Portland last evening. To a representative of The Morning Astorian Mr. Kinney said he was very much pleased to note that the Union Pacific had decided to extend to Astoria common point rates on lumber.

Under the law passed by the legislature authorizing sheriffs to sell all property held by counties for delinquent taxes and clerks to collect on the delinquent roll, County Clerk Wheeler has collected \$16,125.43.

Almost daily some new complication resulting from the 1892 tax muddle comes to light. At the present time the officials of the city and county are making an effort to straighten out the muddle by selling at public auction all delinquent property.
