

TO SUPPRESS THE DISEASE

Plans for Organization of Yellow Fever Institute.

LETTER OF SURGEON-GENERAL

Members of Institute Will Be Composed of Physicians of United States Marine Hospital and Others Specially Qualified.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The New York Medical Journal will contain in its issue today a letter written by Surgeon-General Walter Wyman to the secretary of the treasury regarding the Marine Hospital service yellow fever institute. In his letter Surgeon-General Wyman says in part:

"I have prepared a plan for the organization of a yellow fever institute in the United States Marine Hospital service, whose object will be to collect all facts concerning yellow fever, to designate the specific lines of investigation to be made and to make the investigations. The members of this institute are to be the medical officers of the United States Marine Hospital service and others specially qualified. They will be designated for duty to one of four sections, each section having a special list of topics for consideration. Each of the four sections will be under the direction of one of the medical officers on duty in this bureau.

"At present the service work on yellow fever is being conducted by a limited number of officers working on more or less independent lines. The institute provides for observation and experiment by a large number of workers in accordance with a general system—in fact, organizing and co-ordinating the work that has been going on and which is to be done."

The institution proposes to investigate the transmission of the disease by the mosquito.

WILL BUY HAM ESTATE.

Tammany Chief Negotiating for Purchase of an English Property.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Richard Croker is negotiating for the purchase of the Ham estate of 170 acres adjoining his Moat House property and extending from Letcombe to the outskirts of Wexham, says a Wantage correspondent of the World. The Ham estate has a fine manor house 300 years old upon it and two water mills. Mr. Croker is not likely to get the property under \$200,000.

He has rushed the work on his new artificial lake so rapidly that it has emptied, owing to the hurried construction. The half-acre electric power station for Moat House and the stables have been finished. The work is being supervised by Mr. Usher, who has remained at Moat House this year.

Mr. Croker is also buying another stud farm called Challow Hill, about three miles from Moat House, to provide accommodation for his increased stock of brood mares and foals.

KING EDWARD'S HEALTH

Mysterious Throat Trouble Said to Have Affected His Voice.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Concerning the report that the illness of King Edward is caused by cancer of the throat, the London correspondent of the World cables:

The report from Copenhagen followed close upon the visit to King Edward at the Danish royal palace at Frederiksberg of Sir Felix Salmon, the noted throat specialist, who was summoned from London and who was recently added to the staff of royal physicians with the title of physician extraordinary. It was noted that the mysterious throat trouble had affected the king's voice, making it husky, and it was said he had been forbidden to make any more public speeches. He also cut his consumption of cigars down to three a day.

SWEDISH DIVINE HERE

Bishop von Scheele of Visby, Sweden, Arrives in New York.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The Right Rev. Knuts Gennar von Scheele, bishop of Visby, Sweden, arrived here today on the City of Rome. He is commissioned by the king of Sweden to represent him at several important functions, including the bicentennial of Yale University.

On Monday night he will attend a banquet given in his honor at the Manhattan hotel.

In 1888 Bishop Scheele was sent by the king of Sweden to Jerusalem to represent the state church of Sweden at the dedication of the Church of the Redeemer by Emperor William II. of Germany. Bishop Scheele is a member of the Swedish Riksdag.

A banquet was tendered the marquis at the Rialto Grand last night. It was attended by prominent residents of this city. The local Japanese colony gave a magnificent reception to their distinguished countryman yesterday.

London Daily Mail Extends to Sir Thomas Adams Sympathy.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The Herald says: The Rev. William M. Cox, assistant pastor of the Madison Square Presbyterian church, has asked the police to send him a general alarm for Luther S. Bedford. He said that Mr. Bedford, who is an editor from Texas, was to have called at the home of the Rev. Dr. Parkhurst but failed to keep his appointment.

TELEPHONE TESTS MADE.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—Tests to determine the value of operating trains by telephone and doing other service now performed by the telegraph are being made by officers of the Santa Fe system, says the Chronicle. The tests cover short distances and are for the purpose of demonstrating to just what extent the telephone may be used in railroad work either as a substitute in many ways for the telegraph or as a supplement to it.

BRILLIANT SOCIAL EVENT

MISS HELEN MORTON MARRIED TO COUNT PERIGORD.

Ceremony Takes Place at Catholic Church at Chelsea—Senator Depew to Marry.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The London correspondent of the World cables the following concerning the Perigord-Morton wedding:

Count de Perigord and Miss Morton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Levi P. Morton, were married at high noon today at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, Chelsea.

The wedding was one of the most notable of the season. The magnificence of the bride's presents has caused much gossip. Many of the gifts were purchased in Paris where Miss Morton and her parents spent last week.

Mr. and Mrs. Morton are receiving friends at the Coburg hotel, where some of the presents are on view. They include a superb emerald given by the Duke de Talleyrand et Sagay, bridegroom's mother; a diamond corsage ornament from Mr. and Mrs. Morton; a pearl and diamond necklace the gift of the bride's father, and a diamond earring presented by Mrs. William O'Brien, the bride's sister and her husband. A large number of the presents are in Paris and New York.

There was a notably brilliant assemblage at the wedding. The members of the American embassy, headed by Ambassador and Mrs. Choate and members of the French embassy, Colonel and Mrs. Vivian, titled Parisians, friends of the bridegroom and many of the nobility witnessed the ceremony. The Duke de Talleyrand et Sagay, the bridegroom's father, was not present, owing to feeble health.

MR. DEPEW TO MARRY.

Miss May Palmer, the Young Lady Who Will Become His Wife.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The Herald announced that Senator Chauncey M. Depew is to marry Miss May Palmer in the near future and quotes the senator at his home, Fordham Park, near Morristown, N. J., as follows:

"It is true that I am to be married again. The lady who has honored me by agreeing to become my wife is Miss Palmer, whom I have known for years."

BROKEN MAKING CONTRACTS.

Fall River Manufacturer Unsuccessful in Making Large Purchases.

FALL RIVER, Mass., Oct. 5.—M. C. D. Borden is in the market offering three cents flat for contracts well into January with mills refusing to make contracts.

During the week he had been actively engaged through his local agents in an endeavor to buy up spot cloth for immediate delivery at three cents but was unable to obtain a scant 125,000 pieces equal to only half the production of the mills for six days. Manufacturers pleaded that they had but little stock on hand. Mr. Borden finally changed his tactics and offered the full quota for cloth on contracts extending into 1902 but manufacturers stated that they were unable to make contracts on account of the prospects of labor disturbances, even at the tempting figures offered.

TEXAS TOWN BURNING.

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 5.—Fire which broke out at 11:30 o'clock last night at Timpan, Tex., destroyed almost the entire business section of the city, entailing a loss of \$125,000. At 3 o'clock this morning only 14 business houses were left standing and the fire was not yet under control.

REBEL ATTACK EXPECTED.

PANAMA, Colombia, Oct. 5.—via Galveston.—Colonel Gomez has left Panama on a sailing vessel with 100 soldiers to reinforce the garrison at Aguadulce, about seventy-five miles from this city, where it is rumored revolutionary forces are about to attack the government troops.

BEST SUGAR PRODUCTION.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, estimates the best sugar production for 1901 at 198,500 tons. The production in tons in the western states was as follows: California, 50,000; Colorado, 20,000; Utah, 15,000; Oregon, 200; Washington, 2000.

FREDERICK GIVEN ROQUET.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—Crown Prince Frederick William has left the Harz mountains to hunt in Bavaria. As he was passing the station at Thale, Fraulein Frieda Ebnitz, daughter of Emin Pasha, the African explorer, handed to him a beautiful bouquet of roses.

ARRESTED FOR SWINDLING.

Miss Odella Dias de Bar Arraigned in London Police Court.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—A dispatch to the World from London says:

The mysterious prisoner at Marylebone police court, who has been three times remanded under the name of

Laura Horro and about whom the police inspector who made the arrest has promised "staggering disclosures," has been identified as Miss Odella Dias de Bar, who served a term in Blackwell's island for swindling Luther C. Marsh thirteen years ago and who has since been imprisoned in the west of Italy for insurance frauds to that for which she is now under arrest.

Inspector Kane, who made the arrest both of Dias de Bar and a man who calls himself her husband, has been keeping the identity of the prisoner secret.

Inspector Kane says that the trial of the case against Miss Horro, or Dias de Bar, or Jackson, which she claims now as her real name, will last several days. There are several charges against her of the same nature as in the Marsh case, namely swindling by means of clairvoyance and spiritualism. There will also be a felony charge against her, namely, perjury and another charge against Dias de Bar of actively assisting him in his commission. The two prisoners will be examined in the court next Thursday.

TO DISCUSS BIRTHRIGHT.

MARRIAGES MADE BY ANTS.

How the Insects Select Husbands for the Sulu Maldives.

W. L. Baize, a merchant at Manila, is at the Brown Palace hotel. He has recently been travelling in the island of Sulu for a month, and tells of some curious marriage customs. Said he:

"A most curious custom is to be found in that island. It obtains only among some of the more savage tribes of the far interior, called the Kakkobattochoka. I won't swear to the spelling. These savages are very primitive people indeed, and very savage in their manners of life. There are not above 10,000 of them, and they live in the mountains of the interior. The way their young women are given in marriage is worth going miles to see. I saw the ceremony last month, and I shall not soon forget it.

"When a young woman comes to the age of 14 she is deemed marriageable. A notice is given out by the town clerk that on a certain day the young woman will be given in marriage. This day is within a month of the fourteenth birthday of the lady concerned, and is chosen by her, according to ancient custom. And the choosing of the day, by the way, is all that the bride has to say about the marriage. The other also, a few days later, calls out the dowry of the bride, and proclaims her charms aloud in the market place. So all the population is notified, and a goodly crowd of admirers gather to take their chance for the fair lady. The near relatives of the bride and the contestants—who have previously given their names in to the father of the girl—and a crowd of perhaps 100 persons if the young woman is the daughter of a man of importance, gather to see the show.

On the morning of the marriage the bride is taken out by her mother and robed with blue, and clad in white. Then, with much drum beating she is led forth, and passes among the suitors, and kisses each in turn. Then she is wreathed with more flowers, and is seated to watch the fun.

"Now, on that island of Sulu they have a kind of ant that parades the scientists, for it has a double set of mandibles, one above and one below the head, and both entirely independent in action. These ants play a leading part in the marriage ceremony. The night before the ceremony the village priest goes out by the light of the moon and opens an ant hill with secret rites and carefully selects some ants, equal in number to the number of suitors. These are kept with care.

"After the bride has kissed all the suitors in turn they go out to the hut where the ants are kept. The priest is there, and he takes an ant by the body and allows it to fasten the lower mandible to the forefinger of the right hand of a young man. These ants are about an inch and a half long and have the most ferocious bite you can imagine. Then, each suitor with an ant hanging to his forefinger, the young men go back to the presence of the bride. Then there are long and elaborate dances, while the young men go around and dance before the bride, each with a monstrous ant hanging to his finger. Then she is blindfolded, and the young men are lined up for the selection.

"The drums are beaten with renewed vigor and the bride goes along the line of the suitors and inserts her forefinger in the upper mandible of the ant that hangs to the fingers of the suitors, each in turn. The first ant that closes his pincer on the digit of the fair lady wins her for the man to whose finger it is hanging. Then the chosen bridegroom strikes the ant to the ground and crushes it with his heel, and in comes the priest and marries the couple. Afterward the ants that have been used in the ceremony are taken out and cooked, and a portion is given to each guest to be eaten like the wedding cake in civilized lands."

WANTS TO BE A STATE

GOV. MURPHY ISSUES CONFERENCE PROCLAMATION

People of Arizona to Take Concerted Action to Be Admitted to Statehood.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 5.—Governor Murphy has issued a proclamation calling a statehood convention to convene in Phoenix on October 24. The Phoenix board of trade decided to appropriate funds to cover all expenses of delegates to the conference. Representation will be had from each county of the territory and a strong effort will be made to draw out political and business men in making up the delegates. The governor, in his proclamation, states his belief that concert of action on the part of the citizens will induce the fifty-seventh congress during the coming winter, to pass an enabling act, but it is hoped that influential corporations will not lend assistance.

Governor Murphy has accepted an invitation from Governor O'Connell of New Mexico to address a statehood convention at Albuquerque on October 24. It is understood that the two territories will cooperate in an effort to secure admission.

TO SUPPRESS ANARCHY.

Steps Taken by the New Jersey Bar Association.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The Hudson County, New Jersey, Bar Association at a meeting called to hear the report of its committee appointed to recommend legislation for the repression of anarchy, ordered the report referred to a special committee. The first section of the proposed act specifies that anarchy shall be made a capital felony both as to the principal and accessories as well before as after the fact. The term anarchy, for the purposes of this section, shall be taken to include every act done or word uttered with intent to cause or to incite others to cause the assassination of a president of the United States or any person in this line of succession, the governor of a state or any person in the gubernatorial succession or the chief of any foreign state or any person in the line of succession thereof.

The second section provides that every person, who, without intent to cause or to incite others to cause the assassination of the persons referred to in the first section, shall say or do anything with a view of maintaining or promulgating anarchistic doctrines shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor.

WEDDING WILL BE PRIVATE.

Miss Aldrich and John D. Rockefeller to Be Married Wednesday.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 5.—The arrangements have been completed for the marriage of Miss Abby Green Aldrich, daughter of United States Senator Nelson W. Aldrich, of Rhode Island, to John D. Rockefeller, Jr., son of John D. Rockefeller of the Standard Oil Company.

The wedding will occur next Wednesday at Senator Aldrich's summer home on Warwick Neck and will be private. There will be no bridesmaids and no ushers for the wedding service. Everett Colby, a classmate of Mr. Rockefeller at Brown University, will be best man. J. Halkey Denford, Lewiston, G. Hazard, Theodore F. Green and William L. Murray have been requested to serve as ushers at the reception.

MRS. WHITES LECTURE.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—Mrs. White, wife of the United States ambassador, is expected here today from Dresden to deliver a lecture before the American Students Club.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—Emperor William will remain for a few days longer at Hohenhausen before proceeding to Hohenhausen, the imperial hunting lodge.

PLANS FOR CANAL.

Belgian Proposition to Connect Baltic With the Black Sea.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—The Odessa, Latakia, quoted by the correspondent of the Times in that city, says a syndicate of Belgians is petitioning the Russian government to approve plans for a canal joining the Baltic and Black seas. The syndicate offers to furnish the capital in return for a concession for a term of years. The government, it is believed, thinks the terms named too long and is likely to refuse to grant the concessions. It may construct the canal itself. The minimum depth specified is seventeen feet.
